Community music with SENDaWelcome



Community music has long been acknowledged for its ability to bring people together. As a creative practice, t does what it says on the tin: it builds a community through improvising, creating and performing music

together. From speaking to parents of children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), we know that this feeling of community is very much absent for many teenagers with SEND in our corner of Bristol.

"My daughter was diagnosed as autistic aged 15." one local parent told us. "She really wanted to meet other girls she had experiences in common with and who would accept her for who she was, but couldn't find any structured support or groups available for teenagers like her. She found it patronising that she was directed to groups that were really for younger children. It would be so great if other teens didn't have to struggle in the way she did to get support."

It's a view that's shared by another local mum. "My 11-year-old daughter is a very social child and loves trying new things," she says. "She deserves the chance to develop her skills and confidence as she goes through her teenage years, just as any child

With this in mind, SENDaWelcome is launching a project specifically for young people aged between 11 and 15. Professional musicians Tara Baggott and Tony Gordon from Bristol band The Rin Tins will be leading six accessible music workshops aimed at young people with learning disabilities. You don't need any musical experience to join, just an interest in making music, learning new skills and meeting other young people from their community. Kids will be able to try out a selection of instruments including drums, bass, acoustic guitar, electric guitar, ukulele, keyboard and percussion.

Tara will be drawing on her work over the past five years with ground-breaking organisations *Drake* Music and OpenUp Music, running workshops and developing orchestras in specialist settings. She also plays and teaches piano, guitar, recorder, ukulele and singing, and is currently learning to play drums. In his 15 years as a musician, Tony, meanwhile, has squeezed in a degree in Contemporary Popular Music, a stint as the bassist and vocalist with critically acclaimed band Bastille, as well as teaching music and running his own music workshops for elderly people with dementia through an organisation called Musica.

These music sessions will be running through October and November culminating in a possible performance on 17 November. Places are limited to 10 young people so please contact SENDaWelcome to book your place.

YES CHEF!

We are pleased to share with vou below. the positive experiences of young Ashley Down resident Harry Caldwell. who once again entered Bristol's Young Cook of the year competition. Harry is 13 years old and attends Orchard School.

We salute his determination and passion for food, he is certainly a cheffing talent to watch out for in the future.

Last year I entered the Young chef awards and came second with my Japanese tuna salad and mango sticky rice. I then went on to try in the competition again this year.

I chose Paella following a trip to Spain because many years ago my mum went to a beach and watched a man cook paella. On this recent trip we were astounded to find that the same man is still cooking paella on the same beach! I ate some and thought it was so delicious and that I wanted to learn how to cook it myself.

Leading up to the competition I went to see David from El Colamado on Gloucester Road. He was a good teacher sharing some of his recipe secrets with me! He told me the best paella has a slightly burnt part at the bottom which gives it a smoked flavour. He also told me the rice is the hardest part to get right.

On the day of the competition I was feeling calm and relaxed. It was different as I had been practicing on an induction hob and I had a gas stove. I did well and I was proud of the dish in the end. I was relieved to find out that I had got through to the final!

As finalists we were invited to go to a wholesale greengrocer's where the workers get up at 2am and work very hard. I got to see the many fruits and vegetables that come from local farms and are distributed around Bristol.

I also visited a pizza restaurant where I learnt how to make fresh pizza in a pizza oven and I made a mocha using an industrial coffee machine.

The final was in a big kitchen with food from the wholesale greengrocer's waiting for us to use. I was calm but there was a tense atmosphere in



slight adaptations to my dessert following feedback from the judges in the semifinal. I was pleased with my Paella and Fruit crunch dessert. I didn't win but it was a great experience. It wasn't even over once the results were shared because

that night we were invited to assist chefs from the Square Food Foundation in The Station who were cooking for some V.I.Ps. I got to try some foods I'd never had before including eel, chicken liver and trout. It was a great experience in working in catering and possibly the most inspiring.

The Young chef awards have not seen the last of me I'll be back again next year – perhaps with some fresh pasta which beat me both times!







that engagement with ACT and consultation about this decision had not been adequate. Thank you very much to all of our local Councillors who







It probably will come as no surprise that Gloucester Road is one of the most polluted places in Bristol and, with eight air quality monitors positioned along the stretch, the news is that Bishopston is frequently over the acceptable air quality recommendation - notable hot spots being down by the Arches and by Bishopston Library.


So, what can we do as individuals? Clean Air Bishopston has begun with a pledge scheme. whereby you – as a local business or resident – are invited to make a pledge to change a behaviour that may in turn help improve local air quality with the added benefit of improving your health and wellbeing. Pledges to date include people committing to cycling more, turning off the engine when making a delivery, planting more greenery to absorb pollution, walking to work when they can, shopping locally and not leaving their engines running. The more of us who pledge, the more significant the impact can be.



French Bulldog knocks Labrador off the top spot!

For the first time, French Bulldogs have overtaken Labradors as the UKs most registered breed. In the last 10 years, the French Bulldog has increased in numbers

by 2964%. And this figure only includes those dogs that are registered with Kennel Club! Their numbers increased by 44% in 2016 alone. At the Animal Health Centre, I have seen this rise in popularity and we are definitely seeing more of these types of dogs through our door.

What is a French Bulldog? The French Bulldog is a brachycephalic, utility breed. It is derived partly from the UK, when Toy Bulldogs were taken over from England to Northern France due to emigration. It is thought that some crosses were made to other short faced breeds and, after three decades, a new breed known as the French Bulldog had evolved. In 1906 the Kennel Club gave official recognition to the breed.

What is a brachycephalic dog? These are dogs that are bred to have shorter muzzles or flat faces. Their genetics make their skulls grow wider and shorter. This characteristic can be greatly exaggerated; with the most pronounced being Pugs and French Bulldogs.

Why are they so popular? People find their big eyes and wide faces very cute and endearing. They are small, companion dogs with short coats and suited to small walks. However, there is more to these fashionable Frenchies than just a squashed face....

Are there health problems to be aware about? Unfortunately, these breeds do have more than their fair share of health problems. And these problems begin even before the puppy has entered the world! That is because these dogs struggle to give birth naturally. This is due to the wider face shape in proportion to the mum's birth canal.

Another problem is Brachycephalic Obstructive Airway Syndrome (BOAS). Some dogs with flat faces struggle to breathe properly and make snorting noises because of their restricted airway. This leads to a difficulty to cool down and they are unable to exercise normally. In some dogs it can be so bad that they retch and regurgitate stomach contents.

Skin problems are also common. Allergies and folded skin make these dogs prone to itching and infections: especially skin fold dermatitis around the muzzle, vulva and tail.

Bulging eyes due to shallow eye sockets also mean

that these dogs cannot blink properly and so are at risk of eve ulceration.

These breeds can also be prone to spinal problems if they have oddly shaped vertebrae in the spinal column.



All these health problems often mean that an owner of a brachycephalic breed has to spend more time and money at the vets. Insurance companies are aware of the above health conditions and so their fees will be much higher. Due to their sudden popularity, it is a worry that puppy farms will start to produce more unhealthy dogs to meet demand. As a vet, I like to see well-bred, disease free dogs and it is sad to see dogs struggling with genetic problems. Therefore, before buying a dog, please do your research and choose a breed right for your lifestyle. Visit the Kennel Club website to research breeds, talk to dog owners and always buy from reputable breeders; such as one that is part of the Kennel Club's Assured Breeders Scheme.

Local History Matters

Seyer's Parsonage


In 1804, the Reverend Samuel Sever published a pamphlet on the Causes of Clerical Non-Residence. His main argument was that the major 'cause' of non-residence amongst the clergy was nothing more nor

less than a lack of parsonages. In 1810, Seyer was appointed to the curacy of Horfield and then, in 1813, to the perpetual curacy of Horfield (ie, curacy for life) with no mention of a parsonage in either case. The whole process, from pamphlet to slate roof, lasted for close on twenty years and involved the 'written consent' of people of a wide social status.

A typical example is the following (draft) letter written by Seyer in April 1823 to the Reverend Henry Hare, a copyholder of Horfield manor, who lived at Curtisknowle, near Totness, Devon, reminding him of what he had already signed up to a decade earlier.

I take the liberty of requesting your attention to the following statement. The Parish of Horfield in which I understand that vourself & Mrs Hare have an interest is without any Parsonage house to the great detriment of the inhabitants & I have been for several years endeavouring to procure a plot of ground fit for the purpose. I have at length prevailed on the Bishop & his lessee Mr Shadwell to mark out an acre of ground on the Common close to the churchyard I have taken great pains to procure the consent of the Commoners to this measure. Some years ago I wrote to Mr. Wm. Hare (your father Sir, as I believe) on this subject; and I have his answer now in my hand dated 14 April 1814 in which he gives his full consent; I shall have very great pleasure (he says) as far as my interest extends in acceding to your wishes with regard to two acres ('one' intended) from Horfield Common







being inclosed for the purpose of erecting a Parsonage house'. Allow me to add, that I have the written consent of all the Principal lessees and of the others, farmers in Horfield. I know that they tell me that they are desirous of having a resident minister & they will signify their Consent whenever I ask them. Under the Circumstances, my request is that you will signify your Consent (yourself & Mrs Hare) to the measure proposed, in any form of words which you may think proper with the signature also of a witness & send it to me in a letter by the Post; and for myself & my successors in this poor curacy I shall hold myself obliged.

One copyholder, Sophia Henderson of Camden Town, was an enthusiastic supporter of Seyer's work, wishing him 'success in his undertaking which she is convinced will be of great benefit to the Parish of Horfield'. Jane Smith, of Heath House, on the other hand, could only bring herself to write to a social inferior in the third person or perhaps through an intermediary:

Mrs Smythe's Comp'ts to Mr Seyer & informs him she can have no Objections to what the Landowners & the Lord of the Manor have consented to respecting the Glebe & Parsonage House.

Bishop Road do Swimmingly!

The swimming team at Bishop Road School have completed another successful year in the pool.

The team competed over six rounds of the local Percy Smith Gala League, ending up in a creditable fourth position, and also took part in three development galas organised by Bristol Penguins Swimming Club. However, the main successes were saved for the major competitions of the year.

Nine children made it through the highly competitive qualifying heats to represent the school in the final of the Bristol Schools' Swimming Championships, and across the individual events they claimed a total of four gold medals, four silver and one bronze. In addition, the girls' medley and freestyle relay teams both finished in first place, thereby earning a trophy for the school, and they also picked up the silverware for the overall girls' points trophy.

The final event was the inaugural canon relay, and a mixed team of boys and girls once again triumphed in a dramatic finish to make an overall haul of four of the seven trophies on offer.

Just two days later, the boys and girls relay teams travelled down to Millfield School in Somerset to take part in the south-west regional heats of the English Schools Primary Team Championships. Despite swimming superbly, the boys narrowly missed out on qualification for the national finals, but the girls became unofficial south-west champions by finishing first in both the medley and freestyle relays.

The finals were held at Ponds Forge swimming pool in Sheffield in mid-June against the top swimming schools in the country. In an elite-standard competition for this age group, the girls acquitted themselves superbly. recording their best times as a team and qualifying for the B final in both events where they finished 5th, and therefore 13th overall in the country. A superb achievement by this group of girls, and also the seventh year in succession that Bishop Road has been represented at this prestigious event. Well done to everyone who has represented the school at swimming at any level this year.

Always in the garden

Recently at Secret Garden, we've been creating gardens that can be used round the year. Often the garden space is only utilised in the warm summer months. It's great to be able to use the garden throughout the year, as it's a fun place to be with a different ambience in each season.

A garden is like a room in a house, but usually with more space. A garden is an ideal place for kids to play and to socialise with family and friends.

People are often put off from using their garden in the cooler and damper months, so why not adapt the garden around the weather.

One of the main features of a garden is having an attractive and comfortable place to sit down. Often this is a patio or deck. Both are hard surfaces, which are also good in wet weather. We often enhance a seating area by building a pergola above it. This provides an ideal frame for climbing plants and some shade in hotter months. Pergolas are also a good structure when it is wet, as retractable awnings can be attached and easily pulled down when it's raining.

In one Bristol garden, we built a timber structure that could be used all year. It had open sides with a wooden shingle roof, which meant it was water proof. The shingles have a lovely natural look that blend into most gardens. It was a cosy place to be that could be used for eating outside or for kids to be out of the house and play. In the summer evenings and cooler days, a chiminea was lit to warm up the room, even a wood burner could be used. A good thing with these structures and



rooms is that they are easy to modify, making them unique to each person.

When it is dark outside, it's nice to make a garden more inviting. Adding different types of lighting can highlight interesting plants and features. Lighting can allow more time to be spent socialising or even pottering around, looking at new plants growing or looking at night time wildlife.

Being in the garden throughout the year is fun, but not so much when it's wet. A seating area with a hard surface allows rain to run off, but a lawn can be messy and wet. Often we use artificial grass, which looks realistic and is practical. It doesn't need any maintenance and can be cut to fit into any shape. Its best feature is that it can be played on all year. When it is wet, the lawn won't get muddy, so it carries on looking good and kid's clothes won't be dirty.



Reading Matters

Interview with local author J.M. Monaco

Matters was pleased to catch up with local author J.M. Monaco in the run-up to the exciting release of her first novel How We Remember this September.

Bishopston

Is this your first book and what is it about?

This is my first novel. After delaying my creative writing since undergrad days. I decided to return to fiction and commit to a novel. Reflecting a tradition of US fiction that centres on dysfunctional families. it is a story of a family struggling to survive on its own terms. It is also a part coming-of-age, part retrospective narrative. Every family has its secrets and some have sibling rivalries. When Jo O'Brien returns home after her mother's death she is forced to confront both. An unexpected inheritance fans the flames of existing tensions between Jo and her brother, and it's their mother's long-forgotten diary that recalls the messy aftermath of an uncle's sexual advances towards Jo when she was a teenager. Like the diary, Jo's memory of events is full of gaps, but one thing is certain - she will never regain what was lost. How We Remember traces the effects of alcoholism, mental illness and abuse on one Irish-Italian-American, working-class family. RedDoor Publishing believes the novel will attract fans of Anne Tyler and Sylvia Brownrigg. Book clubs will love it for its probing possibilities.

How did you come up with the idea?

Early ideas were inspired after my own mother died and I was grieving, trying to make sense of complex family dynamics, their histories and secrets. This led me to ask what might happen to a family after the 'manager of family relationships' dies. I pondered about the nature of inheritances, not so much the financial sense (although this features in the book), but how children inherit their parents' histories and may adopt certain characteristics within the family. What emerged was a narrative about a middle-age female protagonist who is a failing academic and must come to terms with her mother's death while

also making decisions about her future relationship with her brother and father.

The main character has MS, do you have a link with this condition?

I was diagnosed with relapsing remitting MS in 2005 when my children were ages six and nine and I was right in the middle of a full-time PhD. It was an awful time that stopped me in my tracks and took a long time from which to recover. The main character of the novel is in her fifties and has secondary progressive MS. She's a childless academic who was successful but is later worn down by illness and increasing career demands. This aspect of her character, along with some other content that drives the narrative, is an example of a writer's experiment with the 'what if' scenario. I examined my own experience of MS (which has not progressed to secondary). I then imagined what a stressful academic working life in London would feel like for a woman like Jo who has secondary progressive MS and has to travel daily on the underground to work with fatigue, constant pain in her leg and a walking stick at her side keeping her upright.

There are many book clubs in Bishopston, will you be visiting any of them?

I have mentioned this possibility to a few contacts and would love to hear from any others who are interested in reading the novel and sharing their thoughts.

Are you having a book launch?

A launch date is booked with Waterstones, The Galleries, Broadmead, for Saturday evening 13 October, 2018, one month after publication (check website for details). All welcome. A reading is planned with Q and A and book signing over drinks.

Where can people purchase How We Remember?

How We Remember will be published on 13 September 2018. It is available to order or pre-order through RedDoor Publishing, Foyles, Waterstones and Amazon (UK and USA).

live music from local and national Cajun & Zydeco musicians, and there is a beginners' dance lesson at the start of each evening so that everyone who comes along can learn the basics. It's great fun, easy to learn, and very infectious, with waltzes, two-steps, jives and jitterbug dance steps and bluesy rhythms. You don't need a partner to come along, as it's very sociable, and everyone swaps dance partners during the evening. The "Cajun scene" is one of the best things about the music – we are a great group of friends, sharing the same passion.

Grace and myself made our first trip to Louisiana in April this year to experience Caiun and its sister Zydeco music in its homeland, and meet the musicians, eat the food and explore the bayous (swamps). We've hopefully brought back some of that Louisiana Cajun spice back to Bristol!

News from our Ashley, Bishopston & Redland Councillors

Bishopston ward news

20mph Consultation - The council has been consulting on the 20mph speed limits on roads across the city. The aim of the review is to identify whether any localised adjustments are needed to the 20mph speed limit in order to improve its effectiveness. It is not about whether 20mph limits should be in place at all. This is an approach that we support, as the evidence shows that 20mph has increased safety and generally made our area a nicer place to be a pedestrian or other road user.

The consultation, which closed on 31 August, sought to gather evidence to guide decisions around where to increase or decrease speed limits on particular roads. Whilst the concentration was on roads the council know are an issue for some people, there was the opportunity to discuss any road. The consultation also invited people to point out where additional calming measures or signage is needed to make 20mph work. The results are now being analysed and will be released soon.

Muller Road Transport Improvements -

Council officers have briefed us on their initial plans for sustainable transport improvements along Muller Road. The key aims are improved traffic flows, better bus infrastructure and an enhanced walking and cycling environment. Details aren't available at this stage as the plans are still being worked up, but there will be public consultation on them so watch this space!

Slim My Waste - Feed My Face - You've probably spotted the yellow tape on black bins across the city, and the faces that are appearing on peoples' brown food bins. It's all part of Slim My Waste - Feed My Face, a campaign by Bristol Waste to encourage people to recycle more food waste. Did you know that the average Bristol black wheelie bin is nearly a guarter filled with food? By slimming the amount of food waste that goes in your black bin, and instead feeding it to your brown bin, you can save the council money, feed a more sustainable power source, and help the environment. Look out for details posted through your letterbox about the campaign, or go to bristolwastecompany.co.uk to find out more.

Vehicle and Rough Sleeping Encampments Consultations – The council has also been consulting on its approach to managing vehicle dwelling and rough sleeping encampments in the city. The council has a duty of care to everyone living in the city and does not believe that sleeping on the streets or in a vehicle is a safe, long term option. There is a need to balance the needs of people who are in desperate circumstances with those who live or work near encampments. The proposals

involve unconditional offers of bed spaces 62 for those who have set up rough sleeping

encampments, supporting them towards a route off the street and ultimately into more permanent accommodation. It is important that we do not just displace the problem from one part of the city to another. The consultations closed on 26 August, and the results will be released soon.

Waste Collection Problems - Due to the stretch of hot weather in June and July, Bristol Waste experienced some disruptions in its collections. Their crews have been working hard to rectify the problems, and hopefully by the time you're reading this, the issues will be resolved. Crews will be starting at 6am in hot weather to get their rounds done before the midday heat, so do make sure your bins out early, or the night before. You can report a missed collection at bristol.gov.uk/bins-recycling/missed-bincollection, but if there are any outstanding problems then don't hesitate to get in touch with us.

Redland ward news

Sale of the Bristol North Baths building -

We've received the news that around seven offers were made on the old baths building, and that pending examination by the legal department, the process to sell should be well underway by September. Any profits from sale will be ring fenced for affordable housing across the city. Like many residents we're concerned that the bid selected, if based purely on maximum income, would end the option of community uses in the listed building. We challenged officers on what criteria would be used to assess the offers with a view to retaining some kind of community involvement but they are firmly of the view that the Library fulfils the community element of the overall project. The aim of the sale is therefore to maximise funds for affordable housing. This is a great disappointment to us as well as many people, we are sure.

Parking - Fi submitted a motion at the July full council pleading for some highways resource to help solve the increasingly hazardous parking problems in the area. We are sent photos almost daily of dangerous parking and obstructed roads and several local residents have now attended the Full Council themselves to address the Mayor on parking problems and to ask for council support to develop solutions. See https://bristolgreenparty.org.uk/news/ dangerous-parking

We believe residents are doing what they can and

having formed groups and attended public meetings. they are looking into their options for a safer, better managed street environment, but they can't be expected to come up with solutions on their own without some technical help.

As a follow up to addressing the Mayor, we were able to support a meeting for residents with the Cabinet member for transport to ensure their voices get heard. The good news is she says that after the various parking reviews of existing RPZs there will finally be officer support to work with residents in areas like ours from October onwards. This will be with a view to helping develop practical proposals for dealing with parking problems, which might involve various options including a possible parking permit scheme. The most notable finding from all the reviews of RPS areas across the city is how popular they have been (with traders, not just residents) and in two cases extended hours or an extra day have been requested. The 30 mins free parking for shop customers to pop in and buy items ensures a regular cycle of shoppers. Do keep us posted with any problems or ideas you may have.

Fly tipping and lack of enforcement -

Several people have contacted us about the lack of enforcement from the council over fly tipping, even where residents have clearly identified the offender. We're pushing for increased resource on this, as once again, we feel that residents are doing everything they can but aren't getting the right support from the Council, which is disheartening.

Libraries - The Mayor has confirmed that all existing libraries will continue to be funded until election year in 2020. In the short run, the reprieve is good news, although vet another community consultation is in the offing. The down side is that solutions to library developments and future plans are still uncertain, and we know some library users, supporters and staff are getting very frustrated by the prolonged process. We'll let you know of developments.

Brexit – We've had emails from a number of residents concerned about the impacts of Brexit on the city, its economy and institutions, and themselves.

The Future of the Ardagh Community **Asset Transfer** by Cllr Eleanor Combley

Like many local people, including the dedicated volunteers who put so many hours in at the Ardagh, I was delighted to hear that the whole site was going to be taken over by the Ardagh Community Trust and run for the good of the local community. It was therefore a blow when the Mayor and his Cabinet decided that six of the tennis courts on the site should instead be run by a private operator. This totally undermined the community group's business plan, which was to use the fees from the courts to support play for young people.

To rub salt into a wound, this decision seemed to have been made with very limited consultation with the local community. This is why I took the serious step of 'calling in' a decision made at Cabinet: asking a committee of councillors to review the way the decision was made and rule on whether it had been done properly.

As a Council, we really rely on the huge contribution of voluntary and community groups. As a city, we need people to get involved and work together to strengthen communities, combat isolation, and promote wellbeing. So as a City Council, we are shooting ourselves in the foot if we disrespect and disregard people when they do.

I am happy that the call-in committee agreed with me that the right thing to do was to ask Cabinet to pause this decision and to go back to working with the Ardagh Community Trust to come up with a plan which will benefit the whole site and the whole community. I know that the Mayor met with representatives of the Trust on a recent visit to the ward, and spoke openly with them about their plans for the site and how these would meet the needs of disadvantaged groups in the community. Hopefully, there is now a real opportunity to build on that conversation and create a facility rooted in the community, run by and for local people.

They have asked us to get the council to back a Ratification Referendum when the final deal is clearer. In July, at Full Council, Martin Seconded a motion calling for a 'People's Vote' on the final deal and spoke out about these concerns, and the impacts Brexit was already having on bodies like the Universities, access to funds and grants, and so on. The motion was debated but amended by Labour who removed any reference to a referendum so it just expressed concern at the process. See: https:// bristolgreenparty.org.uk/news/brexit-deal




