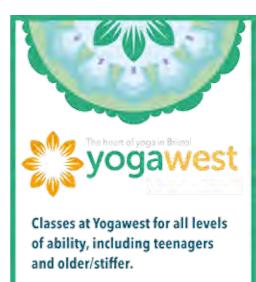

Family Food Action, based at The Ardagh, asks us to please think of others at this time and perhaps donate some Easter treats to the food charity.

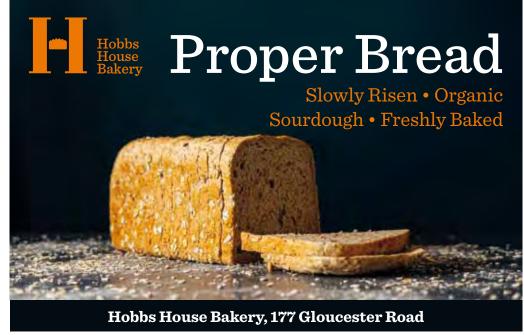

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World Book Day 2023!

A highlight every March is visiting schools on World Book Day; it is wonderful to see pupils (and teachers alike) embracing the joy of books and the adventures they can take us on. Brunel Field School enjoyed a book week, with visiting authors/illustrators, stories in the library and of course dressing up in favourite characters. Early Years classes were visited by storyteller, Katy Cawkwell, who shared a traditional tale bought to life by Katy's magical storytelling skills. Year 3 took part in a workshop with Katy where they learned a story to share with other pupils.

Years 4, 5 and 6 were treated to a visit from Tom McLaughlin, author and illustrator of, The Accidental Prime Minister and The Cloud Spotter. I was lucky enough to sit in on Tom's talk to Year 6, where he shared with the children his story-writing process and opened up the possibilities to them of writing and illustrating their own books. It was interesting to learn that Tom was a cartoonist for several years before becoming an author. He explained he watched so much news that he had the desire to create his own world to escape to.

Hats off to all of the teachers who turned out in fantastic costumes, much to the delight of all the children. Thanks goes to the hard-working school PSA whose fundraising efforts make the author visits possible.

Brunel Field are also celebrating being awarded £7,000 to upgrade their library. The grant, secured by the PSA, will pay for the building improvements. To fund the purchase of new books, the PSA have launched a 2023 campaign that encourages pupils to fundraise in some form relating to the number 23. Standby for participating children embarking on 23 runs, scoring 23 goals, selling 23 cakes or, if we're lucky - a 23-hour silence!













This, the ninth Bishopston Window Wanderland, had a fabulous launch event at St Bon's School, who this year took on the organising of the trail. As we walked into the school grounds we were welcomed by candles in home-made decorative pots, light projections, tens of windows lit up showing off their designs and the joyous singing of the school choir - all this topped off with a free hot chocolate and cupcake! Saturday nights don't get much better!

From the school, my eldest and I took to wandering the adjoining streets and discovering the delights of this year's windows.

I was lucky to go out on Saturday and Sunday evening, my youngest son joining me on the Sunday. We visited the brilliant Mark Bolan dedicated window (this clever household has delighted us with tributes to a number of late stars including John Lennon, David Bowie and Bob Marley, all memorable). On viewing their window this year, my youngest shared, "Wow! They have gone to a lot of effort and included a lot of detail. They have made a colourful design, put on music, added lights, candles and a feather decoration (boa)." Well-deserved high praise indeed from a 5-year-old.

Both my boys, well in fact everyone who gathered round, adored Window Wanderland founder, Lucy Reeve's installation, celebrating the murmuration of birds, with accompanying sound, lights and an interactive button! We all stood and watched in amazement! I heard one person say this was so remarkable they felt they could never take part, and I do understand the creativity in Bishopston is to a fantastic level, but nobody should be put-off joining in. The joy of the trail is that all different approaches make it interesting; simple designs can be brilliantly effective. It is all about having a go, having fun and interacting with the community.

For the first time this year, as a family we took part in Window Wanderland. When it came to putting the window design together. I enjoyed every minute: several hours were spent creating the tissue paper visual, it was wonderful to escape to our under the sea world for a week or so.

As well as tissue paper cut-outs and paintings, there were some inspired installations, we were treated to both an Elf home and Tiger people world on Brynland Avenue, along with an enchanting Harry Potter display on Maple Road, with spell books, potions, candles and tonics - brilliant fun.

Next year our local trail celebrates 10 years so what better time to get involved. Congratulations and thanks to this year's organisers for putting on another wanderful. free event for the whole community to enjoy.

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5 property letting tips from the Bristol experts:

- 1. **Tenant selection** is the most important point to get right; it could be a very difficult tenancy and beyond, if it goes wrong. From a referencing perspective the tenant would need to prove 30x the monthly rent, have a positive previous landlord ref, the right to rent in the UK, and good, clear credit history.
- 2. Inventory services are as important as a good AST contract; these documents come handin-hand when managing the property, as it is the accurate record of what the property was like at the start of the tenancy and will allow us to then go through and see if there has been deterioration during the tenancy, and who is liable.
- 3. Maintaining good relations with your tenants this really helps when things do not go to plan; often you will be at the mercy of contractors and it can be very stressful if you are let down, but having that positive relationship with your tenants makes it that much easier for them to work with you when needed, rather than against you.
- **Regular property inspections** are a must we conduct ours quarterly and for larger HMOs we almost attend monthly to ensure the building is being well looked after by tenants and being pro-active in any issues that arise with the property.
- 5. Pre-check out appointment helps massively with the end of the tenancy, running through the inventory with the tenant and letting them know what we expect of them at the end of the tenancy and also then pre-planning our works, if any, to reduce the void period. If we can get the tenant through their tenancy and hand back the whole deposit because of our guidance, that is the goal, and streamlines the whole process.

As for their chips, what can I say, they are the best. My 7-year-old son only had one place he wanted to go for his birthday treat – high praise indeed!



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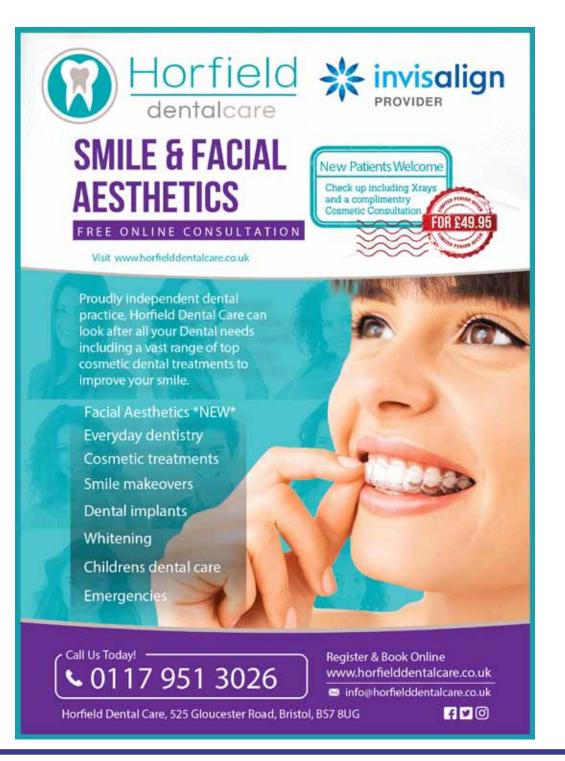

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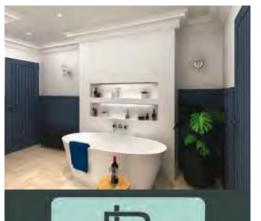

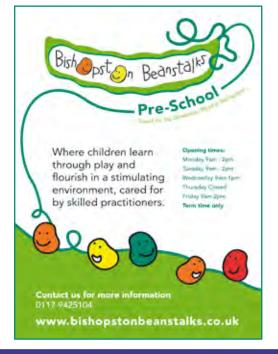

I'm a Ghostwriter – we all have a story to tell

This month it was great to catch up with local Ghostwriter Anne-Louise Perez and find out more about this specific style of writing.

How would you describe what you do?

In a nutshell I give my storytellers - my clients, a means to tell their stories in a literary voice. They don't have to agonise over how to put their words on paper or worry about things like structure, tone, or time constraints. I'm there to help with that and I work with them to create a book or other piece of writing that captures their story.

Who are your storytellers?

Anyone, you don't have to be rich and famous to have a great story to share, whether it's your own, or that of a friend or family member.

What does the process look like?

Ideally I like to meet my storyteller face-to-face to see if we click, it's really helpful to have a good chemistry - a good connection between us makes the collaborative process much easier for the both of us, then its interviews, drafts, edits and final manuscript.

What makes a good ghostwriter?

Being a good listener and asking the right leading questions are important. Presenting on BCfm radio has been great training for those skills.

What is the most rewarding part of this work?

When I succeed in putting myself into someone else's head and I can 'see the story' at which point I am able to build a picture and add the colour. That creative flow excites me.



Don't you mind not taking the credit as the author?

Not at all – I'm not by nature, a glory hunter, so I'm quite happy on that score.

What's next?

At the moment I'm working on a couple of books. I was asked recently if I wrote eulogies, and I thought what a privilege that would be. So ves. I would be honoured to help write eulogies too.

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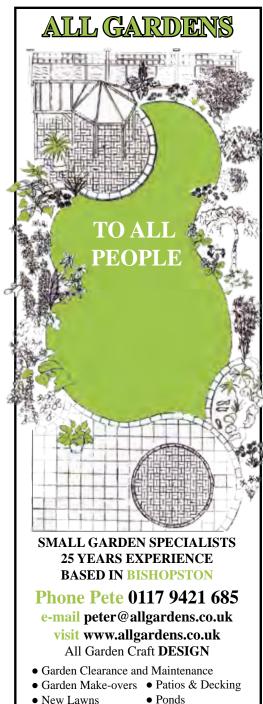
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Why has my vet given me a 'Non prescription form for antibiotics'?

Antibiotics are very important medicines in human and veterinary practice that have saved millions of lives. However, we are now seeing antimicrobial resistance (AMR) occurring, and using the medications we have responsibly is necessary to save those medicines for cases where they are needed. This will ensure that the medicines will continue to work and to reduce the likelihood of resistance occurring. Veterinary surgeons are part of the One Health initiative and have a professional responsibility to ensure that they use antibiotics responsibly, not only for our own patients but also for the wider human and environmental consequences. One of the greatest threats to medical treatments in the future is antimicrobial resistance

Antimicrobials are used to inhibit or kill microorganisms, and include medicines for use against bacteria, antifungals, antivirals and antiprotozoals. Antibiotics are used against bacteria.

Many common diseases that we see in veterinary practice are not caused by bacteria; for example, diarrhoea, sneezes, and skin conditions.



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These diseases often do not require antibiotic treatment. Viruses are not killed by antibiotics.

Responsible use of antibiotics, or antibiotic stewardship, involves making evidence-based decisions about the need for treatment of an individual patient with a bacterial infection while being mindful of the wider implications of antibiotic

In practice we now individually assess each patient: we use antibiotics where we have evidence of a bacterial infection being present. This may involve taking a sample to submit to a laboratory or looking under the microscope for evidence of bacteria. Use of an antibiotic is then made as an informed decision

However, in many cases where we have previously handed out antibiotics we are now no longer doing so as there is evidence that they are not necessary. In these cases, your vet may instead give you a 'Non-prescription form' which explains why, in this case, antibiotics have not been prescribed and what alternative treatments may be recommended.

It is hoped that this national initiative will help to make us all aware of the danger of overuse of antibiotics and will help to save their efficacy for where they are really needed.

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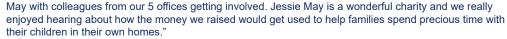

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ANDY'S MAN CLUB #IT'S OK TO TALK

Andy's Man Club was set up in Halifax in June 2016 following the tragic death of Andy Roberts, who died by suicide. Andy's mother Elaine and brother-in-law Luke Ambler decided to start a club to reduce the stigma around male mental health issues, and give men the opportunity to talk with their peers about whatever storms they're going through.

The group now has 117 clubs across the UK, as well as an online option for anyone who can't get to one. All meet at 7pm every Monday except Bank Holidays

There are two Andy's Man Clubs in Bristol. Bristol North meets in the Jessop Suite at the Seat Unique Stadium aka the County Cricket Ground. Bristol South meets at the Knowle West Media Centre. The clubs are run by a team of volunteer facilitators, all of whom originally joined the club to get support for themselves.

Below we are honoured to share with you the experience of a local man, who found the support he needed from Andy's Man Club.





Mv Name is Andv. AKA Barts.

I'm 42 years old and I started attending Andv's Man Club at the beginning of June 2022. I can honestly say it has changed my life for the better in such a short time.

I have always been

the happy-go-lucky guy. I've spent most of my life brushing things under the carpet or saying "I'm fine" when I wasn't. This would lead to me having meltdowns or kicking off for no apparent reason.

I first walked through the door at the County Cricket Ground in Bristol for Andy's Man Club after the above had become apparent. My whole life I'd been living with anxiety, and then in June I was diagnosed with depression.

The anxiety was so strong that I didn't want to upset people, or I wouldn't speak up as I didn't want the confrontation - the only way to describe it is walking on eggshells my whole life!

Attending Andy's Man Club has made me less anxious by nature. Everyone listens and I get to talk and no judgement is passed. Also you realise you are not alone, others are going through a storm themselves.

No person is the same at Andy's Man Club. However we can all relate to each other, and that's because we all had a reason to walk through that door on our first evening. Even the facilitators!

In November 2022 I became a facilitator and have really enjoyed leading groups. It really is as simple as having a chat over a brew and a biscuit – all provided free of charge.

Andy's Man Club has given me that different outlook I needed. I now use the word "perspective" more than I ever have in my life. I recently did a radio interview on BBC Radio Bristol to talk about what made me join Andy's Man Club and also what Andy's Man Club has done for me!

I'm not here to sell Andv's Man Club to anvone. All I can say is it has changed me for the better, and if you are going through a storm yourself or know somebody who is, Andy's Man Club's doors are open 7-9pm every Monday and it might help lighten that load.

ANDY'S MAN CLUB is a free-to-attend talking group that runs every Monday night at 7pm, excluding bank holidays.

For over a year, the group has operated at a venue in Bishopston - the Seat Unique Stadium, BS7 9EJ.

There is now a Bristol South group that meet at the Knowle West Media Centre, BS4 1NL. Any man over the age of 18 is free to attend either of these groups, with no registration, referral or booking process.

Robin Hood is coming to Horfield - Oh yes, he is!

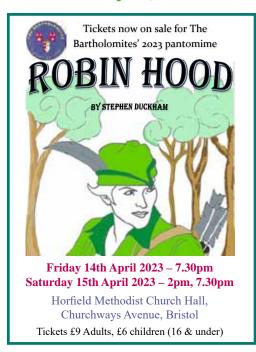
The Bartholomites are preparing for curtains up in their new location at Horfield Methodist Church Hall and would love you to join them in their latest pantomime, Robin Hood.

With Easter looming, please spare a thought for local families at the forefront of the cost-of living crisis for whom the holidays and special events can be particularly hard.

FamilyFoodAction.org.uk is a Bristol charity working with local families experiencing food poverty. We work with five community partners (organisations who provide food within the context of wider support) in central and North Bristol. We've featured regularly in Bishopston Matters because its readers are from the very same communities that enable FFA to keep going in difficult times and even expand what we do. This was demonstrated in our recent survey, which showed that, in December 2022. FFA donations are now:

- helping our partners to collectively support 50% more hungry children/parents than in July
- supplementing the meals of about 1.500 local Bristol children and parents
- contributing to a total of about 155,000 meals

But the pressure on low-income families is far from abating; for example, new research from the Food

Foundation shows that across the UK 4 million children are now experiencing food poverty (that's doubled in the last year). According to the Joseph Rowntree Trust and Trussell trusts, basic benefits now fall £140 pcm short of the minimum cost of living. So local families still desperately need your support just to get by.

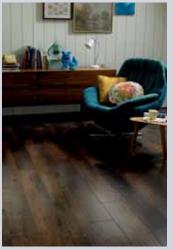

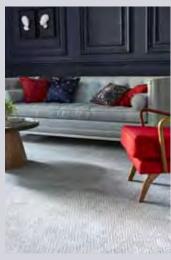

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Circles in Garden Design

The use of circles and curves in garden design create a strong statement, and give significant visual interest by adding structural lines, allowing the eye to follow around the garden, connecting with other forms. They can be used to fit unusual or difficult areas. with the possibilities being endless. At Secret Garden we enjoy creating garden designs that use a variety of shapes and forms, with simple circles and curves always being a winner.

When utilising curves, bold, sweeping arcs work better than too many wiggling lines. Curves work well in large spaces, and within smaller gardens the use of semi circles can trick the eye into thinking that the space is larger than it is.

Horseshoe and semi circles can be used effectively in seating areas to create a community feel, where people can sit together, converse and see each other easily. You could use a perspective cheat with circles to make your garden look longer than it is. Have the largest circle nearest to your window, with an overlapping smaller circle furthest away. This is a great trick to use in smaller urban gardens, and creates a good vantage point.

Circular paving looks smart, and is great for creating separate, differing sized patio areas within a garden. This can be useful for capturing early morning, afternoon or early evening sun, which hits in different parts of the garden.



Sharp angles in the garden can sometimes appear awkward and can also create tiny, unusable spaces in borders and beds, and in lawns can create tight spots that are difficult to mow. Circles and curves on the other hand work easily, and can be used around specimen trees, which can be used to create a focal point.

Ponds, instead of being edged with right angles, could be circular, oval or any kind of loose, flowing shape. This will complement circular lawns, patios and other areas of the garden. If there's one thing you should try to include in your garden; it's water. It is so beneficial and will bring the buzz and song of nature into your life.



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St Andrew's Park – World War II

By early in the Second World War, St Andrew's Park had been modified to provide protection for local residents. This work took the form of a large water tank to provide water for fire fighters, and three underground air raid shelters for residents of the roads surrounding the park. There was also a barrage balloon station 51/25 situated at the park. This was part of the network of balloons stationed over the city, to deter enemy aircraft and force them to higher altitudes where they would be more vulnerable to anti-aircraft fire.

The balloons were flown from mobile winches up to 5,000 feet. In the Bristol area their main purpose was to help protect Bristol docks and Avonmouth docks. They were designed so that if a plane hit the thick steel cable, it would snap at the top and bottom and then the wire, with small parachutes at either end would remain entangled around the wing of the aircraft, thus disabling it. The balloons themselves would slowly sink to the ground.

For any residents of the area who had not been hit by the war, this would change in April 1941. On 30 April 1941, a Vickers Wellington bomber — T2905, with a crew of six took off on a training flight from RAF Bassingbourn, in Cambridge. The flight was meant to take them to the Bristol Channel and then back to Cambridge. The usual crew was five, but this was a training flight. While flight training was not as hazardous as operational flying, it still had its dangers and more than 8,000 men were killed in training accidents or non-operational flying and these were often put down to inexperience or having to fly in old aircraft. This was not the case here; the plane had only been delivered to the unit in February 1941.

The crew on the plane were Sergeant Lawrence Hugh Houghton, who was flying the plane; Pilot Officer Kenneth Guy Evans, who was due to fly the return leg to Cambridge; Sergeant Charles Clark, Front Gunner; Sergeant John Stuart Jones, Navigator; Sergeant Richard Wish, Rear Gunner; and Sergeant Thomas Leonard Lever, wireless operator.

The plane became lost and ended up over Bristol, and while visibility was good, the blackout meant it was pitch black outside and the crew would have had no idea where they were, when disaster struck! At 21:50, while flying at 2,000 feet, the left wing struck the cable of a barrage balloon; it is thought that this was the balloon over the Whitehall Recreation Ground. The plane flew on with the cable snagged on its wing, it then clipped another barrage balloon cable, over the Stapleton Road gas works playing field. The pilot struggled to control the plane, which was by now loosing height. It eventually hit a tree and crashed into St Andrew's Park, breaking into two parts, and bursting into flames. Local residents and the emergency services rushed to help, braving the flames, and explosions to try and rescue the crew.

Sadly, three of the crew – Pilot Officer Kenneth Guy Evans, Sergeant Charles Clark, and Sergeant Thomas Leonard Lever – died. The others survived, albeit badly injured and in at least one case badly burnt, but eventually they recovered to return to operational flying. Some of the rescuers were also injured.

On 26 September 2009, a memorial stone was unveiled in the park, to mark the site of the crash and record the lives of those who died. In 2011, on the 70th anniversary of the crash a memorial service was held in the park.

It's never too early to arrange Lasting Powers of Attorney



A lasting power of attorney (LPA) is a document by which one person (the "donor") gives another person (the "attorney") the power to act on their behalf and in their name. There are two types of LPA – health and welfare, and property and financial affairs.

Without a property and financial affairs LPA, no one is permitted to manage your financial and legal affairs should you become unable to make decisions for yourself.

Even if you are married, in a civil partnership or have adult children, no one will be allowed to make important decisions without going through an extremely intrusive, time-consuming, and expensive deputyship process.

This could lead to you missing out on new opportunities to manage your wealth effectively for your loved ones and limit the amount of support that is easily accessible to help with your care.

There are strict rules around what attorneys can do with an LPA and a lack of understanding or misinterpreting of these rules can also inadvertently lead to misuse of the LPA. It can be daunting being given the responsibility of making decisions for another person and often leads to families falling out at what can be a time of significant stress.

Using a financial adviser to organise your LPA can ensure everyone involved understands what the LPA allows the attorney to do. With oversight of the financial position especially, an adviser can provide guidance to the attorney and therefore reassurance for the whole family that the provisions in the LPA and actions of the attorney are in the donor's best interests

What happens if my family member doesn't have Lasting Powers of Attorney in place? If a loved one has lost the capacity to make decisions before arranging Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPAs), you will need to apply to be a Deputy with the Court of Protection in order to assist them.

There are many difficulties in following this process which is not only costly but also time consuming and will sadly not always be granted:

- Lots of paperwork to complete including an assessment of capacity form, usually completed by the individual's GP or a witness statement.
- The application can take 3–6 months to finalise and until a Deputy order is made, their accounts are frozen. Some medical practitioners also charge for providing medical evidence.
- Once the court has appointed a Deputy, they will receive a Deputy order in which the exact powers are set out. These powers depend on the individual's needs and can't be exceeded. The powers may apply to any aspect of the individual's life, including their finances, personal welfare, medical treatment and social care interventions.
- As well as dealing with the individual's day-today affairs the Deputy will have other ongoing responsibilities, for example, filling in an annual account and report accounting to the Court for all the financial transactions in the previous year.
- Initial and ongoing fees £400 deputyship application (doubled if for both health & welfare and property & finance), potential £500 hearing fee, £320 ongoing deputyship supervision fee, £100 assessment fee if a new deputy.

The whole process can be both distressing and intrusive for the loved one's family.

How do I avoid this? The answer is simple – by making Lasting Powers of Attorney as soon as possible – it is never too early.

From Cllr Tim Wye – Many people have been asking me how things will change with the committee system. In response, I've asked my Green councillor colleague Jenny Bartle who chairs the repetitiously named Committee Committee to write a few words.

Democracy! Governance! Committees! Lots of residents have been asking us about what is happening with the design of the committee system. With no mayor in 2024 how will things get done in the council? In January I was elected as the chair of the group of councillors working to design the committee system, so I may have some answers for you.

The key thing you need to know is that you can attend our public meetings, which take place on the last Friday of every month at 11:00–13:00 in City Hall. You can ask questions and submit statements by sending them to committeesystem@bristol.gov.uk. These will be read by the councillors, and you may also get to speak in the meeting to influence the debate.

One of the key things we have heard so far is the need for transparency, more engagement with local people, and more work to be inclusive. Those principles clearly must be central to whatever system we implement next. I'm glad we are having public meetings now, as it is a lot easier to talk about transparency when you have the public there to make sure you stick to your word.

As the chair it's my job to make sure we debate a lot of big questions and give a steer on what we think will be the fairest way to work. It's a lot of pressure, but so far it has been great to see councillors from every party working together and being constructive – hopefully a good reflection of how the committees will work come 2024.

Concorde Way closure – While we welcome the news that work has finally started on the new Ashley Down Station, we are greatly concerned about the cycling diversions in place.

Concorde Way is expected to be closed for over a year and while we accept that can't be changed, we are challenging the administration to provide better, safer diversion routes. The current diversion pushes over 1,000 cyclists a day onto a busy stretch of road, and in some parts cyclists have to dismount. There are other places that are prone to flooding. Emma put a statement into March Full cabinet and we hope that the diversion is reconsidered soon.

Cycling Day at the Ardagh and trees — On Friday 14 April we are hosting a cycling awareness afternoon at The Ardagh. Local police will be there to do free bike marking, as will local cycling trainers and bike maintenance specialists. There will also be a panel discussion about improving cycling in Bristol. We are also pleased that the second part of the first phase of tree planting has taken place on the common. The first phase will see trees spaced around the common as well as a new fruit orchard. The trees will contribute to carbon capture, improve biodiversity on the common and help with flooding. A big thanks to all who filled in the consultation and to those volunteering.

Ashley Down School – The consultation for a School Street for Ashley Down School is now closed and the results are in and look really promising. So, the next phases of consultation can start. We are also delighted to find out that our funding bid for new pencil bollards has got through to the next round for Community Interest Levy funding. We hope that securing this funding for bollards, along with the School Street initiative will really help the children and parents of Ashley Down School feel safer at drop-off and pick-up times. Redland ward

Funds won for parks and streets – We're delighted to have secured an extra £4m to spend on improving parks and streets in the next council budget. Capital comes from developer contributions to spend across the city on strategic priorities that support development. It's called Strategic CIL, Community Infrastructure Levy. It's a larger fund than the limited money available in local areas from nearby development, called Area CIL.

Martin drafted an amendment to the mayor's budget calling for £1m a year to be shared between parks and street improvements for four years and was successful in getting a unanimous vote from the council to support this. The mayor agreed to the change so it is now in the council budget for the coming year. Martin made a similar proposal the last two years but although a council majority supported it in February 2022 the mayor did not accept it. We now look forward to seeing how projects can get funded on practical improvements to local parks and safer streets. This could help build facilities like better paths, play areas, seating, or concessions to cope with busier parks and to manage traffic better in busier streets.

Housing proposed in Cossins Road – We've been talking to residents about proposed redevelopment of the old garages at Cossins Road, next to Redland Green. The garages are run down and the site has been identified by the council in the draft local plan as suitable for housing. The plot is next to the Redland Conservation Area and we're keen to see something sympathetic and sustainable overlooking the Green. As we write, a consultation event for residents is planned and we shall be reviewing the issues raised by people and how the developer responds. You can find details on the council website by looking on the planning portal under reference no 23/00665/F – please do let us know what you think!

Belvedere Road care home rejected – The third proposal in recent years for an additional care home development in Belvedere Road was rejected. The applicant went to the government Planning Inspectorate after their proposal wasn't dealt with in time – in a non-determination appeal. Previous proposals for more care home rooms were turned down in planning committees due to traffic and



parking issues and this was affirmed by the inspector who rejected the appeal on these grounds again. Many residents objected that another house was to be converted in the street and asked us for advice.

Planning delays due to staff shortages have continued to slow down the handling of applications small and large and this is something we've reported in the past and been taking up on behalf of residents. There seems little sign that the backlog is being dealt with vet, unfortunately.

Can we improve Bishop Road traffic safety - Fi recently met with the deputy head of Bishop Road School to discuss the traffic problems in the area that local people and parents have raised with us. The school is one of the largest primary schools in the city with well over 800 pupils, so it only takes a small proportion of carers and parents driving to cause significant problems in the narrow residential streets in the area. Not surprisingly the school shares our concerns and has taken a number of steps to try to deal with what in clearly a potentially dangerous situation. Together with the school, we hope to be able to work with highways officers and local residents to see what measures are effective and available. Several residents have been in touch and we are hoping to set up a meeting (probably online) to make a start on seeing what can be done soon.

Cranbrook Road Crossing – The long-awaited delivery of the Cranbrook Road crossing is inching forwards. We've finally been told that legal work to allow restrictions at the corners of Cairns Rd and Harcourt Hill to improve safety with double yellow lines will be drafted.

Up-to-date legal protection for corners is needed so they can be kept clear where the new island crossing will be put in. We're doing what we can to keep the project moving despite the slow pace of all highway schemes in the city. The money was first secured by us from developer funds in 2019 after a campaign by residents. A child was hit in a collision by a vehicle at this vital school crossing route and there's been no safe crossing. We're hoping there are no more delays.

Green Group grows - We're delighted to be joined by our 25th colleague in the Green Group on the council after a local by-election in Hotwells and Harbourside. This makes our group the largest on the city council. But this does not affect control before the post of mayor is abolished in May 2024. Until then, as you may be aware, the elected mayor is still in charge of most decisions.

However, this will change and from 2024 a committees' system will be in place, meaning that the budget will be drawn up by a cross-party group of councillors. There are now a series of meetings being held in public to work out how committees will take over running the council. You can find details on the council website pages for council meetings - a public forum is part of the agenda - and can also email questions to: committeesystem@bristol.gov.uk

Redesign of junction South Rd with Redland Rd - There's been a road safety scheme in development for many years due to accidents at the South Rd/Redland Rd junction. It's being progressed slowly (the same pace as other highway schemes!) and the proposed design is changing.

The changes could affect waiting restrictions on South Rd to make it safer for cyclists squeezed by parked cars. We understand there will be an additional consultation in the vicinity about modifying the proposal. This is needed to make sure that larger vehicles can make the Redland Rd/Zetland Rd turn once a widened footway has been built. Do submit your comments or get in touch if you have queries about proposals being circulated to addresses near the junction.

New group supporting Redland station -We're delighted that local volunteers have set up a station adoption group for Redland and Montpelier train stations and are working with the Severnside Community Rail Partnership. As the stations are only two minutes apart the two stations are being adopted together. As well as work parties there it's hoped the planters and herb garden will be looked after by volunteers. The Facebook page for Redland station is Friends of Redland Station Bristol - FoRed. There's also a community notice board at the platform.

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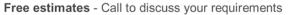
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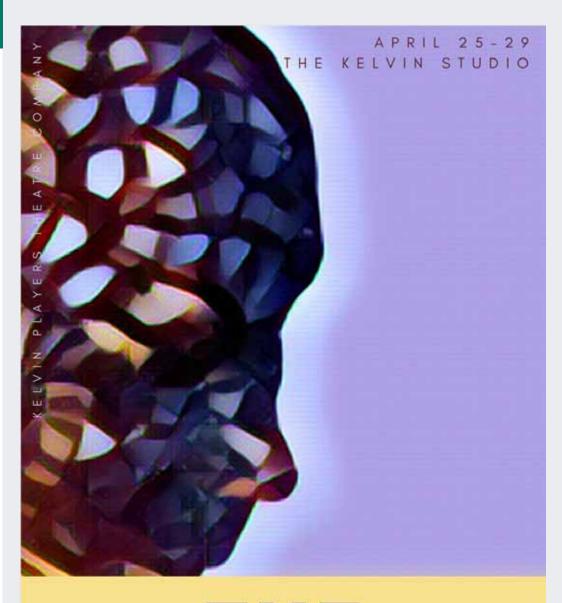
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
