



91st Scout Group cheque presentation to the Bridge in Schools Project

Scouts all over the country are participating in a programme called A Million Hands; it's one way Scouts can take action locally to achieve their Community Impact Activity Badge. The programme centres on six national themes, including 'Better Mental Health for All', which was the theme the 91st Scout Group decided they would like to support.

Based at Horfield Baptist Church, the Scouts decided to fundraise for The Bridge Foundation, a local, long-established counselling and psychotherapy organisation. Bridge in Schools provides specialist mental health services and support for vulnerable children who are having mental health difficulties, across schools in and around Bristol.

The Scouts and Cubs participated in a wide range of activities, including a 500-mile sponsored walk, bakes sales and making keyrings to sell, to raise £1,000. Cathy Benjamin, Chair of the Bridge Foundation, was delighted to receive the cheque on behalf of the charity.

The funding will support the delivery of 1-2-1 child-focused, weekly, counselling sessions. Annie Hedges gave a short presentation of what the Scouts fundraising will help Bridge in Schools to achieve. She showed the children an example of a box of toys that accompany all children's counselling sessions. The money raised will ensure a further 50 boxes of toys can be purchased, in turn helping a further 50 children.

The boxes are central to the counselling session: last year Bridge in Schools delivered almost 2,500 individual sessions of support in schools and of all the children seen, 72% reported feeling better or much better. The schools also highly value the service. Recently the Headteacher at May Park commented: "The impact of BIS shines through into the everyday lives of the families that have been able to access support. We even have parents requesting the service. It's invaluable and we are so grateful to be able to offer it to our lovely families. Every school should have the Bridge Foundation in it! Thank you."



What an adventure this was! The two colonies of the 63rd Bristol Beaver Scouts enjoying two nights at the Lovell Centre at Woodhouse Park near Almondsbury. Forty 6 and 7 year-old girls and boys were away from home for one or two nights. Away from parents and carers and away from their own beds, some for the first time.

Everything was carefully planned for safety, fun and adventure, under the skilled eye of Group Scout Leader Mike Evans. We collected equipment and games from the hut, then shopped for provisions on Friday afternoon before driving up the A38 to prepare for the arrivals. Each of the six bunk bedded rooms were allocated, and the Beavers were excited as they met their room-mates, chose their bunk and stored their belongings, before waving goodbye to parents and carers.

First night started with some energetic games, running in the local field, exploring the local wood, followed by a quieter starlit and moonlit walk around Woodhouse Park. Then a warm drink and snack before bedtime. The children were brilliant and settled for the night.

The major activities were on Saturday and Sunday morning. They included climbing, abseiling, crate stacking, go karting, den building, parachute games, wide games, exploring and, of course, cooking marshmallows and baked chocolate bananas over open fires. Breakfasts, lunches and evening meal were prepared by the team and served in and around the Lovell Centre, together with frequent drinks and snacks. Energy levels and excitement were pretty high, and it was great to see how the Beavers worked together, supporting each other in the team activities.

The two days seem to whizz by and we finally headed homewards with lots of happy memories and progress towards some of their Beaver Scout badges! Well done everyone!



When I visited recently I enjoyed the calm interior with attractive nods to all things bees! I particularly liked the honeycomb decorative tiles.

As I sat in the sheltered outside space, savouring a perfect flat white, it was great to listen to General Manager Dave fill me in on all the exciting developments taking place. Meeting with

traders like this, who are brimming with passion for their business is one of the best aspects of my job.

I was interested to know "Why bees?". Dave told me this was exactly the response they wanted to evoke from their customers – inviting a conversation on why bees are so important and what we can do to support these vital pollinators.

The Nectar House is pleased to be working with social enterprise Bee the Change (www. beethechangeproject.org) whose work includes providing educational bee workshops, setting up community beehives in public spaces and schools, creating bee habitats and running sustainable beekeeping courses. The Nectar House sells Beeassociated merchandise with all profits going to this fantastic organisation.

The cafe is also building connections with the Environment Agency, Avon Wildlife Trust and the Woodland Trust, with a view to help spread their important messages, host meetings/talks and collaborate on fundraisers in the future.

All of these fantastic efforts to support our local environment does not distract them from delivering delicious, locally sourced food on a daily basis.

Dave describes the popular venue as a breakfast destination, and it was certainly filled with people happily tucking into tempting plates of food for the duration I was there.

A large part of the re-launch was the introduction of their evening pop-up restaurant. Their extended opening hours (11pm Tue to Sat), evening meals and weekly live music on a Tuesday, have proved to be a hit with their customers, new and old.



The beauty of being home to quest pop-ups, means The Nectar House can focus on delivering people's favourite, classic breakfast and lunches during the day and still offer a wide range of different cuisines by night. At time of writing, Good Green Sushi was serving up delicious vegan Japanese sushi. Throughout November, Jikoni will be offering

stunning East African Cuisine.


Acquiring a licence means as well as excellent fair-trade coffee, people can now indulge in a bloody Mary with their breakfast or local beer or wine with their evening meal.

Great News from the Ardagh Community Trust

Ardagh Community Trust (ACT) is one of seven inspirational community businesses in Bristol which have won funding and support from M&S and Power to Change in a city-wide competition.

The Bristol M&S Community Business Challenge awarded ACT funding and business support at a showcase event in the city, which took place on Thursday 3 October 2019. The award, worth £6,000, will be used to help ACT move from being a seasonal café to opening year-round and for longer hours during the day. Colleagues from M&S will work with staff and volunteers at the Ardagh to help ensure that the new café facility – opening in February 2020 – is a success!

Following the launch of the Bristol leg of the challenge in July this year, residents in Bristol have been voicing their support for the shortlisted community businesses in the M&S city centre store, on social media and online at www. communitybusinesschallenge.co.uk.

Sam Thomson, CEO of ACT, said: "All of our staff currently work part-time, so this funding and support will allow us to spend more time working to grow the business and ensure it's a success for the whole community. Alongside the support we have received to improve the physical facilities at the Ardagh site, this support will enable us to focus on business development, and ensure that our community business can support the ongoing costs of running the site, providing activities and ensuring that the local community continue to lead the organisation to further success in the future."

The Community Business Challenge launched in Liverpool in 2018, as part of M&S's Community Transformation Programme. The retailer is trialling a range of actions in cities like Liverpool and Bristol to help tackle the issues that matter most to communities – such as unemployment, skill shortages, loneliness, mental health and wellbeing. Following the Bristol leg, the M&S Community Business Challenge will move to Bradford in November 2019.

James Shorney, Store Manager at M&S Bristol City Centre, said: "It has been inspiring to learn more about the amazing work of so many community businesses across Bristol. Throughout this

Tickets are £6 adults, £3 children, under 3s free.





Long-term readers of Bishopston Matters may recall me first visiting local gardener Tim Foster at his Golden Hill allotment back in 2013, when his book Good Earth Gardening: A Friendly Guide to Growing Vegetables Organically was published. Well this month I was pleased to return to his vast allotment space (that contains 35 species of apple alone), to learn more about his latest book Fruit for Life: A friendly guide to growing fruit organically.

Tim lives in Bishopston and enjoys taking part in green community life - he was involved in the set-up of the amazing Golden Hill Community Gardens and can now be found at their Open events offering his knowledge. He lectures at the Botanical Gardens and St Werburgh's City Farm and is a frequent speaker with Avon Organics. At time of writing he was preparing to take part in a Q&A for Glos Road Central traders, to advise them how to keep their flower containers blooming.

When I saw a copy of his new lovely book, I immediately recognised the author photo from an episode of Gardeners' World, when Francis Tophill took on a local allotment in St Werburgh's and Tim was invited to be a judge at their end of season produce show.

Tim told me Fruit for Life is twice the size of his veg book - because there is just so much wisdom to

impart on growing fruit. In Tim's own words, "This book is divided into two sections: fruit chapters and important fruit-related topics. Each fruit chapter starts with the essentials and is really quite serious. Then, as we continue, there are more useful parts but it also starts to fall apart into frivolous nonsense. Splendid."

The book is filled with helpful information and easy to follow diagrams (by Tim), with his humour preventing you from being overwhelmed on what is such a vast subject. Describing Damson bushes as 'the Peaky Blinders of the fruit world...growing in hostile conditions' and advice that, 'The climbing of trees is essential for all children to retirement age. Beyond that, only do it if you feel comfortable and your creaking joints allow,' -are just a few snippets from his encouraging writing.

When I asked Tim for his highlight of the fruitgrowing year, he was delighted that his young apricot tree had cropped for the first time - bearing the most delicious fruit.

Age is just a number at the Gloucester Road WI

Where can women from their 20s to their 80s come together to have a go at Bollywood dancing and Bhangra drumming, listen to talks on music therapy and modern-day slavery, learn about car maintenance. make jewellery and festive wreaths? And yes, sometimes grow the biggest courgette and bake the best layer cake?

The answer is the Women's Institute (WI). Because this is the age range of the women at the Gloucester Road WI and just some of the activities they get up to.

Meet Gloucester Rd WI members Becky, Jenny and Mary aged 28, 47 and 81 respectively, who all joined the Gloucester Road WI to meet new people and do new things.

Here's what they say about being part of an organisation for women that spans the generations.

Why they joined the Gloucester Rd WI

Mary, 81, recently arrived from Yorkshire and wanted to do more than the stereotypical WI activities with older women. Jenny. 47. who runs her own business, hoped to widen her social circle from other mums with young children. Becky 28, says her own mum told her not to join such a stuffy organisation. So, she was surprised to find that her new boss - still in her thirties - was the President of the local WI. She loved the sound of what they got up to and went along to find out for herself.

The activities and talks bring people together

The activity or talk may be the focus of the meeting but they also spark the conversations that help people get to know each other. For Mary, the activities are like playing and as she says "wh en you're playing together age doesn't matter". For Jenny, the meetings are a chance to talk to women

with a wide range of ages, jobs and backgrounds who don't necessarily share her

opinions. For her, it's a refreshing change from the social media echo chambers that generate content based on what she already thinks and believes.

Activism at the heart of the WI

All three women have been surprised by the campaigning that's integral to the WI.

From being warned off joining by her mum, Becky went on to take her suggested resolution - a campaign to stop plastic soup and microfibers to the WI National AGM. At first, she felt slightly intimidated by giving a presentation to 5,000 mostly older women. But as soon as they started chatting and sharing experiences, all that changed. As Mary puts it, when it comes to campaigning "it doesn't matter whether you're in your 20s or 80s, it's the collective voice that counts".

Breaking down the barriers and stereotypes

Jenny and Mary have been to Denman College together - the WI's centre for learning, which runs cookery, craft and lifestyle courses. Here's what Jenny says about her time there.

"There were women there from the very traditional, long-running WIs as well as the so called 'new wave' WIs with a younger membership. On the face of it. I thought I don't have a lot in common with these women. But you get talking and then what a surprise, you find you do have things in common and we're having a laugh together. I love it for that!"

No deal Brexit and the Pet Passport



31 October 2019 -Brexit! (possibly). The date is fast approaching and we still do not know what agreement we will have with the EU. As the date approaches a 'No deal' Brexit seems more likely. There are so

many implications but as a Government 'Official Veterinarian' (OV) my concern is professionally with the possible changes for the Pet Passport Scheme.

DEFRA is already issuing advice to pet owners to cover all eventualities and in particular the possibility of a 'No deal' Brexit. The advice currently to pet owners wishing to take their pet abroad either using an existing passport or needing a new passport is to think ahead and assume the worst 'just in case'.

So, what happens if we have No deal? After 31 October 2019, dogs, cats and ferrets would continue to be able to travel from the UK to the EU but the requirements for documents and health checks will differ depending on the 'listed' status of the UK post Brexit. Very possibly we will not know the listed status of UK until Brexit happens so it may be best to plan now for the 'worst case scenario' so our pets can continue to travel without interruption.

If the UK becomes an unlisted third country it will have major implications for pet travel. Instead of the almost instant issuing of a Pet Passport and travel to the EU 21 days later, we would now have to plan our trips to EU at least 4 months in advance.

The new rules for an unlisted UK will require pets to have a microchip and a rabies vaccine. A minimum of 30 days later to have a blood test to prove that the vaccine has been effective. Provided the pet passes the rabies blood test, he then has to wait a further 3 months from the date of the blood test before being allowed to travel to the EU. All in all, taking 4 months. In addition, a health certificate will be needed for each trip to EU to be issued by an OV within 10 days of the date of travel.

If your pet has already had a rabies vaccine it may be recommended to repeat the vaccine before a rabies blood test is taken as the peak levels are reached to pass the test soon after 30 days post vaccination. If your pet's vaccine was given even only a few months previously then the likelihood of failing the blood test is high.

No one knows what the final situation will be but the current advice is for owners wishing to travel their pet to the EU to keep



an eye on the Government website for up-to-date information. If you are already certain that you will be wanting to travel your pet after 31 October 2019 it may be sensible to start the four-month process now regarding vaccination and blood test so you won't be caught out.





Time to restore the **Clock** at Horfield Parish Church

Holy Trinity and St Andrews Church on Wellington Hill (known locally as 'Horfield Parish Church') is pleased to have recently received a grant from Allchurches Trust towards the cost of repairing and maintaining the Tower Clock.

Most of the current church building is Victorian but the tower at the west end which contains the clock is much older, thought to be 15th century.

The clock face on the outside of the tower is an assuming black hexagon with gold numbering. It possibly doesn't look anything special from the outside. However, inside the tower is a very substantial internal mechanism in a large frame. It has no maker's name or date but is typical of the 18th century.

The restoration works are necessary to repair the ancient mechanism, which is suffering from the wear and tear of three centuries, and to restore the chime which has been stopped for some years. It is also hoped to install an auto-winding mechanism as

climbing up into the tower to wind the clock regularly is no easy task – access involves a series of steep ladders and trapdoors – not for the faint hearted!

The grant from Allchurches Trust is a very welcome contribution to preserving this substantial and historic clock in one of our local historic,

much loved and very much used buildings.

Allchurches Trust is one of the UK's largest grantmaking charities and gave more than £16 million to churches, charities and communities in 2018. Its funds come from its ownership of Ecclesiastical Insurance Group.

Should The Bishopston Society close down?

A motion proposed and passed at the recent AGM of The Bishopston Society (TBS) could lead to this popular local group closing down. The Society, which has gone beyond its original focus on local amenities into wider areas over the last few years. is now considered to be no longer viable to run. following decisions made by some of its committee members to step down from their roles. A critical review of options for moving forwards, or not, has therefore been proposed.

Motion: "This meeting notes that the Society's committee membership has dropped to a level which renders its work unviable, and most TBS activities have been suspended. The meeting notes with regret that a winding-up resolution will be presented to a Special General Meeting in the near future. However, the meeting also supports the proposal that a 'viability group' be convened on the same occasion to enable voting members to take into account the independent advice of critical friends on any alternatives which might lead to a continuation of the Society's work, or part of it."

The Society originally focused on Bishopston's amenities and built environment and was particularly popular for representing community interests over planning matters, for example. It has successfully broadened its appeal over the last few years by working additionally on economic and social aspects of Bishopston, including collaboration with traders to celebrate and boost our great British High Street. It also initiated the Clean Air Bishopston project and has demonstrated a commitment to integrating cultural and environmental perspectives on Bishopston's development with its traditional focus.

However, like so many small community groups, TBS has struggled to find adequate resources, primarily in the form of people-power, to run the organisation and has now been forced to consider winding up following the decision of three more of its committee members, including Planning Advisor, Membership Secretary and Chair, to stand down.

In the AGM motion (above), a review of options for the future of TBS was proposed by convening a meeting of a 'critical friends' VIABILITY group (Voluntary Independent Advisory Board Investigating Longterm Interests for TBS this Year).

Outgoing Chair Nick Plant explained, "We're gutted to have to do this but want to be realistic



and open about the next steps. We also think it's important to engage our community in this big decision by providing an opportunity for reflection and evaluation, and to consult over a range of possibilities. We wouldn't rule out some form of rescue plan, if there was a strong feeling that the work must continue, and enough help emerged to carry out a relaunch supported by the two to three of us prepared to continue serving. Equally, we're going to ask the VIABILITY group to consider the possibility of the Society merging with another organisation to exploit economies of scale to sustain some of our activities, or ask another body to take on some of our functions. Or the outcome might be to simply recognise that our time has come and shut

News from Fairfield High

The country's first black professional footballer visits his old school

Steve Stacey, a former Fairfield High School (FHS) student, took a trip down memory



lane when he visited the Year 10 student cohort to give a fascinating talk and to introduce his new autobiography.

Steve captivated

his audience as he shared how Bristol was for his parents – an interracial couple who met during WWII, and how his American soldier father was denied the right to stay in the city. As a result, Steve was brought up locally by his mother and grandparents and would spend most of his free time playing football with his friends.

His audience heard that his football talent did not go unnoticed, for, as a teenager Steve was scouted by both Bristol Rovers and Bristol City. While Rovers were in talks with the Headmaster of Fairfield, City bit the bullet and approached Steve and his Mum directly... leading to a private signing and fee. Before long the young Steve started training sessions with the club. He went on to become the country's first black professional footballer.

At the end of the talk, students had the opportunity to ask Steve about his life, his time at Fairfield and his perspective on football.

Steve Stacey comments "My experience at Fairfield was wonderful. I had a first-class education. Education is one of the finest gifts we can be given and I'm forever grateful. That's not to say that I couldn't have tried harder in every subject, because a bit too much time was probably spent on the football pitch!"

Steve was such an engaging speaker who touched every member of our audience, regardless of their background or interests. We would like to thank him and his team for making that all important

A Helping Hand for Habitats in Your Garden

Whilst out working or relaxing in our gardens we all appreciate and enjoy watching insects busying about, the joy of bird song, and small mammals scurrying away from sight. Encouraging wildlife into your garden is not only good for them, but it's also good for us.

Over the last fifty years we have lost 97% of Britain's meadows, which decreases biodiversity. Leave a little part of your garden untouched and allow wild flowers to sneak in.

or sow a native wildflower seed mixture. Wildflowers will attract a multitude of wildlife that could not thrive in other habitats. Perennial wildflowers prefer poor soil, as grasses compete with them less. If your soil is quite rich, remove the top layer of soil prior to sowing seed. The autumn is the best time to sow a wild flower meadow, so prepare your site now.

Dry stone walls provide a varied and valuable habitat for creepy crawlies, birds and small mammals, as well as mosses, lichens and a variety of plants. Dry stone walling is a tradition dating back hundreds of years, but if you don't live in the countryside or have a large garden, you could still create your own miniature dry stone wall in your garden. You could use old pieces of slate and paving, rocks, pebbles and bits of old tile. Stack them creatively; horizontally on top of each other, slanted diagonally on their side, or even vertically. Create patterns and use different sized stone to encourage gaps and holes that creatures can inhabit. A small dry stone wall could be a little rockery in your garden, and depending on space and aspect, it will thrive in either shade or full sun.

Leave rose hips and spent, dried flower heads during the winter as nourishment for wildlife, and



allow seeds and berries to form, rather than cutting everything back during the course of the year.

Encouraging beneficial predators into your garden can help with pest control, without the use of chemicals. Hedgehogs, newts, toads and some birds like to eat slugs and snails, ladybirds and green lacewings eat aphids, and ground beetles, damsel bugs and braconid wasps prey on caterpillars.

A pond in a garden is an absolute winner for wildlife. Water offers an essential drinking and bathing place for birds and mammals, and by growing a range of plants around the edge of the pond, they will draw in an even greater diversity of wildlife. And a pond doesn't have to be large, you could use a halved wooden wine barrel (as shown above), a wide shallow bowl, old metal planters, or perhaps offer a bird bath or water feature if a pond isn't possible.



Local History Matters – *Disappearing Architecture*

This month's article is about the rapidly changing face of architecture in north Bristol; it is not about wanting to save everything, but to at least record what was there before it is lost.

Often buildings must be repaired because of decay or damage, and to repair or replace in the original style and to the original standard can be very expensive. Change may also be needed when a building

changes its use, may be from commercial to domestic. Original parts of buildings may be able to tell us much about the history of a building or perhaps a street – when it was built, the type of housing it was and perhaps the class of people it was originally built for.

Roads with Victorian and Edwardian terraces, where every house would have looked almost identical, through to similar 20th century council housing, have now had modern individuality stamped on each house, but where examples exist, they should be recorded before it is too late. In times gone by, particularly in the first part of the 20th century, photographers would often photograph streets and houses, and these photographs can tell us a lot about when houses were built, and the people who lived in different streets.

Everyone talks about the rapidly changing face of the 'high street', but it is not only the businesses themselves that are changing, the buildings themselves are changing and in some cases are going from commercial to residential, often without any record.

Featured on this page are examples of disappearing architecture and other changes.

These are just a few examples of disappearing architectural details on buildings in our area; some might be maintained, others are not iconic enough to be conserved/preserved but should be recorded.

Roads where original Victorian and Edwardian terraces, where every house would have looked almost identical, through to similar 20th century council housing, have now had modern individuality stamped on each house, but where examples exist, they should be recorded before it is too late.

Similarly, other architectural details, commercial signage etc. should be recorded, where they cannot be saved.

Campaigning residents announce a neighbourhood survey

For some years a group of residents living in St Andrews and part of Bishopston – the Bishopston and St Andrews Traffic and Parking Group (BOSA) – have been campaigning about the growing problems of traffic density and parking in their neighbourhood. They are concerned not just about these central issues but also about the effects that result from the increased volume of vehicles in their streets including: the safety of pedestrians and particularly children, vulnerable adults and cyclists; pollution from exhaust fumes as well as from traffic noise; access for emergency and service vehicles; and the detriment to the general quality of life in these often narrow and community-friendly streets.

The development of resident parking schemes (RPS) in the neighbouring areas of Cotham and Montpelier have also affected the quality of life in Bishopston and St Andrews. Commuters now often choose to park in areas adjoining those RPSs as do residents parking their additional vehicles, including large leisure and commercial vans.

Kay, a local resident, is clear about the problems: "Since the declaration of RPSs in adjoining neighbourhoods, we have experienced a steady increase in parking by people from outside our area and this sometimes leads to aggressive competition for parking spaces as well as a general increase in traffic on our narrow streets. Some people drive too fast which increases the risks for pedestrians, particularly for young children, which all adds to the stress of living here – and sometimes emergency vehicles can't get through. Some people we know are actually thinking of moving away because of the stress and anxiety caused by traffic and parking."

In May 2018 MP Thangam Debbonaire hosted a public meeting at which nearly 70% of those



attending supported the introduction of an RPS; but progress since that meeting has been slow due to the Mayor's manifesto commitment not to introduce more RPSs unless there is 'overwhelming support'.

But there are now signs that the Council are now coming around to the view that existing RPSs are popular, and they have recently agreed to gauge public opinion by conducting a neighbourhood wide survey. Full details of the survey including the area of distribution have yet to be announced but it is likely to be widely distributed in the neighbourhood in late October or early November.

BOSA hopes to be involved in the survey and encourages all residents to take this unique opportunity to express their views to the Council about the growing problems of traffic and parking and the related issues of safety and air quality.

Bristol City Council will soon be asking people for their views on parking in parts of Bishopston and St Andrews, where some people have contacted us about parking difficulties. The parking survey will be sent to all residents, businesses and organisations in the area shown on the map. The survey will ask people about any parking issues that concern them and what, if anything, they think needs to change.

The survey area does not indicate the boundary of any currently proposed new parking measures.

If you are in the survey area, please look out for a postcard coming through your door towards the end of October/Early November. The postcard will tell you how you can complete the survey.

People who live outside the area can report parking and other local issues at www.bristol.gov.uk/improve-my-street or via their ward members. These issues will not be analysed as part of the current surveys.

News from our Bishopston & Redland Councillors

Bishopston ward news

Bishopston Medical Practice - More than two-thirds of patients who were registered with Bishopston Medical Practice have now transferred to a new practice. If you had not found a practice by the end of September when Bishopston Medical Practice closed, you will be automatically registered to an alternative practice close by, and sent a letter to tell you which practice.

There is capacity for all patients to register with other practices in their area and no one will be without a GP. The Clinical Commissioning Group (the Organisation which runs NHS services in Bristol) has been working with Bishopston Practice to ensure vulnerable patients are supported.

If you think you were registered at Bishopston Medical Practice and you have not been transferred. or are experiencing other problems with this process. please get in touch: we will be happy to support you.

Double yellow lines - The saga continues! We understand that work is progressing to complete the long-awaited double yellow lines in the streets around the cricket ground. The council had employed a contractor to do a selection of highways works, and they had taken on a subcontractor to paint our lines, who then let them down badly. They have now dismissed the subcontractor, invested in more lining equipment so that they can complete the work themselves, and promised to make us their number one priority. The work is still dependent on dry weather, but you should see it being completed over the next few weeks.

Waste collections - Many residents have reported concerns about missed or delayed waste and recycling collection. Figures for June to August show that Bishopston and Ashley Down has suffered with around 1% of recycling collections missed or delayed. This is well below the level of service that Bristol Waste should be providing. They have now revised their collection times to start from 6am throughout the year, to try to get more of their rounds completed before the morning traffic builds up, and they have ordered five narrow access vehicles to help with some of our narrower streets, which should be in action before the end of the year. Hopefully these two changes will bring improvements, but please do keep reporting missed collections via the council website, so we can keep track of the scale of the problem.

Work starts at the Ardagh - Congratulations to the Ardagh Community Trust who have broken

ground on the building works for their new yearround café and community hub (see page 15).

Parking consultation – As you may have seen, our neighbours in Redland and Ashley wards are being consulted about how to manage obstructive and dangerous parking in those areas. Obviously. any changes to parking in areas like St Andrew's or around Berkeley Road will have an impact on our area, so we are keeping a close eye on any developments. (see page 57).

Redland ward news

Local schools creating climate projects -

Congratulations to the local pupils who've taken part in the launch of the Bristol Education Partnership recently at UWE. Their first projects focused closely on tackling climate breakdown, saving energy, protecting biodiversity, and reducing food waste and plastic use in practical ways in their schools. Schools including Cotham, Colston's and Orchard were involved and their project groups are all pupilrun. At the launch many said their next step is to present findings and ask for headteacher support for their campaigns.

Funds won for new Cranbrook Road crossing - Fi and Martin have succeeded in winning road safety funding to support local residents. As reported previously, many local people are desperate for a road crossing on Cranbrook Road so that children can safely walk to school from Cairns Rd to Harcourt Hill. Finally. Fi and Martin have succeeded in getting an agreement for funding up to £31,000 from the next allocation of local money from developers. The budget promise means a Highways officer has now been persuaded to visit the site, and will come up with the best plan for the situation. This will take time and so we're working with residents in the meantime to use creative road markings and planters to improve safety right now.

Redland Green issues - Efforts to site a water fountain on Redland green are continuing, with the support of Redland Green Community Group. The lengthy delays are very frustrating but illustrate the complexities of finding a water supply, getting the installation cost covered, and then making sure there's a maintenance budget for hygiene. We are continuing to do what we can to help as new sites

have been created in the city centre and we are hoping that a similar model can be used on the Green. We have shared the same lessons with Friends of St Andrews Park who are also hoping to get a water fountain installed.

At the same time plans for a lucie post (power supply) to ensure there's no diesel pollution near the play area from an ice cream van or other trader have not progressed. Although the group fundraised for this, and we also got this included in plans for a catering concession, the project has now been dropped and no concessions have been let by the council as part of income raising projects.

Finally, Fi and Martin are chasing up promises to get some of the benches in the Park repaired, as a few of them are looking a bit ropey.

Clean air and local plan - The council is facing the threat of legal action from the government over the slow pace of action to tackle illegal levels of air pollution in roads in the city. At the same time independent lawyers Client Earth have issued a warning that they may take action too over both clean air and the need for climate change policies in the new local plan to be adequate to deal with the climate emergency. Martin recently issued a reminder from the Green Party about the need for the local plan to take climate emergency more seriously. The draft that was consulted proposed some new policies in chapter 13; however, we think the issue should be a headline topic with a theme running through the whole new plan if the city is to adapt and tackle the causes fast enough over the next decade.

Fly tipping – We've had repeated complaints about fly tipping in certain locations along Gloucester Road and have therefore asked for the council's new contractors to prioritise the area. If you have any concerns about fly tipping hotspots please let us know so that we can pass information on and do report any incidents you see using the council website.

Bin collections - We contacted the Cabinet member for waste over three months ago asking for collection rates in our area as we have had repeated complaints about missed collections. Disappointingly we've had no response but are now joining forces with other councillors along the Gloucester Road corridor who have similar concerns.

The vehicle replacement programme has been completed and is now moving to the old waste lorries themselves. Some of the previous missed collections have been caused by repeated breakdowns.

Streets with missed collections should be listed promptly on the company website. And we have been lobbying for this. We very much hope that together we can improve services for residents to an acceptable level.

Parking – We know that there is a lot of concern about inconsiderate and dangerous parking in the ward and we are very grateful to residents who have got in touch letting us know about the situation in their neighbourhood. Local action group (and stars of Channel 5's 'Britain's Parking Hell') BOSA were planning to issue an online survey in the near future. However, we've just heard that the Cabinet member for Transport has finally confirmed a council-run survey of the most affected. Please keep a look out for a postcard from the council to make sure your voice is heard. We remain concerned that streets just outside any possible parking management area will need to be protected from the knock-on effects of any controls. (see page 57).
