This means that all the fish served at the shop is certified sustainable and can be fully traced to place of origin. Owner Nick Lomvardos told me you can even find out which ship the fish was caught on!

Nick told me, "We are displaying our MSC certification with pride. It is a clear, bold statement to our staff and customers that we care where our fish comes from. People can buy their much loved fish supper with complete reassurance that the quality fish they tuck into has been sustainably sourced."

The Bishopston venue is the only fish and chip shop in Bristol to currently have been awarded the MSC accreditation. Nick shared, "We believe this certification is an integral part of running a successful, sustainable business. It identifies us with worldwide businesses and organisations and reflects our passion for the industry."

The Fish Bar has also recently learnt that they have once again made the UK's top 60 fish and chip shops! The competition, organised by Seafish, runs

across ter regions. To have secured

a place in the coveted shortlist, the shops have been appraised across a variety of judging criteria including responsible sourcing policies, marketing and promotional practices, and staff training policies.

Afternoon tea with Great British Bake Off illustrator Tom Hovey

What a treat to catch up with the talented Tom Hovey. Many of us are delighted to see GBBO back on our screens and appreciate the enticing illustrations. I was delighted to have the opportunity to ask Tom about these and his fabulous Shaun in the City sculpture - Star Bake!

Why did you choose to set up a studio in Stokes Croft and what makes the area special?

I moved to Victoria Park in South Bristol after 3 vears in London in 2013. I had been working from home for 18 months after moving back to Bristol and was starting to get cabin fever. I wanted a studio with a bit of a commute and I always loved the buzz of Stokes Croft so it was the obvious choice, plus I wanted to look cool by proxy.

How did you come to work on the most popular BBC programme - the GBBO? It was a case of right place, right time. I moved to London to seek fame and fortune but I had not organised a job to go to, so a friend managed to get me a job helping out in the edit for a new amateur baking show for the BBC. I was working in the edit suite with the Series Director and Editor when they mentioned that there was a visual element missing from the show and they were thinking of including some illustration. I said I could do it, pitched a few ideas and got the gig.

Is it true that in the six series that the show has run, you have never tasted any of the bakes? It is unfortunately true! Not one crumb in six years. a travesty!

Has it encouraged you to get baking? Working on the first series, I got really into baking bread; I bought a lot of different ingredients, but after spending the next few Sundays creating some awful bread. I decided that baking was a bit too much of a precise science for me. So my cupboards are still full of yeasts and tonnes of flour - all the gear and no idea!

Your work extends far beyond the GBBO; can you tell us about any of your other projects?

At the moment, I am elbow deep in delicious cakes and bakes as it is Bake Off season, which keeps me busy from June until December. I am now producing a lot of food illustration work – not just cakes – for a range of clients from editorial for publishing to branding for foodie businesses. However, as I have been a freelance illustrator for nearly a decade, I have a range of styles that I still use if the job needs it. My work for Glastonbury Festival Free Press for instance, working as on-site illustrator is very different stylistically, but just as fun to produce, It's nice to draw people sometimes too.

When not working what do you like to do? Do you have any favourite Bristol venues?

Um well my wife would tell you that I never take any time off while GBBO is on. I'm usually quieter



during the Winter and Spring so I take as much time as I can to hang out then. I've been going to gigs in the Academy since I was about 15 and it's still an amazing venue, Colston Hall is great too.

You kindly gave a talk to the Gloucester Road WI, how was that experience? It was great if not a little daunting as I was very aware that my knowledge of baking would be tested to the limit. But the Gloucester Rd WI ladies were very welcoming and even asked me to judge their very own Bake Off.

Are you surprised by the fantastic response your 'Star Bake' Shaun has received?

Of course it is fantastic to see so many people enjoying the Star Bake. Every time I have visited. there has been a queue of excited children. It's good to know that my Shaun will help raise money for a great local cause - The Grand Appeal.

How did you find designing the Shaun, did you have a clear vision from the start? Seeing as I spend a lot of my time illustrating food and more importantly cakes. I felt like it would be a great opportunity to design a sheep-shaped cake. I decided that creating a layered cake design based on the French pastry dessert, mille-feuille, would work well on the 3D sculpture, with layers of multi-coloured fruit, creams and pastry. I also incorporated swill rolls and cream buns for the ears. top of the head and tail, and legs, which gave the design a bit of balance alongside the busy body. I ultimately wanted to make it bold, bright and look good enough to eat and I think I achieved that.

If people would like to buy your prints, is there a local shop they can visit? Yes, you can find a selection of my prints at Room 212 just over the road from BTP in Bishopston.

Playing Out in Bishopston and Beyond...

Local residents have a chance to open up their streets for children to play freely and safely, and for neighbours of all ages to meet and get to know each other better. Lots of streets are already playing out in this area what about yours?

Gaby Solly is Playing Out's new local area activator for Bishopston, St Werburgh's and Montpelier and is on hand to support residents with advice, encouragement and free materials. Gaby can help guide you through the process from initial discussion with neighbours, to applying for permission from Bristol City Council to close your street temporarily to traffic, and planning your initial playing out session.

Nearly 100 Bristol streets have organised playing out sessions since 2011, when the council put in place the Temporary Play Street Order – a policy that allows residents to apply to use their streets regularly for play. Children in 'playing out' streets are enjoying the chance to play safely and freely, to make new friends and get to know their neighbourhood better. And adults are benefiting from the chance to meet their neighbours and build a stronger sense of community on the street. Neighbours volunteer to act as stewards during each playing out session to ensure children stay in the closure area and to divert through traffic.

With enthusiastic backing from the council and police, playing out is a great Bristol initiative that

is spreading through the city and to towns and cities across the UK. Gaby explains what happens on a typical session. "Streets come to life on playing out days when children can use the space



in their own way and choose their games and activities. We don't provide toys or play equipment other than chalks and a skipping rope so children can get really creative and will often bring out the things that they want to share with each other.

There is so much active play, races, hopscotch. skipping, scooting and many improvised games. Parents are responsible for their children just like on any other day but have a chance to chat to their neighbours, both young and old. People often say this makes their street feel safer and friendlier in the Iona term."

Saturday 12 September 2015 will be the ninth Party in the Park event at Golden Hill Sports and Social Club in Henleaze, After a record-breaking attendance last year with local resident celebrity Amy Willerton opening the day, the aim is that this year's event will be even bigger and better!

The day kicks off at 12 noon with something for everyone and runs on into the early evening. There will be over 30 stalls, an inflatable village, young children's rides, face painting, BBQ and fresh locally cooked curry, live music, an open mic area, brass band, displays from local dance and sports groups, a raffle, tea and cakes, licenced bar and this year there will be tethered hot air balloon rides! (restrictions apply). It is a fun day of family entertainment with something for everyone, no matter what age you are.

Party in the Park is a charity with a sound business plan whose aim is to raise money to cover not only the day-to-day running costs, bus also money that is re-invested in order to improve the services that it provides the local community.

Since starting, there has been investment in new netting, new covers for one of the squares, a new tractor and also investment in sports coaches to make sure they are qualified to the necessary standards.

Cricket at Golden Hill Sports continues to expand and there are five senior cricket

teams, five junior cricket teams, kwik cricket for vounger children as well as a successful women's and girls' cricket team (a massive achievement).

Football at Golden Hill has really developed well over the years with three adult sides as well as the Golden Hill Sonics for the youth section from U6s through to U15s.

Golden Hill Sports and Social Ground is a venue that serves the whole community, not only for sports but by bringing the community together socially. During the summer, community BBQs are held every month on a Friday (see website) with the last one of the year being Friday 4 September from 5 p.m. A relaxed event where parents and their children can relax and catch up. It is also available for hire for birthday parties and other social events.

Party in the Park is the charity's biggest source of income and it is a success through the continued support of the local community and local businesses. It is only through them that the charity was able to purchase the ground and ensure its longevity as a sports and community centre.





- Launch of the much-anticipated Cafe on the Common! This wonderful facility has been much-appreciated by local people over the summer months. The cafe is a social enterprise with all profits going back into improving the common for us all - brilliant!
- The installation of new bins!
- Significant steps forward with Project Ardagh - further details below.
- Partnership with Avon Wildlife Trust as part of their My Wild City Project - further details below.
- Successful community events, picnics, BBQs and Beach parties enjoyed by all. The next to look forward to is the Festival of Nature Event on Saturday 12 September 2015, filled with fun for all of the family.

Textures in the Garden

Over the coming year, the students will work with Unseen to lead a campaign about the issues around people trafficking uncovered in their films.




Local History Matters – Russell's Field of Cottages

BHA local history research - text by Denis Wright $\ensuremath{\mathbb{C}}$

In 1827, Edward Russell bought sub-leases on four fields belonging to Horfield Great Farm with the idea of building houses on two of them, Bynland and Horse Hill (tithe nos. 279 & 281).

Russell understood that there would be no difficulty in renewing his lease should the need arise, but by 1841 priorities had changed. Bishop Monk was now keen to sell the freehold of the entire Great Farm (including Russell's leases) in order to fund a bishop's palace for the newly formed diocese of Bristol and Gloucester.

Anthony Storey, lessee of the Great Farm, was keen to buy the entire freehold (including Russell's leases), partly out of sentiment, because it would allow him to "bring together again the recently scattered portions of an old estate", and partly because he reckoned that Horfield was just farmland and 'had no buildable land on it'. The only loser would be Edward Russell who had already 'laid out, from time to time, in building of hamlets and cottages, a considerable sum of money', and who now found that his lease would not be renewed.



Wade's Cottages stood on Gloucester Road just below the junction with Dongola Avenue.

same time and suddenly there were disagreements about who should be responsible for surveying the plan of Russell's Fields and how these fields should be valued. Russell was unwilling to lay out more money in a lost cause and Tucker was unwilling to carry out work that should have been done by Russell. There were even differences about the exact number of buildings. Russell estimated 'about forty little hamlets' while Tucker counted twenty-six houses 'of an inferior description' on Bynland, and thirty-six houses 'mostly of an inferior description' on Horse Hill. Neither field got surveyed properly in 1841.

Of the two fields, Horse Hill was the more developed. There was a broad strip of ground intended for villas, which fronted the highway and access at each end (now Nevil Road and Wesley Road) to the field behind. In the census of 1841, this field was called 'Russell's Field of Cottages', as though everybody recognised its distinctive layout, different from the usual houses all in a row. Russell himself talked about 'hamlets and cottages' as though the houses differed deliberately in size and design. Using Tucker's figures from 1841 and the known size of the field (almost 14 acres), we can see that each house had on average almost half an acre of ground. There were some obvious gaps still waiting to be filled but they had been waiting for some time.

The plan as we see it was made by the Ordnance Survey in 1881 but it reflects a state of development probably achieved forty years earlier. Sometime between OS1881 and OS1905, the field was redeveloped at a much greater density. We also know what these vanished houses looked like. A late-nineteenth century photograph of Wade's Cottages (occupied by a family called Wade in 1881) shows a house dating from the late-1820s, which once stood on the site of No. 309 Gloucester Road.







Benedict Cumberbatch and Apollo Astronauts...in a Bishopston Shed!

Benedict Cumberbatch, Chris Hadfield and Fred Haise are not the first names you associate with a shed in Bishopston, but they are all part of a new project created in a garden on Egerton Road.

Bishopston residents Andrew Glester and Ben Cowburn have created a podcast called 'The Cosmic Shed', which explores the point where science and storytelling meet.

"We moved to Bishopston last vear and there was a crumbling shed at the bottom of the garden. It was completely overrun with weeds so I had to do something with it". said Andrew Glester.

Rather than knock it down, Andrew and Ben fixed up the shed. painted the interior black, fitted a Japanese star projector and invited Laura Duncan, a biologist, along to record a pilot episode, which explored the science that inspired

Christopher Nolan's film Interstellar. Laura recorded an interview with UWE's Dr Erik Stengler for this first instalment, looking at the wormholes, time dilation and the fifth dimension of space-time.

The second episode includes an interview with Benedict Cumberbatch as they consider Alan Turing's work and the Imitation Game film.

"Benedict's passion for science really comes across. That was quite a coup for our second episode and then the opportunity to meet Fred Haise came along. Apollo 13 is a wonderful film and an amazing true story. To be able to sit and chat with an Apollo astronaut is a real honour", said Andrew.

Theoretical physicists who work on the Large Hadron Collider, NASA space scientists, authors and musicians have followed in recent episodes, but it's a forthcoming one which caused the most excitement on Egerton Road,

"Andy Day came to the shed this week. My daughter. Lyra (3), was beside herself with excitement. Andy's 'Dinosaur Adventures' is a favourite programme of ours so it was quite something to have a time traveller in our house and shed."

Andrew, Laura and Ben have plans to produce shows for as long as the shed stays in one piece and have had to make running repairs following the recent winds! They cover films, books, TV shows,



Sue Pickering of Creative **Bristol** investigates artwork reproduction with Horfield based small family business Mockingbird Press.

Hove the artistic culture of Bristol and can often be found at exhibitions and art trails around the city. If my budget was bigger I'd be buying lots of original artwork, Instead, I usually go for the more affordable option of a reproduction of the original, such as an unframed Giclée print or a greetings card.

Bristol-based Mockingbird Press specialise in the production of high quality reproductions of artwork. I spoke to owners, Bob and Sharon Antell about the processes involved and asked: what exactly is a 'Giclée print'?

Greetings

Card

Printing

I found out that Bob and Sharon are both artists and Bob worked as a graphic designer for many vears. Researching to find a reliable printing process for his own work led Bob to set up Mockingbird Press a decade ago.

The first part of the reproduction process involves the digital capture of the artwork.

Smaller two-dimensional pieces can be scanned, but larger threedimensional pieces are photographed. Mockingbird Press have a range of

tried and tested methods for doing this very successfully. Bob can either come to an artist's studio (especially if work is big or difficult to move) or the work can be brought to the Mockingbird Press studio. Then the images are edited to look as close to the original as possible.

Instead of charging for the initial set-up of artwork images separately.

Mockingbird Press only charges a unit price for items produced from this initial set-up (such as Giclée Prints, greetings cards and high-resolution digital images).

And what exactly is a Giclée print? The word giclée was adopted in 1991 by Jack Duganne,

a printmaker who wanted a name for the new type of prints being

produced on a new industrial inkiet printer adapted for fine-art printing. The word 'Giclée' is based on the French word gicleur, which means nozzle. So, Giclée prints are a very specific form of digital ink-jet print. The ink is extremely light-fast and a special kind of printer is used.



they have just acquired an A2 Giclée printer, increasing the range of print sizes available.

Mockingbird Press also supply greetings cards of different sizes and paper qualities. Each card comes ready packaged with an envelope in a cello bag and prices start from 85 pence per card (minimum order of 250 mixed cards).


Films, Fair and Lord Mayor Visit - Plenty of glamour at St Bon's!

Environmental Control of Pesky Parasites!

As much as we love our pets, we do not like it when they bring home little visitors. Fleas love warm weather and are also able to thrive in winter months in our homes due to central heating. We all know that fleas are pesky and really difficult to get under control, but do we fully understand the implications to our pets and their health?

So how do we get control of an outbreak of fleas? If we can clear our homes of fleas at the end of the season, we should be able to remain flea-free for the winter months, so now is the time to act.

Flea Facts - The first thing you need to know is that only 5% of fleas can actually be found on your pet; the other 95% are lurking as eggs, larvae and pupae living in your home. They live in carpets. cracks of wooden floors, cars, cat carriers and anywhere outdoors.

They are super breeders! One flea is able to become 1,000 fleas in 21 days! That's a lot of fleas

Eggs can lay dormant in your home for up to a year waiting to develop. They are stimulated to hatch by vibrations of pets and humans walking around. Mixed with warmth from summer, or central heating in the winter, which provides the right environment to breed.

Clinical Signs and Effects - Fleas can cause intense itching and scratching on your pet. Many dogs and cats are allergic to flea saliva and have an intense skin reaction to even only a single flea.

A large number of blood sucking fleas can cause anaemia, especially on puppies and kittens.

Tapeworm larvae can be carried by fleas and once ingested your pet can become infected.

A lot of people are also allergic to fleabites. You may notice small red itchy bites around the ankle area. They are generally harmless but if over itched may

get infected.

It is easy to tell if your cat or dog has fleas by looking for the tell-tale red/ brown specks of flea dirt in the coat and often you can spot a flea, particularly in the groin area.

Treatment – As well as treating the fleas on your pet, you need to treat the environment! Remember to include everywhere that your pet goes, for

example, carpets, wooden floors, soft furnishings, car boots and carry baskets.

Use a licensed product to ensure the problem is dealt with quickly. These come in spray form and usually give protection of the environment for up to 12 months. Effective household sprays can be purchased from veterinary practices.

Regular vacuuming and washing bedding can also help to reduce outbreaks.

Treat your pet with an effective prescription flea treatment from your vet and ensure that the flea treatment is applied at correct intervals. Gaps in treatments can lead to flea outbreaks.

New Hut 6388 is on its way!

After years of hard work and prolific fundraising, it is wonderful to see the new build of Hut 6388 is now well on its way, and set to re-open at the end of October!

The building project is being undertaken by South West Contractors (working with Emmett Russell architects) and Director Jon Ticehurst told me all is going well with the build. It took around 3 days to remove the asbestos from the old hut, 2 days to physically demolish it and a further few days to recycle all the various different materials. One of the biggest problems so far was uprooting the giant Sycamore stump! The scouts have kept sections of the tree to create seats, and several wood burners in Bishopston will be well fed over the winter months with the rest of the wood! Any trees that it was necessary to remove to enable the build will be replaced

When digging into the ground to lay the new foundations, the builders came across what they believe to be the remains of air raid shelters.

It was guite a thrill to watch the crane lowering the prefabricated wall panels into the hut framework. Jon said, with the weather on their side, the roof should be on by the end of August.

Scout leader Mike Evans is delighted with the progress so far and told me the hundreds of young people that use the facility weekly, can't wait to get into their new hut! Thankfully all sessions have been successfully re-homed, largely at St Bart's Church Hall for the interim.

The new building will see all the meetings room moved to the front with the kitchen and toilets, with a large hall space at the back. Some welcome further storage is being created on a second level. The improved hut will have 3 roof lights and large windows running down one side of the building, creating a lovely, light space.

News from our Bishopston & Redland Councillors



Last few days to hunt the Green Treasure – ends 15 September!

Take the Green treasure hunt and find the 5 themed pocket plazas around the neighbourhood plus the extra hidden treasures around our area. There's an interactive map, geocaching, and leaflet available

in some local shops and cafes. These have been created by artist Chrissie Decker with a Green capital neighbourhood arts grant. Details are on www.greentreasure.net. See page 41.

Bristol North Baths / Bishopston Library

At the end of July scaffolding finally came down on the site as it nears completion (we hope). Thanks to the developer being able to access some fresh funding, this project was at the time of writing due to be completed by the end of August. We are keeping an overview of the progress.

Following the consultation on the future of our libraries, the proposals are now to keep all libraries open (apart from a proposal to relocate library facilities from Eastville into Lockleaze). At the time of writing, we are unsure of the proposed opening hours reduction for all of Bristol's libraries. Once this is clarified we look forward to discussions with groups in the area about how additional hours and services can be created to extend the core service well above 20 hours, and to diversify uses and activities in the new space in time for April, when the funding changes come into force. Please do get in touch with your Councillors if you have ideas for services and users who may want to make use of the facilities and space on a regular or occasional basis.

The Memorial Stadium

Bristol Rovers are continuing their appeal through the courts to get compensation for Sainsbury's not buying the Memorial ground. They lost their first high court battle but are proceeding further.

We are very aware that the future of the ground remains uncertain and is a cause

of concern for some local residents. We will be meeting resident groups in early September and are keen to hear your views generally. Obviously there are some hard financial pressures driving Rovers' decisions regarding the future of the site, but we are trying to make the argument for creative community input into whatever happens next.

Tim and Daniella have spoken to the Mayor, putting forward our views. The Mayor's office is setting up a meeting for us to meet the club, with the Mayor. We will report back on that in due course.

Micro Pub application - 447 Gloucester Rd

At the time of writing we are anticipating an application any day for an independent micro pub at the North end of Gloucester Road. Gloucester Road falls within a 'cumulative impact area' – which means that typically we do not support applications for more pubs or extensions to drinking hours. However the ethos, principles and intention of this application seem quite in keeping with Gloucester Road, and therefore we particularly welcome your views and comments on this application.

Parks

Plans are now firming up around the long awaited build out on Effingham Road by the gates of St Andrews Park. Long ago concerns were raised by a number of park users around the safety of the crossing and funded was found via the Neighbourhood Partnership for this. There are a few concerns from local residents around details to be ironed out, but we should see some building work soon. If you have any ideas for improving the streets near you then let Martin or Fi know and take a look at the Council website www.trafficchoices.co.uk.

On another park related note, you may recall some consultation late last year around changes to parks maintenance in Bristol. The results have been published and it rather looks as though the net result is that some areas of grass may be left long to encourage wildlife and potentially grass may be cut on a more regular basis. Martin and Fi have been in touch with Parks to confirm that this means that our heroic park keeper Mickey will therefore be with us for the foreseeable future in St Andrew's Park.

Speedwatch

If you're worried about speeding in your road, or the local area, the police do run community speedwatch

sessions, please contact David Said (david.said@ avonandsomerset.police.uk) for details. You can learn how to check vehicle speeds with a pocket radar device which is valuable evidence for traffic calming. It can also lead to warning letters and checks on speeding vehicles. After receiving basic training you can then organise your own community speedwatch sessions, and the data you gather can be useful for the highways officers to identify potential trouble spots.

A couple of recent speedwatches have taken place on Ashley Down Road both during the day and in the evening. There have been two serious collisions on the road recently and although we have a 20 mph activation sign we are looking to do more speedwatches and talking with highways officers about how we can make it safer.

Arches toilets

The appearance of these has once again deteriorated to an unacceptable degree, and Council officers have served a notice on the owners to get rid of the tagging which should hopefully improve matters. You may have noticed that they are currently for sale, so lets hope that they are bought by someone prepared to cherish them.

Residents parking

As we write there is still no news on the outcome of the 6 month review of the Redland parking scheme. Whilst this particular consultation is closed, Martin and Fi are still eager to hear your opinions on the current scheme or your thoughts on any future ones wanted (or not) in other streets in Redland as this will help inform any future plans after the next Mayoral elections.

As the scheme takes effect in Redland and Montpelier we are interested in how you feel parking affects you in Bishopston/St Andrews. If you would like a residents parking zone for your street please e-mail respark@bristol.gov.uk as the council is gathering evidence on people's opinions.

Student Charity Scheme

British Heart Foundation collection points. You may have seen the big red BHF bins dotted around the streets of Bishopston and Redland. This was the second year they were installed in an attempt to encourage departing students to donate their unwanted items rather than leave them behind as refuse. Last year this project raised over £220,000 which is fantastic - however this year their use was so enthusiastic that there were some overfilled bins. Martin and Fi asked the organisers to ensure that they are emptied more frequently and we'll let you

know how much they raise this year. To put all the possessions to use again there will be a massive charity shop (in Bristol Student Union) at the start of the new term to sell it all. Martin visited this last year and says it was very impressive - you could furnish and fill a house room by room from what was on offer!

New Energy Saving Group and Heatview project

Following the Green Capital local grant given to Bristol Friends of the Earth to create an infra red (heat) mapping tool for the neighbourhood, there was lots of progress while it was cold enough outside to take the images. This will resume in autumn

www.Heatview.co.uk is the new website which combines heat loss images of local streets across the neighbourhood, overlaid on traditional streetview images of homes from Google. It also signposts help and resources to save energy at home. The website currently shows streets already covered by thermal imaging.

We also welcome the new BCR Energy Group which is now building on this project and developing its work for residents through a new community-led energy group.

The next BCR energy group meeting will be at 8 pm on Tuesday 8 September at Horfield Friends Meeting House, 300 Gloucester Road.

There will be talks including the new local advice website from the founder of Bristol Green Doors and an energy saving jigsaw puzzle activity. Please contact **info.bcrenergy@gmail.com** to give an idea of numbers and to get further information about the meeting.

Secondary Schools Strategy for the Area – an update

Ian Bell, Bristol Council's placement planning manager, attended a recent Bishopston Forum, which focused on an important topic for local parents - provision of secondary school places.

Here is a summary:

What are the current pressures on school places?

About 7 years ago there was a big rise in the birth rate in Bristol leading to growth in school place requirement. The council initially tackled the gap in primary places, adding 12,000 places across the city. Those children are now moving towards secondary school, which is the new focus for the council.

As well as the increased birth rate, Bristol schools are improving – 84% of secondary schools are now rated 'Good' or 'Excellent'. This means more children stay in Bristol for secondary schools - which is good news, but adds more pressure on places.

When will pressures start to affect secondary places?

On current estimates, there would be a shortage of Year 7 places across Bristol by September 2017. The council is creating a new strategy to cover this. Details will be published in the autumn and go to the cabinet for approval.

Why wasn't something done sooner?

Although the timing seems tight, councils can't secure funds to create new places until shortly before a gap is due to have an effect. They cannot build new classrooms and leave them empty waiting for pupils to fill them.

The key aim of the schools strategy is to ensure a sufficient supply of school places in each area. The strategy will try to ensure that the most popular schools can cover demand - though this cannot be guaranteed. The school team also works to raise standards of less popular local schools - to make them a more attractive option.

How will this affect Bishopston?

In this area the officers anticipate covering the increased need through expanding the capacities of existing secondary schools. They do not currently anticipate building new schools. This may be different in other areas of the city where existing provision cannot be expanded.

A complication and potential opportunity is the growth of Free Schools. These make it harder for the council to plan a city- or area-wide placement strategy - since councils no longer control where new schools are created. Increasingly

councils are coordinators rather than providers of schools. A group of parents could potentially set up a new school in the area and the council would work with them on that.

How can I find out what catchment area my child will be in?

You can access information on this year's placement and catchment distances on the council website. This is no guarantee of course for what happens the following year, but catchments don't typically move hugely.

How can I stay up to date with the council's secondary school strategy?

Your local councillors will publicise the new strategy when it goes out for consultation - and we encourage local parents to respond to the consultation and express your views. You can also visit the council website - www.bristol.gov.uk/ page/children-and-young-people/secondaryschool-admissions.






