Bristol Seed Library

This spring Bristol's first Seed Library was launched in Bishopston Library.

The seed library is a new initiative from three local people who took part in a Change in Nature programme and were inspired to create an accessible community project that would help connect Bristol residents with nature, food and community. After considering different ideas, volunteers Jess, Jas and Emma approached Bristol City Council to ask if it would be possible to add a seed library to Bishopston Library. With their support, the team then requested donations of seeds from various businesses and community groups to launch the library. The Eden Project, Vital Seeds and Real Seeds generously donated their

support and many seeds to start this exciting project.

A seed library works much like a traditional library. People from the local community 'borrow' seeds from the Seed Library at planting time. At the end of the growing season, they save seeds from the plants and return a portion of the seeds to the library.

Organic seeds (where no pesticides have been used) will be stored in envelopes at the library for anyone to borrow. There are a variety of seeds, from flowers to herbs, fruits and vegetables. Anyone can take as many types of seeds as they would like.

This initiative will help to improve food sovereignty, tackle the climate crisis (through reduced food miles and seasonal eating), and encourage a sharing economy in the city.

Speaking after the launch event, Jess Borthwick, one of the organisers, said "It was such a wonderful experience to see local residents coming together in support of this initiative. This project means a great deal to me personally, and I see it as a radical step towards gaining self-sufficiency in a society that is increasingly controlled by large corporations. It's our hope that this small contribution will get people gardening, connecting to nature, growing their own food, and building community resilience."

There is already a great variety of seeds on offer thanks to donations from Vital Seeds and Real Seeds, as well as all the Bristol residents who have so kindly added to the seed library stock at the launch event. When you have successfully grown



your plants, please save the seeds! Once the seeds are fully cleaned and dried, you can bring some back to restock the library.

Molly Newberry, Community Network Developer for Eden Project Communities (www.

> edenprojectcommunities.com). had this to say of the project: "It was a joy to support the launch event of the Bristol Seed Library! The project is such a wonderful example of a couple of passionate individuals within a community having a fantastic idea and then making something really positive happen for their local area. I really look forward to seeing the project grow and flourish over the next few months."

In the future, the Seed Library hopes to host workshops about growing food and saving seeds later in the year.

Friends of St Andrew's Park (FoSAP) is very pleased that the new HAGS Crystal multi-climber for children aged five upwards has now been installed in the park - it is proving very popular. A basketball hoop has also been installed on the Multi Use Play Area and we hope this will be more robust than previous netball hoops. This redevelopment and the new gate at the side of the playground were made possible by grants from Enovert Community Trust and Ibstock Enovert Trust, and local crowdfunding. The process was managed by Bristol City Council.

It follows the redevelopment of the younger children's equipment two years ago, with the installation of the Diabolo multi-play equipment and



Many people have contributed to the redevelopment: the two trusts: the council: the FoSAP committee; people who volunteered for or contributed to the surveys FoSAP undertook to strengthen the fundraising applications; the advisory group of local parents who gave detailed consideration to the options for new equipment; the various local groups and the local councillors who provided letters of support; and the children who take up the play challenges and make all the work worthwhile.

The redevelopment is not vet fully complete. Grass seed has been sown on the new part of the mound on which the Crystal climber stands, but so far growth is only partially successful. Parts of the bank above the sandpit are significantly degraded. The council has now contacted a specialist company about surfacing this



FoSAP also secured

funding in November 2021 through the counciladministered Community Infrastructure Levy for repairs to the trim trail at the lower end of the playground and the three sets of wooden steps leading up through the playground. The top set of steps was repaired while the Crystal climber was



installed, but the timescale for the remainder of the work is not yet clear. FoSAP also maintains regular contact with the council concerning the paddling pool, and like so many others, we hope the public health situation will allow it to be opened this year.

street. Masala Masters (previously Indian Food Centre) opened in February 2022, after a complete refurbishment throughout. The venue has a clean contemporary feel and I had the pleasure of viewing the new, well-organised kitchen in action.

Abdul explained, "We are dedicated to creating authentic Bangladeshi and Indian meals; as it says on our menu - dining is an occasion, we take pride in making it special."

When I asked what authentic meals he would recommend? Abdul told me, "Sylhety chicken or lamb is an extremely popular dish in the Bangladesh city Sylhet. I also suggest Bengal Machli Moiador - on the bone Rahu Fish cooked with fresh garlic, green chillies in my own traditional spice style, but

we have all your favourite Indian dishes too."

I was lucky enough to enjoy an excellent vegetable curry with some delicious sides of Onion Bhaiis. Desi Puniabi samosas, cucumber raita and garlic naan what a treat!

As well as



producing great food, excellent customer service is of high importance to this team.

At the Cafe on the Common, it's lovely to see so many people enjoying the space, taking time out of a hectic day to sit and have a leisurely lunch, or chat over a cup of tea and cake with friends and family. As the evenings steadily grow lighter many are taking advantage of the sports courts here for vital fresh air and exercise. There are five courts always available for 'turn up and play' sessions, free for everyone to enjoy. The remaining courts can be prebooked via our website if you need a guaranteed space.

ACT AGM 2022 Report

Due to Covid cancellations, the AGM sadly had to be moved online this year which was a real disappointment to us. We had been looking forward to hosting the meeting at the Cafe on the Common. Despite the late change, the meeting was well attended by ACT members, trustees and local councillors. Reports were presented on the progress of the Ardagh and many positive comments were received from attendees. After completion of the formal business by the charity trustees, Cllr Ellie King Cabinet Member for Communities and Public Health, addressed the meeting and congratulated the charity on its achievements to date in regenerating the area into a popular and well-used community hub. She complimented ACT on its

ambition and vision for the site and appreciated the huge amount of work and energy that has been invested. 

St Andrew's Park - Early History

The 1875 Public Health Act gave councils authorisation to purchase land for public parks to provide open spaces for people living in poor, often overcrowded, and unsanitary conditions.

In Bristol parks were established at Eastville and

Bedminster, Windmill Hill, in the 1880s and early 1890s, and the residents of north Bristol desired a park for their area. Twenty-two acres of land was offered by Mr Derham who had developed the St Andrew's estate, but the price asked was considered too high and eventually the council purchased just eleven acres to create a park in 1890.

The land had a large quarry on it and part had also been used as a rifle range. Over the next four years the council filled in the guarry using ash and rubbish from the city. There is a complaint in a newspaper, from 1892 about carts of stinking refuse from the city being taken up North Road to tips in the park.

By 1894 the park had been walled and fenced, but little other work had been done, but clearly the area was being used because there was a complaint about how early the gates were being shut and people having to leave. Pressure was brought on the council by various parties, including the Sanitary Authority, and the local rate payer's association, to bring the park up to the previously agreed standard, with a new road, a second gate, paths, trees, bushes, other plantings, a band stand etc.

By May 1895, the park was complete with walls and railings, trees, and shrubs, planted flower beds, paths, a band stand, a drinking fountain, and more





gates; the main entrance was off Effingham Road. The park was divided into sections – a more formal, ornamental lower section and a more open green area in the upper part of the park for young people to play. In the lower sections of the park, 'Keep off the grass' notices were placed on lawns. Rules were established as to what games might be permitted with cricket and football being prohibited.

The grand opening was 2 May 1895; the weather that morning was wet but by the afternoon, the day had brightened up and the opening ceremony, together with extensive details about the park, was described in local papers. The fountain had a pedestal of grey granite, and the basin was of polished red granite. Benches were placed in the park for visitors. The total cost estimated at £7530, much less than had been spent on other parks in the city at the time. Although everyone was very pleased with the park and said how splendid it was especially with the plantings, comments were made during the speeches that it was unfortunate that the park could not have been the original thirty acres.

Flags were hung in neighbouring streets and hundreds of people of all ages attended the event.

> Subsequently bands played in the park three times a week on Monday evenings, Wednesday afternoons and Friday eveninas.

In the spring of 1897 there was a complaint

about damage to the flower beds, which was apparently being caused by young girls, picking the flowers.

The park continued to develop; a large greenhouse had been installed by 1903. which was to be the first of a number, and a urinal, which was partly hidden by trees. A bowling green was installed in 1913, but not the tennis court that had also been requested.

I feel proud that The Goldenhill Community Garden is situated in Bishopston; it is a local space I cannot speak highly enough of; it represents everything that is good about our community and is there for every member of our community to enjoy - for free!

It is a venue I have regularly enjoyed visiting and am happy to share their garden news in the magazine each month. This special green space celebrates its 10th anniversary this year so I couldn't resist a visit and catch-up with community project worker extraordinaire Lucy and her wonderful team of volunteers.

I arrived to join a handful of people enjoying a brew and tucking in to the well-stocked biscuit tin! The first volunteer I spoke with, Emma, told me she had first visited the garden nine years ago (after reading an article in Bishopston Matters). Living only a few minutes away, she ventured to the garden at 3.30pm (knowing the garden closed at 4pm) to get a feel for the place. She shared that at that time she was going through a very bad period of depression. She found the community garden to be warm, friendly and extremely supportive. Emma is now an allotment owner but at the time of her first



visit she had no gardening skills at all, but that didn't matter one bit Fmma added it was a great bonus as a volunteer to be able to take home some of the harvest.

I recognised volunteer Lindsay from her work with Golden Buds toddler

group (that takes place at the venue on Fridays 10-11.30am). Lindsay has been visiting the garden from nearly the start. When I asked why she had kept coming for so many years? She replied, "You get to be with a lovely bunch of people who are all supportive of each other. You can choose the jobs you like and just do those and there is no expectation of how often you have to come and for how long. If somebody would just like to come and have a cup of tea and a chat that is absolutely fine, there is no commitment required."



I found Richard busy potting-up seeds, he has been volunteering at the garden for the last four years but an allotmenteer for fourteen years. Since retiring he is enjoying spending more time at the garden that he described as "a good place!". It was clear to see Richard's gardening experience was appreciated by fellow members.

Other volunteers were clearing bamboo, building raised beds, potting-on cuttings, harvesting (giant) parsnips and rhubarb (ready to make cake with the afterschool club the following day) and drinking tea!

Throughout my visit Lucy was overseeing jobs, assisting and supporting volunteers. When I tracked her down, I asked her what she was most proud of relating to the community garden? A tough question that she responded with, "I am proud of

how we kept going and were here for the people that needed us most throughout lockdown; it was difficult to not be able to welcome new volunteers during this time but we supported those who could come. Since restrictions have lifted and new members have come along, I am proud of how we have brought the garden back to life after lockdown and now it is in better shape than ever. Big Spring Fair! Saturday 14 May, 1 – 4pm



Grapevine fruits – toxicity in dogs



Grapes, raisins, sultanas and currants are all potentially toxic to dogs and can even be fatal on ingestion.

Recently we have had a couple of incidences of dogs eating dogs safe. raisins and

sultanas mixed in muesli that has been scattered in a local park for birds to eat. Due to the guick actions of their owners, the dogs were seen at the practice immediately and were given an injection to cause vomiting and their stomachs emptied, so no harm was done.

There is no toxic dose of vine fruits for dogs; lowest reported doses to cause acute kidney signs for are grapes 1g/kg (one grape weighs on average 5g) so that equates to a single grape being possibly toxic to a small dachshund. Lowest toxic dose of raisins is reported as 2.8g/kg. Dried fruit in cakes and baking can also cause toxicity, for example in fruit cake and hot cross buns.

However, toxicity with vine fruits is also idiosyncratic; there have been reports of dogs ingesting large quantities without adverse effects. The exact mechanism of toxicity is not known and susceptibility cannot be predicted.

Toxic signs include vomiting (earliest and most common sign) and diarrhoea, lethargy, anorexia. abdominal pain, salivation and dehydration. Some dogs will have acute kidney injury which, if untreated, can be fatal.

The most commonly affected breed is the Labrador retriever and it affects young dogs more commonly (median age 4 years).

Treatment includes inducing vomiting to empty the stomach, blood tests to monitor the kidneys, fluid in the form of an intravenous drip and charcoal by mouth to reduce toxin absorption. The prognosis is good in treated dogs.

The advice we always give to any client who calls us with a dog who has eaten any quantity of vine fruits is that s/he should be seen and vomiting is induced as soon as possible, as we cannot tell which dogs are susceptible to the toxic effects. Studies have shown that even up to 24 hours after eating vine fruits they may be retrieved from the stomach in vomit, so it would still be worth consulting a vet at this late stage, however better sooner rather than later.

And please if you do feed the local wildlife, do not use mixes with any vine fruits, for example muesli cereals, so we can keep our



What's in a name?



Since moving to Bishopston just over a year ago, I've spent a surprisingly large amount of time wandering its streets as I try to get an excitable young baby to sleep. One of the benefits of this is that I've got to know the local area more quickly than expected. Bishopston has plenty of beautiful streets, but my favourite is Sefton Park Road, a lovely late Victorian avenue stretching between Ashley Down Road and Derby Road, to the east of Gloucester Road. The houses on Sefton Park Road don't have particularly ornate façades, but they do have unusually evocative names. These names are the inspiration behind the haikus accompanying this article.

House names might seem trivial or twee, but, as the Cambridge historical linguist Laura Wright has argued, they can give us a profound insight into local and national history, and processes of social change. Country houses have had names since the medieval era, but in Britain the practice took off in the 1860s with the increase in suburban home ownership among the middle classes. Sometimes housing developers would select the house names, but often it would be the owners. Town houses in this period were built in small clusters and numbering them was not yet an established custom. Naming a house was therefore useful practically as a means of identification, but also symbolically as a way for socially aspirant owners to signal their status by replicating aristocratic practices of house-naming. Although there were no legal restrictions when it came to house names. Wright has identified several dominant categories in the late-Victorian period: place names, nostalgically

rural names, commemorative names, names associated with the nobility or, conversely,

popular culture, and 'pick and mix' names whereby two elements were combined to create a new name. It was also common to label larger houses as 'villas' as a means of distinction.

Applying Wright's categories to Sefton Park Road, we see that most of its houses have place names. often from distant or foreign lands (what Wright calls 'displaced' place names). These places might indicate something literal about the owner's origins or connections, or they might have been chosen for their cultural connotations, used to denote glamour. erudition, even virtue. Greek, central European and Celtic names are popular on Sefton Park Road. Several houses are named after mountains, suggestive of what the French semiologist Roland Barthes has called the nineteenth-century 'Alpine myth' of moral regeneration through mountain climbing. In some cases, the names are vestiges of places which no longer exist: Velindre refers to an old Cardiff suburb now submerged by Whitchurch.

Alongside place names, a walk down Sefton Park Road reveals first names (Tiffany, Teresette), surnames (Ruskin, a homage to the Victorian art critic), and saints' names: St Elmo, St Gatiens. The original owner of the latter house was probably less saintly than first appears, however, as St Gatien was a British racehorse famous at the turn of the twentieth century, placing this house name in the popular culture category alongside Waverley and Marmion, works by the historical novelist Walter Scott. There are houses named after states of mind, such as Hope Villa. The meaning of certain names, like Setonica, are more mysterious, either lost to us today as a cultural reference, or simply fabricated by the owners.

What stories lie behind the house names on Sefton Park Road? Although a standardised lexicon of house names did build up, it is still possible to imagine the individual and idiosyncratic reasons for each choice. In my haikus, I have tried to tell a few of these imaginary stories, sometimes connecting them to the lives of the houses in the present. Like a haiku, we could say, a house name is a short piece of text which says far more than first appears.

My research for this article led to me to contact Andy Buchan, Chair of the Research Section of the Bishopston, Horfield & Ashley Down Local History Society (who regularly writes for *Bishopston Matters*). I thank him for his valuable input.



We have already ensured new yellow zig zags were painted by the entrance but some of the double yellows were not done due to cars being parked on them. We want to work with the school to encourage people to walk or cycle their children to school, where possible, and if dropping off, to be careful with parking and not idle with engines on. We are also hoping to secure funding for bollards in the future.

We continue to liaise with parents from Brunel School, who have recently launched a petition for an additional crossing on Ashlev Down Road, While a new school sign is coming, we also welcome any additional safety measures to help the children to school safely and so we support this petition! We are also looking into ways to get more road safety around the school. Although not council land we hope to find alternative ways to make this safer.

HMOs and short lets

There has been a lot of concern in the ward about the number of HMOs and short-let leases (such as Airbnbs) in the area. With two HMOs going to planning, we are working with planning officers to

make sure that the area is not negatively affected by HMOs, by either challenging them at planning. or making sure that numbers are not excessive. Lily has also been looking at ways to tackle issues around short lets, where quests are excessively noisy and disruptive. While no laws can change at a local level, this is something that the council should be able to crack down on via neighbourhood enforcement. If anyone is affected by noise and disruption from any property, do keep a noise diary and submit it to the council, to be referred to enforcement.

Transport

After Emma brought her motion about Green transport to Full Council in March, she has been keeping an eye on plans for improving buses and active travel. At Growth and Regeneration scrutiny in March she challenged officers that there seemed to be no plans for improving cycle lanes on Gloucester Road. Emma is going to the West of England Combined Authority (WECA) council meeting in April to read a statement in support of improving bus infrastructure and also to highlight the need for investment in active travel.

Redland Ward

Neighbourhood meeting to discuss local

The Bishopston Cotham and Redland Community Partnership is planning its first in-person meeting since the pandemic. The BCRCP is supported by local councillors and meetings are held across our three wards. Their next meeting will take place on Tuesday 10 May 2022, 7-9pm at the Horfield Quaker Meeting House, 300 Gloucester Road, BS7 8PD. Look out for further information on the meeting at www.BCRCP.org.uk.

The Partnership would love to hear from residents who'd be interested in taking part or getting involved to support the neighbourhood meetings. Any community groups active in the area are welcome to discuss participation at the meeting.

We'll also be updating residents on the proposals vving for funds that the council received from local developers that will be allocated later this year to

support projects in the neighbourhood. In the past this has been used to fund projects such as the new crossing on Cranbrook Road that's just been consulted on. Funds are very limited but the process allows councillors from six wards from Henbury to Cotham to allocate the spend. As the area has had limited construction activity it's not surprising we haven't got much of a funding pot - probably a little over thirty thousand pounds by the November meeting when the awards get decided, although if the Filton Arena gets going there may be more. St Christopher's

Whilst the old St Christopher's school site isn't in Redland, any development there will affect Redland residents. We understand that over 120 houses and flats for older people are on the cards. Fi and Martin have met with locals who are worried about overdevelopment, highways and parking issues and the impact of some potentially very tall buildings on the site. We're also liaising with the Westbury Park Community Association and councillors for the adjacent ward covering the site. Now that plans have been submitted anyone with comments to make should make a statement through the planning portal but do also let us know what you think.

Redland Green

The new planter by the playground has helped reduce the muddy patch by the entrance but it looks as though the problem is persisting. While some local toddlers may be pleased with the puddles, it does pose a safety risk, so some more work may be needed. Local volunteers have been terrifically busy recently, clearing rubbish, painting out graffiti, planting whips and installing bird boxes. There is still space for some more boxes, so do get in touch with us if you would like to sponsor one!

Support for refugees

Martin and Green Party Co-leader Carla Denyer both attended a recent rally in solidarity with Ukraine. We also both spoke in a city council debate to back a motion offering support for refugees. We promoted a Green amendment to the Labour proposal tabled – stressing that as a City of Sanctuary we support all refugees from all wars and threats, and called on the council to support those fleeing conflicts and disasters, including climate change. The Green amendment was successfully



passed by council, adding calls on the Government to waive visa requirements for refugees trying to enter the UK from Ukraine and other conflict zones, and lift the ban on asylum seekers working or receiving benefits. It also calls on Bristol Council to review its policies and practices to ensure we are helping asylum seekers and refugees to the maximum of our legal ability as well as asking One City partners to take measures to support asylum seekers and refugees in Bristol.




