It was a pleasure to witness Dale the Dalek creator Keith, along with Window Wanderland organiser Lucy Reeves, hand over a cheque to Community fundraiser Tamara Downes from CHSW.

Keith was keen to raise funds for this worthy charity as he knows first-hand about the wonderful work they carry out. Ten years ago, his nephew passed away at the Children's Hospice. Despite it being such a sad time for the family, the hospice was always a warm, wonderful place for them to visit.

Dale was created by Keith as his nephew loved Daleks. This year, a beach scene was set up in the front garden of Thornleigh Road, so Dale could have a holiday! People were encouraged to give a donation, then don their beachwear and have their photo taken in the deck chair - a local version of the ice bucket challenge!

When I asked Keith how he felt about raising £1.000, he told me he still couldn't believe it! He attributes a good deal of the success of the campaign to the involvement of Window Wanderland, which drew crowds of hundreds on the evening of the event.

Window Wanderland was a truly magical, creative trail; there was a wonderful sense of excitement and anticipation as you turned each corner to discover what delights the next road would bring. All ages were out together, laughing, talking and joining in



the fun. This event did exactly what it set out to achieve brighten a dark February evening. Lucy told me that raising this money for CHSW was, "the icing on the cake". From the very start.

she had wanted to raise funds for a charity and was delighted to collaborate with Keith. The masses that turned out to enjoy the window trail responded brilliantly to the beach scene, "It shows when people come together, good stuff happens!".

A sentiment that I couldn't agree with more, and one that Tamara from CHSW echoes: "We are always pleased when money has been raised for our charity by a community uniting and having a



great time. Window Wanderland has a real synergy with what we do. At the hospice our work is all about having fun and creating memories that will last."

When I asked Tamara what the money raised for CHSW meant, she replied, "It is fantastic. We look after 200 families at the local hospice and 100 bereaved families. We are virtually entirely reliant on donations to keep the hospice going."

I asked Keith if we would could look forward to a new imaginative scene being created in his front garden with Dale next winter? He enthusiastically responded with, "Oh yes, the question is what?".


GLOS RD CENTRAL

BABS - Boobs and Bottle Support: From April, KudaCan will be host to a new inclusive group for mums to gather, be supported and share experiences, regardless of their infant feeding choices.

BABS is about offering a non-judgmental space for mums to get support whether they are breastfeeding, bottle-feeding or combination feeding. Each has it's own challenges. Then when solid food is brought into the mix, that introduces a whole other dimension of challenges.

KudaCan owner, Pegah Esmalili is a trained Breast-feeding Peer Support Worker, and having experience with both bottle and breast-feeding. is passionate about building a strong group that supports every feeding choice.

The group will be run by trained Breast-feeding Peer Support Workers, and as with all community groups that meet at KudaCan, entry is just £1 per family. Full details are available on the KudaCan website.

The growing KudaFamily: The launch of the Positive Feeding Movement is one of the many ways KudaCan has responded to their customer needs. Pegah told me. "We are committed to listening to our community to see what else we can do to assist the

daily life of local families. Also from community feedback,



offering breakfast, after school and holiday clubs for school-aged children, has been very well received. The venue is Ofsted registered with a dedicated team of staff. KudaCan offers something unique, partnering with the best kids entertainers and reputable organisations such as NCT (The UK's largest charity for parents).

Pegah previously worked as a senior manager for a large pharmaceutical business. She told me running KudaCan is a life choice, "I believe in what I do. Watching families grow and multiply brings me so much joy. We enjoy getting to know our visitors and I hope that our visitors enjoy our warm, welcoming environment." Whilst I was sat with Pegah several children came to say hello to her. A lovely KudaFamily has been created, that always welcomes new visitors.







The Royal Voluntary Service (RVS) has been around for over 75 years, but with a brand new hub in Bristol we aim to make a real difference to the lives of older people in the area.

We now have an office in the city centre and a Single Point of Access referral service linked to Bristol Royal Infirmary, which means we can provide a range of services to help older people (over 55) both while they are in hospital and at home.

With concerns in the news about pressures on A&E services locally and the rise in admissions (and delayed discharge), particularly of older people, we believe we can offer some simple solutions; by supporting patients on-ward we can get them home sooner, give them practical assistance when they first go home and then help them live to safely and independently in their own homes for longer. We know from research that this kind of support reduces the numbers of people who will have to be re-admitted to hospital, as well as relieving loneliness and anxiety.

Our trained volunteers can visit patients in hospital. assist them going home via our Home from Hospital service and offer befriending through our Good Neighbours scheme. We also have a new Home Library service, bringing books and a friendly visit to your door.

In order to offer help to as many people as we can across the city we need lots more volunteers, so if you have a few hours to spare every week please think about giving us your time (we provide full training and support). You can do something amazing to change lives here in Bristol.

Guy told me, "The baby boomer generation is not going to get old gracefully - it is going take retirement by the scruff of the neck and do it all completely differently". It is this view

How can you tell if your cat is happy?

This may seem a simple question but cats are adept at hiding their true feelings unless you know the signs to look for. We live in a city of increasing cat numbers and many multi-cat households.

Many of us have small gardens so the pressure on cats to maintain a territory is great. We also move house frequently and often introduce new members to the family. All of these events can be stressful to a cat and far from the way a cat would naturally live.

So what signs are there for a happy cat? A happy cat will carry his tail high and confidently often with a flick or guiver of the tip. His ears will be erect and his eyes wide. He will interact with his owners rubbing around their legs and cheek marking on their legs and the furniture. He will be content to lie on a lap, often purring and kneading when stroked. Happy cats are playful and kitten-like, they show interest in their environment and give a high pitched meow when playing. A contented relaxed cat may lie on his back with all four paws in the air. He will also have a healthy appetite and be well groomed.

An unhappy cat will also show some classic behavioural signs, often the opposite of the happy cat behaviour above. He will often hide away and not interact with his family. Less confident in movement, ears and tail low. The meow is commonly in a low pitch. Unhappy cats frequently over-groom and can make areas of themselves very bald and sometimes quite sore. Urinary problems are more frequently seen in stressed unhappy cats. Their coats can have a very moth eaten appearance.

Urine spraying and vertical scratching both suggest an insecure and unhappy cat, as well as getting into fights or being bullied. These cats may have low activity levels especially if they are reluctant to go out for fear of meeting an adversary. They may have reduced appetite or enthusiasm for food.

If you think your cat may be unhappy, what can you do to improve his life? It is not always easy to find out what is bothering your cat but frequently it is other cats in the area, territory disputes within or outside the house. In a multi cat household consider using separate feeding areas and litter trays. Use cat beds and resting places that are up high to give the cats a vantage point. Consider a curfew with neighbours cats, to allow territory sharing. If you have other cats coming into your home then you

may be interested in a microchip operated cat flap to keep all others out. If you are moving home or adding to your family we would recommend using a plug in pheromone diffuser; these work to reduce stress in many situations.

The University of the West of England's Arts, Creative Industries and Education faculty is working with volunteers from Bristol Parks Forum on a city-wide public engagement project as part of Bristol Green Capital 2015.

Bristol Parkhive is a collaborative exchange project between UWE Bristol and the Bristol Parks Forum (BPF), the umbrella organisation for Bristol's network of community and volunteer-led parks groups.

The project aims to highlight and support the work of Bristol parks volunteers, increasing their skills and capacity to innovate. It links up volunteers, the University and its students with live projects around parks and green spaces in Bristol to help improve and safeguard these 'green lungs' for the future.

Sam Thomson, Director of Civic and Cultural Engagement at UWE (and Chair of the Friends of Horfield Common) told me,

"Parks and green spaces are crucial for good health and wellbeing, and provide multiple social, economic and environmental benefits.

More than 83% of Bristol residents use their local park - meaning that Bristol's parks are the most used leisure facility in the city - and hundreds of Bristol residents volunteer their time to be involved in, fundraise for and manage improvements to their local parks.

But funding for parks is not statutory, meaning that nationwide - including across Bristol - parks are facing an uncertain future."

Bristol Parkhive will run throughout European Green Capital Year 2015, and aims to explore how UWE and BPF can work together effectively and sustainably to improve parks and green spaces across the city in 2015 and beyond.

In 2015, Bristol Parkhive will create:

A new digital photographic archive celebrating all of Bristol's parks and green spaces in our European Green Capital Year, 2015. All residents and visitors are invited to contribute photographs to the archive - whether they visit only once during the year, or use their local 42 park every day.

- A new App making all of Bristol's parks and green spaces (and the facilities they offer) easy to find - including travel information, links to events and activities and information about facilities.
- A series of 'showcase projects' which demonstrate how UWE staff and students from subject areas across the University can collaborate with Bristol Parks Forum members to achieve improved civic outcomes. This will develop a series of case-studies which can be used by other parks groups in the city and will also test approaches and examples of the ways in which we can continue to work together sustainably post-2015.

Bristol Parkhive will also deliver a programme of skills development activities for Bristol Parks Forum volunteers. These skills include training in activities and event organisation, fundraising, app and website development, the creation of new wildlife walks and trails, promotion and marketing enhancement using social media. This training

will be delivered by UWE Learning and Teaching Fellows, Academic and Technical Staff, masters and undergraduate students -all of whom are volunteering to share their skills and contribute to the work being undertaken by volunteers in Bristol's parks and green spaces.

In addition the project will also include an extensive








John Rutter is coming to Bristol for a Gala concert with the City of Bristol Choir

Our local second hand Bookshop, Books for Amnesty, recently received an amazing donation of collectable books. The donation, which is estimated to be worth about £2500 included over 150 beautiful leather bound classic books published by the Franklin Library and The Easton Press. Titles include works by James Joyce, Mark Twain, John Steinbeck and Franz Kafka among many others.

A shop volunteer told me, "The books are so beautiful – we are blown away by this generous donation."

The Franklin Library and The Easton Press are well known for their high quality 'collectable' books. Think the American version of The Folio Society. The books are fully leather bound, versions of classics in a variety of colours with gold gilt titles and decoration. The Easton Press is still going strong but The Franklin Library ceased production in 2000, so their books are only available on the secondhand market.

Books for Amnesty raises money for the human rights charity Amnesty International. The shop is run entirely by volunteers who are working hard to sort through the donated items. Those priced so far range from £3-£75. The cheaper ones are currently being sold in the shop and the more expensive titles are being sold online on Abe books, although if a customer sees a book they like online, they are welcome to get in touch with the shop to arrange to come and see it.

Memories of Horfield Common

It was wonderful to lose a few hours listening to local residents re-count their memories of Horfield Common.

The event was hosted at the Ardagh Sports Pavilion, as part of the Friends of Horfield Common's partnership with English Heritage's Heritage School Programme. Esme Griffiths, a Historian and recent graduate from UWE is working with FOHC volunteers and other local organisations to produce new interpretation materials, which will make the history of Horfield Common, and the local community that surrounds it, visible in new ways.

I had the pleasure of joining some of the informal discussions. I enjoyed a long chat with Stan Sims (born 1935), who grew

up on Horfield Council Estate. He can remember playing on Manor Farm when it was a working farm. Where the Sports Centre stands today, used to be an army shed. Stan and his mischievous chums would get over the large wall, pick up ammunition, then when at home, place it in tubes and bash it with a hammer and nail to fire it off down the street!


Near where the play area is situated now (opposite Tesco Golden Hill), stood a house referred to as 'Horfield Castle'; although never a castle, it had turret like features. The house was demolished around 1950 but remains of the castle features were present for years. Michael Hampton and Mike France can both remember playing in the old stone remains, "It was our own castle, a true adventure play ground."

Robin and Maureen Wooten have lived near Horfield Parish Church for 62 years. When Robin was 11, he can remember his family being allocated a section of the common to grow vegetables (close to where the tennis courts stand now). The whole of the common was used during the war to 'Dig for Victory'! Viewing the slopes of green now, it is hard to imagine this green space transformed to allotments.

Robin recalls no equipment or assistance was provided, his father and him simply had to get a shovel and dig up the land. Their family grew potatoes, cabbage, carrots, parsnips, peas and beans.

He recalls there was a great deal of camaraderie. people helped each other, there was a great sense of community.

Mrs Sheila Good has lived on Hughenden Road for 46 years. She recounted a lovely story relating to



Sheila thinks there were 10-12 fires each year; groups of neighbours and children would come together for a great evening.

More great stuff on the Common!

The Friends of Horfield Common have received confirmation that two of their recent funding applications to the Bishopston, Cotham and Redland Neighbourhood Partnership have been successful.

Funding has been granted to install a new ponddipping platform and two simple wooden steps, which will make the pond much more accessible for everyone. And funding to enable the Horfield Common Edible Garden project to pay for a tool storage shed and plants/consumables has also been passed. This will enable the volunteers working on it to make great progress this year!



The Bishopston Society was established in 2002 in response to local people's concerns about houses being built in rear gardens. After all, much of the special character of the area comes from the large gardens in many streets and the sense of calm and harmony which results. The Society's mission statement is to promote high standards of planning and architecture and to challenge planning applications which are thought to be detrimental to the area. We hold two public meetings every year when guest speakers are invited to 'hold forth' on topics which relate to the local area. We also publish two newsletters annually with a variety of articles about life in Bishopston and the history of the area. However, the resources of the committee are strictly limited and there is an opportunity for new faces to make a contribution. If you would like to become a member or would like to join us in our efforts then please take a look at our website and feel free to make contact with us.

On the planning front there are two recent planning applications which demonstrate current pressures on the area:

NEW WETHERSPOONS PUB AT 349-353 GLOUCESTER ROAD - Wetherspoons lodged an application in 2014 to open one of their large late night drinking establishments next door to the former Bet Fred betting shop at 349-353 Gloucester Road. This application received a considerable number of objections, not only from residents but also from local councillors. The main concern expressed was that this application marked the first really large alcohol outlet on the Gloucester Road, on a scale normally associated with the city centre, and that the public nuisance and antisocial behaviour normally associated with such premises is totally incompatible with Bishopston, which is predominantly a family area. To our relief, the application was withdrawn.

Unfortunately, this was not the end of the matter and a second application was submitted in the early part of this year with the unwelcome addition of a 2217 sq. ft. open terrace to the rear of the premises, which heightens the concern about noise and disruption, particularly for those local residents unfortunate enough to be living nearby. The Bishopston Society puts a considerable effort into monitoring and opposing licencing applications on the Gloucester Road, which has been designated as a CIA (Cumulative Impact Area) specifically at the behest

of the police, so that the overall impact of licencing applications on the quality of life within Bishopston can be monitored and further applications controlled where appropriate. In practice, we have been greatly disappointed to find that almost every application over the last 3-4 year period has been passed. The result of this loose approach to licensing is the on going 'alcoholisation' of the Gloucester Road, which is becoming more and more like the Whiteladies Road in Clifton, with all its attendant problems of public disorder and litter.

The Bishopston Society feels very strongly that this is not the future we want for our area.

NEW HOUSES WITHIN THE GARDEN OF 29 SEYMOUR ROAD - The four planning applications to build houses within the rear garden of this Georgian villa in Seymour Road clearly demonstrate the intense pressure Bishopston is under to develop any available plot of land, regardless of the impact on local residents. The first application was for 5 flat roofed and heavily overglazed small terraced houses in a style which can best be described as 'industrial' and in blatant contempt of the historic character of the main house. This was roundly refused only to be followed by two further applications for the same 5 houses (clad with a more domestic treatment) and then for 4 houses, both of which were refused on numerous grounds including over development, overlooking. overshadowing, design incompatible with an historic building etc. However, in February a fourth scheme for 3 larger houses was granted permission by the planning committee by 5 votes to 4, with three abstentions. Whilst being an improvement on the first three applications, it was still far from ideal and will have a considerable impact on the immediate neighbours by way of development right up to the boundary (much higher than the existing garden walls) and general over development of the space available. It is disappointing that even when a large number of perfectly reasonable objections are raised to certain planning applications, the local planning process is rarely able to influence the design to produce a satisfactory outcome.

The Society is very concerned about the increasing pressure on the area and the frequent lack of respect both for the history of Bishopston and for the interests of residents.

Onwards to Trafalgar Square, where a choir entertained us - then down into Whitehall, past Field-Marshalls and Viscounts, the Cenotaph and Downing Street - closed for the day! Into Parliament Square - much drumming, dancing and jollity - relief for the Demonstration. Solar panels, wind turbines and insulation for our buildings are a must. Paris at the end of the year, where treaties have failed before. Can China and the USA agree? Asia and Africa have become short of water and food and migrants ponder.

We must play our part. 'Keep the coal in the hole' and disinvest from deep oil extraction. A placard warned - Baked Alaska! We must keep the global temperature rise to under 2 degrees. Planet Earth is changing.

Meeting with St Andrew's resident

- Stephen Williams

It was interesting to meet with local resident Stephen Williams, our Liberal Democrat MP for Bristol West, in his Bishopston based offices.

When did you first come to Bristol?

I first came to Bristol in 1985 to study history at university and have never left! I have lived in various locations across the city and am now pleased to call St Andrews my home.

How do you spread your time between London and Bristol?

I stay in London Monday to Thursday but Bristol is home. I think living within your constituency and not being a visitor is an important part of doing the job well. Numerous people approach me to discuss what is important to them on a weekly basis – as I am shopping or even on the treadmill at the gym!

What do you enjoy most about Gloucester Road?

I use Gloucester Road for leisure. Books For Amnesty is a favourite of mine and I am a regular at Mad About Sarnies, they know my two favourite fillings! Our team regularly frequent the Prince of Wales, Flyer or the Sports Man for a game of pool and pizza. When my mother visits, we have a full tour of all of the charity shops!

2015 marks your tenth year serving as our MP, what are you most proud of achieving in that time nationally?

Tobacco control is my oldest political interest and through persistent campaigning. I feel we have taken big strides forward. My father died of a respiratory illness when I was 13 and he was just 42. During my first year as an MP, I was appointed as the Liberal Democrat public health spokesperson. I worked hard to bring about the ban of smoking in public places in 2007. In recognition of this work, it was an honour to receive an award from Cancer Research UK for my advocacy of a full smoking ban in public places, and to be awarded a WHO award for outstanding contributions to tobacco control.


Since the smoking ban in public places, we have continued to work for further restrictions, and are pleased that the ban on smoking in cars with children will come into play this October. Last week I voted to support the standardised plain packaging.

I led the campaign for the Lib Dems for two years, on the passing of law for same sex marriage. Something I would like to take advantage of myself, but am still looking!

And on a more local level?

I am proud of making a difference to Bristol schools. There is a big divide in education from people in poor to more privileged backgrounds.

I am passionate about making sure children aren't left



It was moving to visit a school in Easton recently and observe members of the school orchestra playing the cello and oboe; every child now has the opportunity to play an instrument. I think in five to ten years' time, this will be seen as the best social legacy our government has left.

Three local council positions previously held by Lib Dems have now seen Green Councillors elected. What would you say to try and win local people back?

The Greens are not the only party to care and take action on environmental issues. If you vote for a party that is in government, we can get things done. For instance, I am working hard to re-instate local rail. A dual track between Temple Meads and Parkway will have a local station re-instated (hopefully at the bottom of Station Road, Ashley Down). I am badgering the government to get this confirmed.

Bristol as European City 2015 is a great accolade for the council, but they needed budget. I was able to persuade the treasury to allocate seven million. When I secured the funding, I was clear that I would like to see this money spent on tangible things that will have long-term environmental benefits to the

Bloodhound sets students' interest in engineering soaring

A team of British engineers is aiming to smash the land-speed record by building a supersonic car that will travel at 1,000mph, beating the current record by nearly 250mph. Bloodhound is one of several schemes that aims to interest schoolchildren in engineering by using its educational materials and data in the classroom. Local History Matters - Horfield resident Mary Hughes



Rose Cottage, otherwise known as late-Hughes's. one of 18 copyhold estates in Horfield

The house now called 'Rose Cottage', standing near the top of Wellington Hill West, was once part of a farmstead belonging to Horfield manor. The present house probably dates from the late-17th/ early-18th centuries but the site is medieval.

Like other properties in Horfield, 'Rose Cottage' was also known, according to custom, by the name of its current tenant, hence 'Hughes's' for Richard Hughes (1658-93). Widows were entitled by custom to shelter and a means of livelihood ('free bench') so long as they did not remarry. Mary Hughes lived on at Hughes's until her own death in 1700; but her name did not die with her. A new tenant usually meant a new farm name, but if the new tenant already owned property in Horfield, then the old name lived on, with one small change. Hughes's became late-Hughes's and remained so until enfranchisement in 1852. 'Meanwhile, the combined total of 60 acres, was run jointly from a property called 'The Quab' = marshy ground, reflecting its site below the source of Horfield brook.

Widows were not expected to take an active part in manorial business but Mary Hughes evidently did not know her place. At the Michaelmas court in 1693 she reminded the steward.

That no Tenant of this Manor having a wife living can surrender his Copyhold Tenament into the Lords hands for to defraud his wife of her widows estate therein without the consent of his wife.

Mary was willing 'to make Oath' that she had witnessed the consent of a wife to such a surrender in open court during the time of the steward's father. And yet, in spite of this precedent, Martha Wade of Filton was being deprived of her estate without her consent. Her husband, John Wade the elder, was not in court but John Wade junior, the beneficiary, was present. We know how the matter was dealt with only because the draft account of proceedings


(written in English) somehow survived. The official record (in Latin) simply omitted all reference to the

Mary Hughes widow did not find it necessary to hire an under-tenant to labour on her behalf. One year later, the jury recorded another of her interventions. It seemed that -

Cother Beasts of James Alleyns being impounded in the common pound by Mary Hughes widow for trespassing in her ground the said James Alleyn did break the pound and took out his beasts without the consent of the sd Mary Hughes and wee do fine him for the offence 3s.4d

The 'Beasts' were bulls or oxen and 'cother' meant that they were suffering from anthrax.

Richard Hughes first appeared in court records as an under-tenant. By the time of his will in March 1693 he was 'of Horfield Yeoman'. He and his wife were amongst the few copyhold tenants who actually lived in Horfield and both of them were buried in Horfield churchyard. Their marriage seems to have been childless. At least, no children were mentioned in Richard's will, whereas he gave 'to every of ye Children of my Cozen Evans twelve pound a piece'. Everything else, 'my goods Chetls and personall estate', went to his 'well beloved wife Mary'. She would not have expected her name to be remembered so long.

News on the new Bishopston Library & Medical Centre

It was of great interest to me meet with Chatsworth Homes' Kevin Batt, to have a tour around the Old North Bristol pool site, along with the new library and apartments. I am pleased to be able to share the progress of this much anticipated local project with you.

There is good momentum on the site. Starting in the Old baths - the hydrotherapy pool's balance tank (that keeps the water levels of the pool consistent as people enter and leave the pool) is now fully waterproof. Drainage has been installed and the pool floor concreted. The concrete surround has been poured and form work struck, so you can now see the whole construction and the overall size. Kevin and I both agreed the day the pool is filled with water will be one to celebrate!

Moving to the new build next door. The facade and cladding work outside is being finished off and the coloured render topcoats are progressing well.

Kevin explained that working on a grade 2 listed building alongside a new build, that is to reflect the old baths, was not without its challenges! But this was what made this project so interesting. The circular stair tower enclosure is now complete. It is a complicated construction built out of specially made curved bricks. Set amongst the lavers of bricks is beautiful bath stone, as used in the original baths building. The walls of the new building have been carefully constructed to ensure the lines

of bath stone perfectly match across the whole of the frontage. Kevin told me in order to resolve some building challenges of the new building, the team had been pleased to embrace some of the traditional building techniques and materials, used 100 years ago, before so much high technology was employed.

The impressive feature staircase in the new Bishopston library is installed and balustrades fitted.

This spirals round a centre metal tree that grows into a sun tube in the centre of the space. This tube will increase the natural light in the community venue. The sun tube has been created with 16 panels of 6 mm mirror acrylic. Kevin told me this material was perfect for the job - the same end result was created as with glass mirror, at a quarter of the weight.

The high level tower windows are being installed along with the stone work, that is being 'faced' in situ.



The flats above the library are being completed, with second fix items underway, soon ready to be decorated. I had the privilege of stepping out onto one of the new apartment's balcony to take in an impressive view of the much loved Gloucester

The new Bishopston Medical Centre, library and apartments are on target for completion this Spring.

Reporting improvements to Highways

The Tracker element to Traffic Choices (www. trafficchoices.co.uk) was launched recently. The Tracker system is an important development in the way Council officers deliver Highway schemes for the Neighbourhood Partnerships. It is designed to greatly improve communication with the public, and bring additional transparency to the process.

The system enables citizens to easily track the progress of Partnership highway schemes online, right from the stage where issues are reported to the City Council, through the discussion and design process, and finally onto construction and completion. It will show a detailed log of highway issues raised with the Council, plotted on the Pinpoint maps service. This should enable easier identification of problem areas within any Partnership.

Please use this system to report your road and highways issues – you will be able to see what is being done about your queries.

Street scene News

Litter - Great news! The streetscene team now has public liability insurance thanks to the negotiating skills of one of its members. This makes it possible for volunteers to carry out work around our wards. They have been doing lots of litter clearance over February before the vegetation starts growing again, and are working on some novel ideas to encourage people to use bins.

Waste - Please put the number of your house on your bin. You can get bin stickers from local hardware shops. Please report missed waste collections, litter etc. to the following e-mail address: customer.services@bristol.gov.uk or use this link to report it directly http://www.bristol.gov.uk/page/bins-recycling-and-street-cleaning/street-care-and-cleaning. Daniella is particularly keen to hear of how the waste collection service is performing, now it is in her portfolio.

Flooding on Station Lane

Station lane lies just beyond our boundary, and we have been working with Councillors from Lockleaze to get the drainage sorted out as it is a key route to Fairfield school. The Council have now done

some survey work and will think of a way to improve drainage.

Planning

Lidl Muller Road - There have been some delays to the LiDL Muller Road application.

Gloucestershire County Cricket Club Floodlight Application - The Council Planning Committee agreed to defer the decision on the floodlights in order to further explore alternative options. Daniella spoke at the meeting to ask for controls to be put on the use of the floodlights to safeguard the amenity of residents. Both Tim and Daniella support the idea of floodlights, and having international cricket in our ward.

Residents who spoke at the meeting expressed concern about the visual impact of the lights, the light spill and the inadequate planning conditions proposed, resulting in late night matches with associated noise and nuisance. The committee members were concerned by the size of the lights (45m) and their visual impact on the city as well as residents' concerns.

Wetherspoons - Wetherspoons have reapplied for planning permission to open a pub at the old news and booze site on Gloucester Road.

Parking

Pavement Parking - There have been many complaints about blocked pavements and parking on verges. This can also include trade waste and household bins. Council officers have been asked to advise on what options there are to deal with this.

RPZ - The new Redland and Cotham North Residents' schemes have been in place since August 2014. Redland councillors are now compiling issues that can be dealt with in the 6 monthly review so please do feed in suggestions in writing to the RPZ team with copies to us. There is a possibility of scheme extensions for some streets now affected by commuter parking around the edge of the zone if residents request this, though this would be limited to streets in the original proposed area at this stage.

This does not include streets around Claremont Avenue and Elton Road however, as they were not in the zones approved by Cabinet previously. Residents there will therefore have to make their views known (either way) to the council by e-mail to respark@bristol.gov.uk, or the Neighbourhood Partnership and copy in local councillors if they want to make a case.

Martin has also taken up the issue of allotment holders living outside the zone where they have their plots and proposals are being drawn up for them and Jon Toy of the Council is working on this issue as the current system is not helpful for allotment holders.

Bristol North Baths redevelopment update

Although we had previously reported a completion date of 28 February you will have noticed that date passing and the scaffolding still in place. We will not be giving you a new date, but are hoping for a May completion.

Bus Changes

Some major bus routes through our area have been changed.

Service 70/71 (Bristol Temple Meads – UWE):

The timetables are being adjusted with an extra bus being added to improve the punctuality and reliability.

Service 72 (Centre – UWE): The route that buses take is changing. Following the opening of the Romney Avenue Bus Link, we will use that rather than having to divert via Filton Avenue, Station Road, Filton Road and Coldharbour Lane. The punctuality and reliability of buses is expected to improve as a result.

Service 73/X73 (Centre – Cribbs Causeway / Aztec West): The timetables are being changed to improve punctuality and reliability. There will also be

two route changes affecting both the buses in the city centre and in the north of the city.

All buses will start and terminate at Lewins Mead instead of Colston Avenue to reduce the likelihood of them being caught in congestion around the centre, and enable all driver changes to be completed at the end of a journey (rather than partway through).

Two extra vehicles will be used; this will mean that the frequency of Monday to Friday peak-time journeys on Service 73 can be improved (to every 12–15 minutes). This should avoid the need for journeys to be cancelled, or cut short due to excessive late running because of congestion. The evening timetable is being overhauled to make it more punctual and reliable.

Service 75 (Hengrove – Cribbs Causeway) and Service 76 (Hengrove – Cribbs Causeway): The timetables are being overhauled to improve the punctuality and reliability. Four additional vehicles will be used to resolve the ongoing issues with traffic congestion and to provide more recovery time for vehicles. There will be extra early evening journeys to respond to customer demand. There will also be significant improvements to the Sunday and Public Holiday timetable: there will be a bus every 20 minutes on each route, meaning that on combined sections of route, buses will run every 10 minutes (compared with every 15 minutes at present).

Service 76 will operate 24/7 as per Service 75.

The addition of Service 76 to the night bus network means that parts of Hartcliffe and Headley Park will have access to them for the first time. It also means that there will be a 24 h service to and from Southmead Hospital.




