

I joined the My Community Bristol -Community Celebration Day, during a performance from the Umbrella Chorus. They were mid-way through a fabulous rendition of Harry Styles's As it was. The choir emitted a feeling of pure joy; members sang, danced and whooped, uninhibited and immersed in the music. I left the room energised.

The day was set up as an inclusive event for all local people. My Community Bristol is an Action Group with members in BS2/6/7/9, consisting of people with and without learning disabilities. The groups/ organisations invited to take part in the day were in response to feedback given by My Community members. There were representatives from local Police Community Support Officers, We work for Everyone Employment, Sirona social care, Family Food Action and local councillors. The Deputy Lord Mayor visited, and activities included inclusive music, singing and movement workshops.

While getting some refreshments I had a lovely chat with My Community member Simon; he told me being part of this group had been positive. and invited me to visit a Community Café at The Hub in Lockleaze every Wednesday (10.30am - 2pm); he helps run this with his friend Steve (both pictured right). The good news in the café continues throughout the summer holidays so you will be sure of a warm welcome if you go along.

While my youngest enjoyed decorating a gingerbread person (kindly supplied by Hobbs House Bakery). I chatted with Cotham resident Beth, who was there to represent the People's Voice Project (PVP). I recognised Beth from her performances with the Misfits (a theatre group that brings creativity and inspiration to people with learning difficulties) at The Ardagh Café on Horfield Common.

Beth is a member of PVP's focus group with Edwin and R; together they have had conversations with people with learning difficulties and disabilities about speaking up and having a voice. They have discussions to discover what their issues are and


Fergus now wears a prosthetic and is a very happy, healthy and incredibly active little boy. He is currently a purple belt and will be taking his first brown belt very soon.

While perennial wildflower meadows are relatively drought-tolerant, extreme temperatures may cause them to set seed and die back more guickly. However, you can take comfort in knowing that they will re-emerge with vigour the following spring.

FFA needs donations - Family Food Action continues to collect and distribute food over the summer and school holidays. Although one partner is closed over summer (May Park Primary School), two partners (The Vench and Felix Road) see a large increase in children needing food, as they are not getting free school lunches. We aim to give the families at May Park School a larger supply of food at the end of term to help cover the school holidays. so, in July, we particularly welcome donations of food that will keep in the larder.

Feeding children in the school holidays - Over August, the Vench and Felix Road run lots of playdays and give the children attending lunches for free. We can help them with provision of ambient food and of fresh fruit and vegetables in particular, as they do not receive these from other sources. The kitchens at Felix Road use the donated food to make healthy meals for their community; the Vench provides home-cooked food and run children's cooking activities. They are masters at using some of our courgettes and carrots in their cake mixes to make the children's baking healthier! They often ask us for volunteers to help in the kitchens, so if you would like to find out more about this, do get in touch. The food clubs at the Vench. Southmead and St Paul's also continue to support their communities over the summer holidays with fruit and vegetables, ambient food and toiletries.

Growing your own produce? We are always delighted when we get allotment produce from the Gardening Club at The Ardagh, and from other donors. If you have a glut of vegetables or fruit, please donate them through your street collections, or bring them up to The Ardagh on Tuesday mornings (10.30 - midday).



Toothpaste and toiletries - You may have seen on Points West recently, how Evergreen School is tackling the problem of dental decay in their children by providing toothbrushes and toothpaste in school. Our other partners also ask for those, as well as other toiletries and nappies. Families are always grateful for soaps and shampoos too.






















Inheritance tax – strategies for your family

Inheritance tax (IHT) is a tax imposed on the estate of a deceased person, which can significantly reduce the amount of assets passed down to their loved ones. However, with proper estate planning, it is possible to reduce or even avoid paying IHT altogether. In this article, we will explore some of the strategies that can be used to mitigate the impact of IHT on your estate.

Nil Rate Band (NRB): The standard IHT rate in the UK is 40%, and it applies to the portion of the estate exceeding the threshold. The Nil Rate Band is the threshold up to which an estate is exempt from IHT. As of the current tax year (2023/2024), the NRB stands at £325,000 per person. Married couples and civil partners can effectively double their NRB allowance, as any unused portion of the first spouse or civil partner's NRB can be transferred to the surviving spouse or civil partner.

Residence Nil Rate Band (RNRB): The RNRB mitigates the impact of IHT on the main residence and is currently set at £175,000 per person. It only applies to estates where a residence is passed on to direct descendants and can also be transferred between spouses or civil partners.

Annual Exemptions: Every year, individuals can gift up to £3,000 tax-free, and this gift can be carried over for one year. This means that a couple can gift up to £6,000 without incurring any IHT. Gifts made to charities, political parties, and certain other organisations are also exempt.

Small Gifts Exemptions: In addition to the annual exemption, individuals can also make small gifts of up to £250 per recipient, free of IHT.

Lifetime Gifts: If a gift is made at least seven years before the donor's death, it will not be included in their estate for IHT purposes. However, if the donor passes away within seven years of making the gift, at least part of the value of the gift will be included in their estate.

Remember, you must record all gifts given to ensure it is clear they should be considered exempt.

Trusts: By placing assets into a trust, they are no longer considered part of the estate for IHT purposes. However, there may be other tax implications associated with trusts, so it is essential to seek professional advice before using this strategy.

Business Relief (BR): Investments that qualify for BR can be passed on free from IHT upon the death of



the investor, provided the shares have been owned for at least two years at that time. This is a wellestablished relief dating back 40 years, however, you should keep in mind that the value of an investment may go down as well as up and investors may not get back what they originally put in.

Inheritance tax can be a significant burden on an estate and is often stressful for the people dealing with paying the tax bill, which is often due before probate has been completed. Having a plan in place to mitigate this or for how the bill may be paid will be so helpful to your loved ones at an already difficult

Property planning is a must for the upcoming legislation in the PRS



- 1. EPCs (energy performance certificates) - There are proposals that by 2025 all rented properties are going to need a band C in order to be rented out. This is guite a jump from the current minimum band of E and we are currently working on all of our managed properties to increase them ahead of time; for some properties this can be as simple as adding TRVs or thermostats, however some properties are needing further insulation in the flooring and loft spaces. We suggest that all landlords look at this early as it is likely going to be one of the bigger costs faced for some of the period properties in Bristol.
- Renter's reform bill This is probably the biggest change coming to the lettings industry since ASTs were introduced 30 years ago. The proposals within the bill include an introduction of standard periodic tenancies, abolishing section 21s and doubling notice periods for rental increases. In principle the idea of periodic tenancies is great, as we always want good tenants to stay as long as possible in a property; however, from a planning perspective it puts the landlord at a disadvantage, as there would be a risk that the property becomes vacate over December / January which fixed terms are used to cover this period. The main obstacle would be student lettings as the lets are normally lined up 6 months in advance. Under the new proposals this would mean student lets would be turned around with 2 months' notice.

The abolishment of section 21 would just restrict the landlord's ability to regain possession of their property; however, as industry professionals we

have only issued these notices when, for example a landlord is looking to move back into their property, or when they are looking to sell. The other times would be if a tenant is not looking after the property. There would still be easier routes for the landlord to take under the new rules if there were breaches of tenancy (such as rental arrears and or antisocial behaviour). Our thoughts on this would be extending the notice period which was done during COVID rules, and this worked well as it gave the tenants plenty of time to plan accordingly.

Extending notice periods for increasing rentals is good for tenants to plan accordingly and make an informed decision without having the increased pressure of limited time at the property, and would not affect a landlord who is on top of their property planning.

Set up by the gardening volunteers, it enables us to compost all of the food waste (raw and cooked) produced by the Café - in addition to grass cuttings, clippings and other waste from the gardens - a brilliant achievement. This means less money spent on compost for the gardens, fewer deliveries to the site meaning less traffic and fewer emissions long-term, and fewer waste collections. This reduces our costs so there is more to spend on ongoing maintenance, management and improvements!

We are committed to reducing our environmental impact across all of our activities, and to maintaining the highest level of environmental stewardship of this wonderful public asset; it's motivating to achieve this tangible step-change in our operations to support this commitment practically. We'll be updating the recycling stations on site to support this and continue to be excited by the work that the microbes are doing to retain as many nutrients as possible in the soil!

Community Plant Nursery

Thank you to all who have been supporting our new Community Plant Nursery social enterprise project which is enabling the charity to generate increased income while also providing volunteering placements, and increased opportunities to develop skills, knowledge and experience in gardening and food growing for all of our community.

The plant nursery will have a regular stall at The Ardagh Food & Craft Market (June - Sept plus Xmas Market in Dec on the second Sat of each month) ongoing, which we are really excited about. 

Fairfield High School is delighted to be taking part in the culture-changing Oracy Project, which aspires to challenge and transform the listening and speaking habits of students throughout the school. Encouraging young people to be empathetic, confident and mindful will have wide ranging effects not just inside the classroom, but in every walk of life, both in a professional and personal environment.

The Oracy Project focuses on individuals' body language, voice projection, tone and use of language to communicate. It also concentrates on social awareness of others including listening to and considering different opinions. Put all this together and an excellent skillset for life is born.

Although the same outcome is likely to have been achieved regardless of the process, the vital thing here is the route taken. It's really quite astonishing!"








Pollution from Pet Parasiticides

A recent publication (March 2023) from the Grantham Institute at Imperial College London has made sobering reading. It appears that we are now seeing an environmental impact from the use of parasiticides from small animal veterinary practice as well as across the counter preparations from pet shops and supermarkets. The study has collated evidence from waterways across England showing hot spots of pollution from pet parasiticides, even in urban areas. Parasiticides include products to protect against or treat fleas, ticks and worms.

Parasiticides are designed to be toxic – that is why they work in our pets - however, the toxicity does not stop there, it continues once in the environment. Currently there is minimal environmental risk assessment of products used in dogs and cats. This is unlike agricultural products which have strict regulation. One chemical, imidacloprid, was fully banned in UK in 2018 as an agricultural product due to environmental contamination and particularly toxic effects on aquatic life in our waterways. However, no such ban exists on its use in dogs and cats where thousands of kg are sold each year for the pet market.

Veterinary parasiticides have now been suggested as the potential primary source of contamination of our waterways by these chemicals. Not all products used are monitored by the Environment Agency, particularly the more recent compounds so the full picture is not known. However, we do know that even these small individual doses used are now applied so frequently and on an increasing population of pets that the total volumes used are considerable.

So how can we in veterinary practice help this issue and explain the consequences of using these products to our clients? First, we should be dispensing parasiticides responsibly using a riskassessed individual basis.

We need to educate owners to help prevent further contamination of our environment, particularly our waterways. This includes not letting your dog swim and do not bath him if he has product applied; pick up all dog and cat poo as often as possible and dispose of it in dog bins for incineration. Dispose of packaging responsibly; ideally return your packaging to the veterinary practice for safe disposal as well as returning any unused products. Consider using oral products rather than collar or spot on formulations.

We still need to protect our pets from parasites as well as protecting ourselves. We do still need to use anti-parasitic products but this can be balanced with a more sensitive environmental approach. Perhaps it is time to reconsider the treatment of entire populations of healthy animals and instead use targeted reactive treatments when necessary.

I may not have much influence

over worldwide environmental concerns but by making this issue more widely known I can at

'Churches' in Horfield

BHA local history research - Andy Buchan ©

Horfield has probably existed in some shape or form for at least the last two thousand years, and since approximately the time of the Norman conquest until the mid-19th century, there was only one church, Horfield Parish Church, situated on the edge of the common. Since then, 'within' the boundary of the original parish of Horfield there have been at least twenty-five buildings associated with religious groups, the bulk of these being non-conformist. Many of the methodist chapels were used by different branches of the methodist church.

These were built as housing in Horfield developed from Zetland Road up towards Filton, and west to east from Westbury on Trym to Lockleaze. Others were built as congregations moved out from the city.

Starting at Filton, a gazetteer of religious buildings reads as follow:

Ebenezer Methodist Church in Eden Grove, built in 1933.

St Gregory the Great, the original church was built in c 1912 and the church we see today was later built alongside it, when Upper Horfield was built in the early 1930s.

Ebenezer Chapel on Filton Avenue, built in the 1930s.

Horfield Barracks Church, built 1857.

Horfield Parish Church, built in stone in the 1100s.

Horfield Methodist Church built 1899 – this was the 2nd Horfield Methodist Church – see below.

Salvation Army Hall, on Ashley Down Road. This was originally the Horfield Methodist Church and was built in 1838. It was renovated and a new brick front built, in the early part of the 20th century.

Methodist Chapel, approximately opposite the Friends Meeting House, built c 1889. This building was built of corrugated iron. This building served as the Friends Meeting House, before their building was built in 1908.

Friends Meeting House, built 1908.

St Edmunds, this was built as a church hall/school in 1910 and converted into a church in 1930. This was essentially a chapel-of-ease for Horfield parish church.

Horfield Baptist Church, built 1900; the congregation of this church originally used a house in Rowlay Road, now Oak Road, before moving to a purpose-built building in Brynland Avenue, now the church hall, until the church was built.

Bishopston Methodist Church, built in 1893.

St Michael and All Angels, built 1862.

Gospel Hall, almost opposite St Michael and All Angels, built c 1900.

Bishopston Methodist Church, at junction of Beverley Road and Gloucester Road, built 1865. The tower was added later.

St Andrew's, Montpelier, built 1844 – the parish had been carved partly out of Horfield.

The Church of the Good Shephard, Bishop Road built 1927; this was a daughter church of St Michael and All Angels.

St Bonaventure's, Roman Catholic Church, top of Egerton Road, built 1900.

Horfield Gospel Hall, Ramsey Road, Upper Horfield, built 1910.

Whitfield Tabernacle (Congregational), Muller Road, built 1957; the original church, in Downend Road was built in 1933 and then became the church hall.

St Bartholomew's, St Andrews, built 1894.

David Thomas Memorial Church (Congregational), Bishopston built 1879.

St Mary Magdalen with St Francis, Lockleaze, built 1956, subsequently demolished and new church built 1997.

St James (Presbyterian), Lockleaze, built 1951.

Some of these buildings have been knocked down, some of these have been re-purposed and some have swapped congregations. Churches have been lost either because they were no longer structurally sound, or their congregations had dwindled, and no alternative use could be found for the buildings. Often the new churches in Horfield were off-shoots or replacements for churches from the city of Bristol and often when they were built, they incorporated fixtures and fittings from the original churches. Sadly, reports show that even when the buildings have been saved/repurposed many of the fixtures and fittings could not be/were not saved.

News from Ashley, Bishopston & Ashley Down & Redland Councillors



Ashley ward

St Andrew's Park – Firstly, as summer gets into full swing, I've had a meeting with council enforcement officers and police about St Andrew's Park, who have confirmed they continue to take it seriously with PCSO patrols and a template dispersal order in place should there be serious issues. They will also be proactively looking out for semi-organised events (they were able to intervene last year when a massive free party had been organised during freshers' week).

It's a fine balance between everyone using this wonderful public space and protecting residents' rights. If you live on the park you are going to have to be happy with people making some noise but sound riggs late at night clearly really upset people.

Planning application 23/00649/P - Many people have also raised planning issues with a proposed development behind Tesco's on Gloucester Road. People are worried about the loss of trees, more pressure on parking and being overlooked by a block of nine flats. I have 'called it in' which means all the issues will be heard at planning committee. There are well-documented delays in planning at the moment so when it will be heard is unclear, but I will make sure interested residents know. Councillors are always happy to discuss legitimate planning concerns with residents and it is worth contacting us. I will be monitoring the application closely. If the recommendation is for 'approval' I will make sure that it is on the agenda for planning committee so that concerns can be raised in a public forum. In the meantime, remember that you can make comments (for or against) on the planning portal https:// pa.bristol.gov.uk/online-applications/ - then search 23/00649/P.

Bishopston & Ashley Down ward

Concorde Way - The finalised plans of the Ashley Down train station went to Cabinet in June, and Emma was disturbed to see that the final plans involve a permanent narrowing of Concorde Way. Emma challenged the cabinet member for transport. Don Alexander, about this and was told there were plans to address this at a future date. Emma has been meeting with highways officers to discuss this and push back on the decision to see if there is a way that the path can be widened at the same time. If narrowed the pathway could be very dangerous. Emma is going to continue to research this and push for a solution before the station completion. Emma also met with members of Friends of Bristol Urban Railway in June to discuss these concerns and those that have been raised in regards to bus connections

Ashley Down Station – Emma was able to visit the construction site of the station this month, and is pleased to report that the construction is on track. Network rail have increased their public engagement and have been holding community drop-in sessions. If you want to find out when these are then do get in touch or raise any issues via email with Emma.

RPZs – We were concerned to hear of the administration's plans to increase the central residents' Parking Zone charges by 500% with no plans to extend the Residents' Parking Zone any further. The have heard from residents around the station and further afield in the ward about how much they would like an RPZ. Issues in the ward with abandoned vehicles, garages storing multiples cars in residential streets, new HMOs with no parking previsions, and matchday parking are all issues affecting the ward that could be tackled with an extension of the RPZ. The councillors are concerned that, by ramping up the charges in neighbouring wards by so much, the parking in Bishopston and Ashley Down will get even worse, as people move

their cars further out to avoid charges. We will be looking at ways to get data from the ward about how desired an RPZ is to see if we can use that in the future.

Low traffic neighbourhoods – One solution that people have got in contact with us about is the possibility in future for getting Low traffic neighbourhoods (LTNs) into the area. These LTNs are a way of tackling rat-running and excess traffic in residential areas. While there are no plans or funds for one in the area at the moment, our new Green volunteer James has been out engaging with residents and asking their opinion on LTNs. James has been chatting to residents in Sommerville Road, Ralph Road and Ashgrove. If you have an opinion and would like to share it, you can email us and we will pass it on to James.

Brunel Field – Emma and James also recently attended Brunel Field's School for their annual summer fete, and it was great to talk to the children and parents about improvements they would like to see to the area in future. LTNs were discussed, as well as other road safety concerns and more concerns about improving cycling in the area.

Trees for Streets – Emma recently met with residents on Theresa Avenue about getting some street trees for the area. While street tree money comes from CIL funds usually, there are some schemes that might be able to help. We are looking into the different options available for Theresa, Ashgrove and Kennington Road and hope to have some good news soon.

Muller Road – A lot of people have been in touch regarding Muller Road and when it will be reopened. We have been assured that the works will be completed in July at the latest, and that delays have been primarily down to weather. Emma has been working with officers to look at ways to stop cars driving on the green at the bottom of Springfield, and has also raised concerned about the overgrown hedges on the pavement opposite.

Redland ward

Decision to go ahead with flats on former NEG site on Berkely Rd – The planning committee has now twice discussed the proposed redevelopment of the site at 102 Gloucester Rd into 17 flats. It's been a long process and the application was 'called in' by Martin so the planning decision would be made in public by a committee. Two residents and Martin



spoke at the May committee of various concerns about overdevelopment, parking, overlooking of the library flats, protection of street trees — including the one sponsored by residents — and the need to avoid lengthy closure of the busy pavement during construction.

Committee members were very concerned about space standards and overall density of a 17-flat development, road safety regarding the access for the filling station opposite, and overlooking. They compared it to the current permission already gained in 2020 for nine flats with retail and office included. After a lengthy discussion, the committee would not approve the proposal despite a recommendation from officers to accept the plan. There was therefore a follow-up report to the June committee meeting to review the decision after a 'cooling off' period. This allows officers to comment on the grounds for refusal so they can be strong enough to stand up if a planning appeal gets made to challenge rejection. In the event the officers considered the merit of objections and still recommended approval be given. The majority of the committee agreed and the application was approved with various conditions.

Pothole funds found - The poor state of roads has grown across the city. This can affect road safety - especially for vulnerable users on cycles and e-scooters. We've had complaints about the dire state of Cheltenham Road for example. Even when reported only the largest potholes are being fixed. Martin raised this at a recent meeting of the Cabinet when it was approving extra government funds for road maintenance to be spent. While the priority is preventive maintenance the extra funds can only be used for repairs. Some will be used at priority junctions but despite asking for locations these were not released. Please do make a point of reporting any damaged roads and pavements via the council website. The Residents' section has a page for reporting all types of street issues, from potholes to blocked drains and abandoned vehicles. Only when these problems get logged in the maintenance and inspection system may they be approved for treatment. Until a pothole has white lines painted around it, it will not be scheduled for repair.

Parking charges to go up and schemes to be reviewed – Higher charges for permits and a review of the city's parking schemes has been agreed by the current Cabinet. We have some concerns about this. While permit fees have not gone up for many years, the charges are only meant to be paying for the development and management of the schemes themselves. The much higher fees - double for second cars and 2.5 times for third permits - seems designed to make money (which was always denied) and any surplus should be spent on alternative transport to help reduce dependence on vehicles. More club cars or better walking and cycling facilities could be useful. But our area is not on the list of the long-promised pilot and follow-up second low traffic neighbourhood schemes elsewhere.

Higher fees before we know what the review might conclude is worrying as there will be a new committee-led authority in place from next spring and the new administration might have their own ideas. No new schemes are likely in the short term, despite suggestions that street corners could be protected with enforceable double yellow lines, work that is sorely needed in some streets. The spillover effect of people leaving vehicles where there's free parking is already worrying residents.

Loose chippings - We've had several reports of delays in finishing off road maintenance works -'surface dressing'. The treatment is used to extend the life of road surfaces by embedding small stones into adhesive bitumen. This often gets applied in summer but the result can be dusty unmarked roads, which are both unpleasant and present a skid risk. The final sweep is only done after the vehicles driving on the road help press the stone into the new surface. Only after this can lines and marking be put back.

Problems include confusion due to failure to put out temporary 'no parking' cones in time and delays reinstating double yellow lines and cycle tracks until there are many streets ready for the marking to be put back. This can be due to the inevitable lack of funds. Let us now if this is a problem in your area and we will try to help chase action.

Weed spraying - We've has some concerned residents after weeds were sprayed in their street, including damage to flowers around street trees. We're trying to get a clear statement from officers about whether or how a street can undertake to manage its own weeds, e.g. with hoeing, and what can be done to reduce the use of sprays in line with the council's declared Ecological Emergency commitment to reduce pesticide use in the city.

New smoke controls to be introduced - We've had notice that in the near future new smoke control regulation enforcement will be introduced in the city. Using new powers, it is likely that the council will be able to clamp down on unauthorised solid fuels and the use of non-approved appliances (e.g. stoves or open fires). We recognise growing evidence of the harm small smoke particulates are causing to public health and if there's action the council can take to reduce damaging smoke this could help those with breathing difficulties. Anyone with an unauthorised fire or fuel will have to prove their appliance or fuel is legal. However, we understand there will be minimal enforcement as officer time is very limited.

Cotham Hill changes to be made permanent – The street changes on Cotham Hill and some alterations to adjacent streets are to be made permanent. This will affect access to the area and reduce through traffic from Hampton Rd to Whiteladies Rd. Look out for new street priorities, new loading bays and added disabled parking spaces. The details are on the Ask Bristol web pages.
