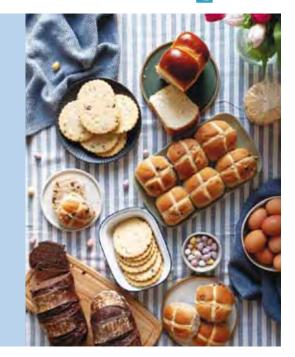
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Window Wanderland 2024, 9-11 March

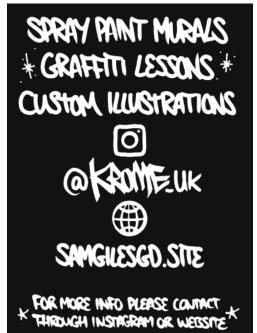
St Bon's are throwing their school gates open, for you to admire their decorative window displays, and enjoy some entertainment from the school choir before you make your way around the surrounding

Visit The Pod in St Andrew's Park

The Pod - community edible garden in St Andrew's Park - is slowly acquiring its sense of place, especially now that the fruit shrub hedge is starting to grow. We have our arch, which the grapes are now winding their way through up to the top, intertwined with other berries. We've planted a fifth fruit tree, and this one is a Greengage, Old Greengage to be precise, dating back to the Middle Ages. The fruit will be sweet, tangy, bright green plums and deliciously juicy – we hope! It may take two or three years before we see any fruit, but it will be worth the wait.

We have two community sessions each month (see below), when we meet so many lovely people. The Pod seems to be especially popular with families with young children. They love watering the plants (with one of our ever-growing family of watering cans that we've left on the fence throughout the year) and helping to transport bits and pieces to the compost heap in our miniature wheelbarrow. Lots of children have also gone home with seeds planted in pots. We've also heard from many other people about how much they love the garden, and what a magical space it is.

And indeed, it is; even though it's so young, it's already such a lovely place to be. In 2023 we enjoyed sharing our bounty of peas, tomatoes, raspberries, artichokes, sweetcorn, lavender, courgettes and more. One of the most useful things about The Pod is when you're cooking and realise you're out of fresh herbs; it's so good to be able to walk into the park and



pick fresh rosemary, parsley, thyme, mint, sage and rocket. And, if you want tea, there's camomile, mint and lemon verbena. Please do come and help yourselves, that is what it's there for! The only thing we ask is that you leave some for others (which indeed everyone seems to be doing; we've yet to find any of the plants stripped!).





Please do come and say hello if you're ever around on the second Tuesday of the month (at 2pm) or the last Saturday of the month (at 10am); we'd love to see you! And if you're on a waiting list for an allotment, why not come and join us while you're waiting?

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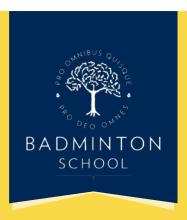

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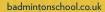

Badminton School raises the roof at St George's Bristol

On Wednesday 7 February, the musicians of Badminton School gathered at the renowned Bristol concert hall, St George's, to perform at the school's annual Spring Concert.

A former 200-year-old Georgian church, St George's Bristol was once described by Sir Simon Rattle as having 'the best acoustic for chamber music in Europe' and the pupils at Badminton School made full use of its professional splendour.

Under the baton of the school's Director of Music, Mr Mark Dowd, the programme for the evening, performed by the school's various choirs and orchestras, included pieces by Ola Gjeilo, Steinberg & Kelly's True Colours and Consider Yourself from Oliver!

Three soloists for the concert were students in the Upper Sixth. Jasmine Wong's rendition of O mio babbino caro, was followed by an electrifying Let the Bright Seraphim from Handel's oratoria Samson. Yijing Ren's virtuosic playing of the Schumann Fantasiestucke, Op12 had younger pupils hanging over the balconies to watch. When the third soloist. Kristina Gvozdyuk was joined on stage by drums and bass, the atmosphere changed. Electrifying playing of the jazz melodies of Sasko and of Peterson filled the hall and received a rapturous reception. A poignant moment for the young performers.

Mr Mark Dowd, Director of Music at Badminton, commented: "I am profoundly proud of what our young musicians have achieved today. For a school to perform at this level usually requires legions of professional supporting musicians the student performers,



but not at Badminton. There were many remarkable performances this evening, but the orchestra's faultless performance of Strauss' Emperor Waltz was made even more remarkable with the addition of only a handful of teachers. The lyrical and technically faultless performance was worthy of any adult orchestra. I am overjoyed not only that the quality of our musicians was demonstrated this evening, but that their individual enjoyment of performing to over 500 people, was evident in the beaming smiles I had the pleasure of witnessing as they left the stage".

Mrs Jessica Miles, Head, who joined Badminton less than a year ago, commented in her end of concert speech that she had been "utterly blown away" by the performances.

Hi Everyone,

Welcome to spring! As the days get longer and the world gets greener, I can always feel myself get lighter. Whatever the weather is up to, the buds are bursting, more green shoots are nosing their way back through the soil and the weeds are popping up everywhere. As the garden wakes up, the Wednesday volunteers move into seed-planting mode, and the polytunnels are filling up with seed travs and teeny seedlings. Every year we plant THOUSANDS of veg, flower and herb seeds - loads for us to grow in the garden, loads and loads for us



to sell to you lovely folks at plant stalls and lots more for us to plant in the garden again after the slugs have eaten the first ones! Our polytunnels provide light to the seedlings throughout the day, which is hard to do in a house - especially if you haven't got window sills or southern facing windows - so if that's vou. I would hold off planting until the end of the month and everything normally catches up in May.

We had an epic winter beavering away in the garden with lots of dry Wednesdays and so far, 2024 has been The Year Of the Shed. Firstly we got our new beautiful donated shed ready and organised and looking great and that inspired us to turn our attention to our other sheds! It turns out in our 12 years we've collected A LOT of stuff – and we've had loads of really great stuff donated but also plenty of stuff that might have looked useful but we've never actually used, and it turns out lots of it is not useful! It felt so good to get everything out and say goodbye to manky things, unfixable things and unidentifiable bits and bobs. We've painted, fixed roofs, sorted shelving, labelled boxes, untangled string, dodged spiders the size of mice, found long lost treasures, scrubbed, disinfected and basked in the warm glow of tidy, nice, organised sheds.

See you in the garden and come and follow us on social media if you're into that.

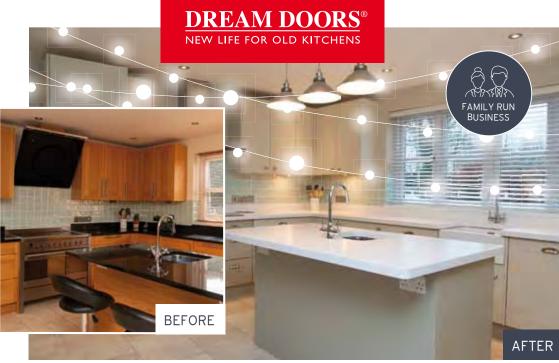

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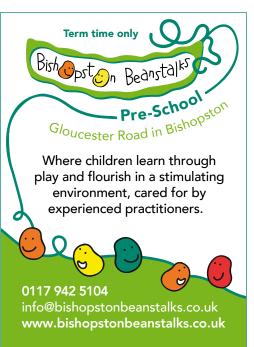

For more than 30 years; The Children's Hospice South West (CHSW) has been dedicated to making the most of short and precious lives and providing specialist children's hospice care for children and young people with life-limiting conditions. The care offered at Charlton Farm in Wraxall (one of three children's hospices run by CHSW across the south west) is not just about medical and nursing support for children and young people but enriching lives of the children and their

whole family.

Charlton Farm provides care and support to over 230 families living in the Bristol and surrounding area who have children with life-limiting conditions. Providing specialist palliative and hospice care for

the whole family, a sibling support service for brothers and sisters, emergency support, end of life care and a bereavement service: CHSW is a lifeline to so many.

Following the Covid 19 Pandemic CHSW had to significantly change the way it worked. Their new care model is based on care at the hospice, at home and virtual; and enables them to continue to support vulnerable children and their families at no cost to the family, however to provide this specialist care at Charlton Farm it costs around £4 million with very little input from the government.

The end of an era but the creativity lives on

After fifteen successful years trading on the wonderful Gloucester Road, Fig is sadly closing its doors for the last time at the end of April this year.

The popular gallery was set up by six Bristol artists as a co-operative venture in 2009 and, although not all the original artists remain, it has always maintained its handmade and locally sourced identity. Although very sorry to see Fig shut, the artists are all keen to maintain a local presence and will continue to make original art and handcrafted pieces.

It's not completely the end though, as the collective has announced that their friends and neighbours at Paper Plane, another gift shop a few doors down, will be moving into their shop and will carry on offering an array of handmade loveliness.

Jemima Lumley, a silver jewellery maker at Fig, said, "We're all so proud of Fig and all it has achieved since we first set it up fifteen years ago. We've had a wonderful run but our lease was coming to an end and we all agreed that it was time for us all to move in different directions professionally."

The Clean Bean Launderette has been an independent family business on Gloucester Road since its launch in 2010, by mother and son team – Nuala and David. In 2021 it was time for daughter Tara and her partner to take the reins. A few years on, as life evolves, Tara is now running the venue solo as a single mum.

Dedicated to our local high street and residents, Tara has recently invested in a new refurbishment of the launderette and adapted the business to fit in with family life. The Clean Bean still offers all the services they have done in the past, but a new, quick and easy drop-off method has been installed.

Rather than having to drop off items for a service

This new system allows us to be open for drops-offs for a greater number of hours, as well as me being able to be a good single mum — working around school hours. I hope my lovely customers will support me in this. Me and my boys enjoy living as

part of the local community as well as running a Gloucester Road business."

For those tight on time, The Clean Bean's subscription service is popular; Tara explained, "Many people with young families take advantage of our pick-up and drop-off service (within a 3-mile radius). 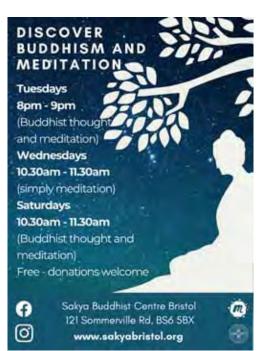

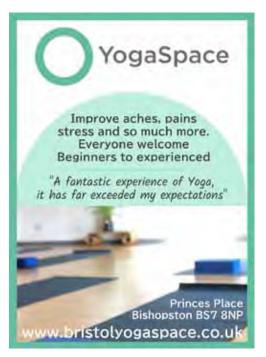

This month it was great to catch up with local resident, Andrew Milton, and hear all about his forthcoming fundraiser for Family Food Action (FFA), for which he will be fasting for 48 hours!

Can you tell us a bit about FFA?

FFA promotes community engagement and awareness of hunger in our society, and the relief of food poverty. The FFA collects food and toiletry donations from local groups and sends it out to foodbanks across Bristol for families and children in food poverty. The collection centre is based at the Ardagh site on Horfield Common, BS6 7YL, each Tuesday morning, 10.30 - midday.

What inspired you take on this challenge?

When I was young, people did not have to choose between heating and eating, or other things like clothing. Over the last fourteen years we have seen this situation get increasingly worse. I want to do something that contributes to preventing kids going to school hungry, doctors having to prescribe "food" because someone is malnourished, or in some cases people actually dying of hunger. This is happening now in a country that has the sixth highest GDP (Gross Domestic Product) in the world.

situation. However, in the meantime foodbanks are a literal lifeline for many families in Bristol and I want to contribute to that work.

Have you organised your **Lasting Powers of Attorney?**

The organising of Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPA) and how they function in practice can be a bit unclear for many people. Simply put, an LPA is a legal document that allows you (the donor) to handpick and appoint one or more individuals (attorneys) to make decisions on your behalf if you lose mental capacity at some point down the line.

As of 2021, only 7% of people in the UK had taken the step to create and register an LPA. There is a misconception that this is something reserved for the 'older' generation or those with substantial assets, but the reality is that anyone over the age of 18 can establish an LPA - but it can only be done while you're mentally sound.

Contrary to a popular belief, the responsibility of an attorney doesn't automatically fall to the next of kin, granting them the right to make decisions on your behalf.

If you opt not to designate an attorney (and subsequently lose mental capacity), the Court of Protection has the authority to appoint a deputy, and you won't have any say in this appointment. Alternatively, a loved one will need to apply to the Court of Protection to become a deputy to make decisions on your behalf. This is a long, expensive process which involves ongoing record keeping and can result in delays to decisions needed about your health and finances

For most of us, it's wise to be prepared for unforeseen accidents or illnesses that might render us incapable of making our own decisions. Being ready for any eventuality is a sensible move, as you never quite know what might be lurking around the corner.

Curious about how your chosen attorney – the person entrusted to make decisions on your behalf - will act? It's comforting to know that attorneys are bound by a legal duty to make decisions that are firmly in your best interests. This duty involves considering your current wishes and what they might be in the future. Furthermore, they must include you in the decisionmaking process whenever feasible.

While this process may be straightforward if you share a close, personal relationship with your attorney, it's advisable to ensure your wishes are crystal clear, regardless of your relationship with them. If possible, express your wishes verbally and in writing while you still have mental capacity - doing so ensures that any decisions made on your behalf reflect your own desires.



When creating or registering an LPA, it's essential to bear in mind that anything documented in the LPA is legally binding. Consider updating your preferences and appointed attorneys if they no longer align with your wishes. If you make an LPA in your younger vears, you may wish to appoint any children you have once they are of an appropriate age for example. Importantly, both types of LPAs (health & welfare and property & financial affairs) can be used temporarily or terminated if you regain mental capacity.

In essence, creating an LPA empowers you to make informed decisions about your assets, property, finances, health and well-being - both now and in the future. It offers peace of mind, knowing that your affairs will be managed without causing undue costs, delays and stress for your family and loved ones .-

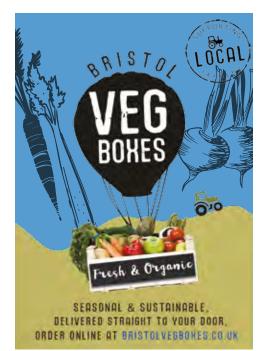

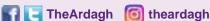

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Bristol's Lit Legacies launch: Free GCSE resources in response to shocking lack of texts on diversity

Lit Legacies was launched with pride and compassion at Fairfield High School, marking a successful year's work by professionals to create a free scheme of work based around the play Princess and the Hustler by Chinonyerem Odimba, in response to the shocking lack of GCSE texts on diversity. Centred around Bristol, including the Bristol Bus Boycott in 1963, this beautifully crafted play articulates the experiences of black people living in the UK, with Lit Legacies offering a fresh set of resources and activities ready to be picked up and delivered to students.

Welcoming a stream of external guests including older members of the local community, who shared personal experiences of protesting and fighting for racial equality during the 60s, educational professionals and a lead examiner, Fairfield's Atrium was buzzing with rich history, emotion and a sense of privilege to be part of this special event. Even more humbling was the attendance of Barbara Dettering, one of the seven Saints of St Pauls, who features on the large mural dedicated to the saints in school's Atrium.

Lit Legacies' project team's wealth of experience, knowledge and culture consists of University of the West of England Senior Lecturers Amv Saleh and

Malcolm Richards, plus English teachers Cashan Campbell (Fairfield High School), Tanisha Hicks-Beresford (Bristol Cathedral Choir School) and DeMarco Ryans (St John The Baptist School). Spearheaded by Amy, the group came together to educate and expose the profound racism experienced in Britain through a unique and enchanted perspective, which contains many moments of resilience, joy and hope.

Amy Saleh explains: "Growing up, I was used to seeing white literature with no black characters, even if the whole of the class was black. I've always been concerned about the message this sends, but understood the resources were just not available. One of the best days of my life as an educator was the day the project team met up, looked at the play, unpicked the issues and put a plan into place.

"We recognised the importance of student voice in the creation of the resources to ensure culture and identity reflection. They were amazing! They had so many different questions and ideas which provoked rich conversations and dialogue, helping to shape the resources. Their honesty and meaningful feedback meant they weren't afraid to say when they didn't like somethina!"

will encourage understanding, friendships and an opening for wider discussions."

Cashan Campbell, Assistant Vice Principal and English Teacher at Fairfield adds: "This has been a considerably rewarding and enriching experience for me. I drew up in Bristol, came to school at Fairfield and my beloved Nanny was one of the Seven Saints of St Paul's. Lit Legacies represents stories of global majority characters, perspectives and life experiences which we hope

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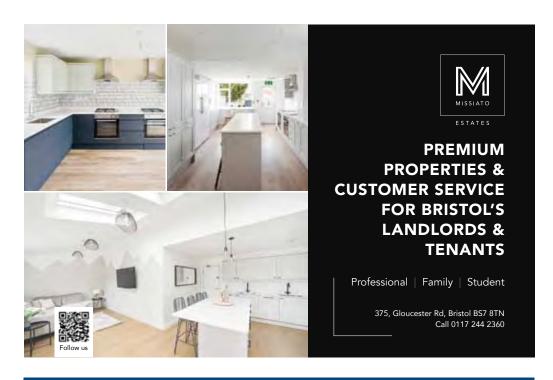








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Much loved Bristol vet retires after 39 years

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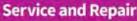

Family Food Action is supported by so many wonderful local people. And there are often new volunteers and donors who have read about us and come up to The Ardagh to meet us at the sorting hub on the first Tuesday of each month to find out more. Anyone is welcome to come and talk to us about the way that your donation, for instance of a bag of pasta or a tin of beans, is included with

the other donations and our purchased produce dairy, eggs and fresh fruit and vegetables - which is given to our partners in Easton, Eastville, Lockleaze, Southmead and St Pauls. They distribute donations to their local families through food clubs and use them at after school activities, where children can get freshly cooked food.

Over Christmas 2023, we were so happy to see the collection also included a lot of treats for children to enjoy over the holiday, but even happier that so many people marked the 'season of giving', with additional financial donations which allow us to continue to supply the wholesale fruit and vegetables. Each week, large sacks of potatoes, carrots and onions and crates of green vegetables, cauliflower, apples. oranges and bananas are delivered from our supplier direct to our partners. Cost-of-living increases have made these much more expensive than they were, so we are incredibly grateful for every financial donation we receive.

Last year, many people raised funds for FFA in a variety of ways; we had yard sales, carol-singing, lunch and coffee and croissant gatherings, quiz nights and street parties and a North Bristol Art Trail artist donated all the money from her sales of art and refreshments. This March, Andrew M is doing a sponsored fast to raise funds for FFA; you can support him through Just Giving (see page 38). We have a new events manager, Laura, and she is happy to give support to anyone who has a good fundraising idea. Get in touch with us through the website FFA.org.uk or Facebook page.

We have also been supported by many local businesses: Red Monkey in Chandos Road gave us lots of individual bottles of cola and lemonade, Pieminister have donated 100 pies each month for

partners to use. Hobbs

House Bakery donate 10 fresh loaves each week, and our charity partner store Sainsburys at Clifton Down donated £150 goods before Christmas. Many businesses gave items for our Open Day raffle too many to list here - but they all contributed to a stunning £3000 raised. Many people say that they found out about FFA through reading about the charity in Bishopston Matters, so a big thank you to Kerry and the team for their continuing support.

We have donations from many allotment and food growing organisations which supports our aim to give our families healthy food items. We have also this year, had an additional donation from Ignite-Life, a charity based in Kingswood, that offered us 'warm packs', which included draft excluders, electric blankets and wraps, radiator foil and secondary glazing film which we passed on to our partners and to St Nicholas of Toledo food bank in Old Market.

In July 2022, I had the pleasure of attending local group. Walkers & Talkers, for the first time, after an invitation from group founder Andy Brassington

(former Gloucestershire County Cricket wicket-keeper).

Now, nearly two years from its launch, it was great to catch up with Andy again, to see how this community group is getting on. "It is fantastic! This week we had 175 people join us and the week before that 200! This group does change people's lives" Andy enthused

Each Wednesday, hosted at our local Seat Unique Stadium, the meetings kick off at 10am with friendly chat over some complimentary teas and coffees (thanks to Andv's business Finders-Keepers), then the group have the opportunity to take a stroll around the cricket ground, before returning to enjoy a quest speaker.

Andy shares, "I love the first hour when people come together and chat and I witness friendships forming and cemented. The walk is also an important part of the session – we have helped people

rehab back from knee and hip operations!"

At the end of the walk they gather in the cricket club's museum, where a different item is shared and discussed. They were recently shown a letter from W. G. Grace, written 150 years ago!

I asked Andy if he had been surprised by how many people living in our community felt isolated? "Yes, I have been stunned by the lack of support out there for people who live on their own, are carers or widows. Just because you're in the latter part of your life does not mean you don't want to get out of bed and do something," Andy explained. He goes on to say, "I am delighted that this caring group is making a difference; every week friendships

blossom, new people are warmly welcomed and looked after and people now stay in touch in between meetings. Everyone has a story to tell and

brings something to the party."

Local church secures £75,000 to help feed Bristol

Last year the team behind B&A Meals, a food ministry run by B&A Church in Bishopston, applied to the Government's Community Organisations Cost of Living Fund for a grant. They were delighted to find out recently that B&A was awarded £75,000, the top amount. What they will spend the money on is easy. The cost-of-living crisis has made Warm Welcome Spaces spring up across Bristol, helping local residents with the difficult choice of heating or eating. Costs are naturally increasing for these vital community spaces too. At 279 Gloucester Road, B&A church has a 5-star kitchen with a team of professional chefs. They cook and share about 350 free meals a week - for Warm Welcome Spaces, and many different groups from refugees to local families on low incomes. Winning the Community Fund grant means B&A meals can scale up: they've recruited a dedicated driver, Tim, and are soon to buy an electric delivery van. Tim and the van will deliver meals directly to Warm Welcome Spaces. Also on the shopping list, some high-tech kitchen kit to streamline the cooking process.

B&A works in partnership with waste food charity. Fareshare, aiming to save 20 tonnes of surplus food a year. New venture FareshareGo is the next step. Local participating supermarkets and restaurants



will donate unsold food directly to B&A Meals, cutting out the warehouse. This will save hundreds of people hours and gallons of fuel. Donors to FareshareGo include major brands like Nando's and KFC. This new opportunity means that even food like grilled chicken can be delivered directly to people who need it, for free. It's not just soup! Innovative thinking like this is at the heart of B&A Meals (plus a love of great food!). The perils of medicines of old BHA local history research – Andy Buchan ©

Before the advent of laws on medicines, what could be in them and who they could be given to, together with laws on what could and could not be said in adverts, meant whenever the public opened their newspapers, they would have been assailed with adverts for medicines that today would not be considered safe, and they might have thought could cure anything.

Some contained ingredients that today we know are harmful, for example, may damage organs or, cause cancer, or may be addictive, such as - cocaine or opium. Some simply did not work, and others contained ingredients of variable quality/source, so their efficacy varied from batch to batch. Some of these medicines could still be purchased at least until the 1940s.

In the Horfield and Bishopston Record and Montpelier & District Free Press – for Saturday 07 January 1905, F. Moss, Chemist of 239 Cheltenham Road advertised among other things the following items:

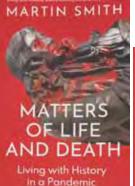
Many of these preparations were given to children, as well as adults.

- This would probably not have worked, or it worked because of ingredients it was mixed with including alcohol and/or opium, and morphine preparations to name but a few.
- Antipon was said to absorb fat.
- In the 1940s the manufacturer removed liver from the product name because it was mis-leading. Probably had little or no effect.
- This product gave some nutritive benefit. A version without the meat extract is still available today.
- Public at the time were more concerned about the alcohol content, than the cocaine.
- This may have made people feel better but would not have had a curative effect. Chloroform is toxic, causing various symptoms including excitement, and nausea following by dizziness and drowsiness. It may cause liver and kidney damage and may be a carcinogen.

A popular medication of the 19th and early 20th century this store did not advertise, but may have sold, was Chlorodyne; it was developed by a doctor working with the British Army in India in the 1850s to treat cholera; it was subsequently said to be suitable for treating cholera, diarrhoea, insomnia, neuralgia, migraines etc. Its principal ingredients were a mixture of laudanum (opium), cannabis and chloroform. It would have been effective at treating diarrhoea and acting as a sedative and pain killer but was highly addictive.

Thankfully, today all medicines must be trialled and go through strict approval processes, and adverts

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News from Bishopston & Ashley Down & Redland Councillors

Bishopston & Ashley Down ward

Developers have

put in an application to demolish the site and build a new block of flats. There have been many comments on the application and concern about the loss of the façade. We have met with the developers and architect who have reassured us that no final plan for the building has happened and that they are willing to engage with the local community about the finalised plans. Unfortunately, the façade is unlikely to be saved due to extensive damage caused by squatters and from the discovery of asbestos in the roof, but there will still be scope to input into the look of the final development. We will continue to communicate with the developers as they put forward their plans.

Ashley Down train station - We have heard from officers that the new Ashlev Down train station is on track to be completed within the next six months and we know this will be welcome news for many. However, there have been concerns about the recent loss of parking spaces around the station and access needs. We have spoken with transport officers who have explained that this temporary measure is to keep space available for a disabled parking bay, and for safety reasons for the vehicles accessing the site. Other measures were looked at but were sadly impractical. We have requested the council improve comms with residents and keep them better informed of any potential changes. We have also reiterated the need to get Concorde Way open as soon as possible and we hope this will be opened again when the station opens later this year.

Ardagh Bowling Club – We understand many are concerned about the future of the Ardagh Bowling Club now that the lease has been transferred to the Ardagh Community Trust. Unfortunately, due to ongoing council budget cuts across the city, there is no longer a budget for the council to support leisure activities in parks, and community asset transfers to community trusts are one way of resolving this to keep sports clubs open. Unfortunately, community trusts cannot subsidise private leisure clubs under their terms of reference with the council, and so this has

been a difficult situation and we understand

this has created an upsetting conflict between the club and the trust. We have spoken at length to club members, the trust and council officers and we hope an amicable solution can be found soon that allows both the club and trust to continue to work together for the good of the community. As green councillors we oppose the ongoing budget cuts and call on the government to fund local authorities properly for the good of residents and local communities.

Meeting with local police about crime in the area - In January we met with our local police representatives about issues in the area that residents have raised with us. Specifically, issues around speeding, antisocial behaviour and bike theft. We are working with the local police to do another series of speed watch dates, where we can visit roads with speeding issues and monitor the issues using speed guns. The police are also going to inform beat officers about antisocial behaviour on Gloucester Road and around the Methodist Church, as well as on match days. We are also working with police to put on another bike-marking day at The Ardagh, as outlined below. If you have any issues you wish us to raise with the local police, please don't hesitate to aet in touch.

Bike marking and cycling event at The Ardagh – Following the success of the event in 2023, where over 40 residents had their bikes marked for free, we are pleased to announce we are helping host another bike-marking day at The Ardagh on 23 March in the afternoon. Bring your bike along and local community police officers will mark it and get it registered. We will also be on hand to chat about all things cycling, including discussing ways to improve active travel in Bristol and providing cycling maps. We look forward to seeing you there!

Traffic around the Memorial Ground – Residents have been in touch with ongoing concerns about traffic and parking issues on match days around the Memorial Ground. We have been in touch with Bristol Rovers and understand they are carrying out traffic surveys on match days to improve the situation. We have also contacted transport officers about the situation to see if the transport plan can be adjusted. We understand the ongoing parking issue is causing a lot of stress and this is something we would like to address longer term with some form of residents' parking system. At time of writing, we are preparing to attend an engagement meeting for local residents on 29 February, at the club, to discuss ongoing concerns, so please get in touch if you would like to know more.

Allotment proposals in limbo - Many residents have been worried and upset at the local council's administration's proposals for a massive hike in allotment charges plus new bureaucratic rules. The upset led to 3500 consultation responses which are now being reviewed. Additional charges for ponds, trees and sheds raised questions about damage to the environment and retrospective rules that would be near impossible to enforce by volunteer site reps. Local community orchards and gardens with popular events in our neighbourhood have also been very worried. Fi attended a meeting with around 200 allotmenteers to listen to views and Martin pushed to make sure these changes get debated by councillors before the Mayor brings them to his Cabinet on 5 March. There is a public forum there where statements and questions can be tabled in advance. Allotment fees have not changed since 2018 so a review is clearly needed, but Fi and Martin are horrified at the inadequate consultation process and impact that such measure could have. Although most changes - apart from fees - are now paused, the uncertainty will now be left to the new multi-party committee administration to deal with after May's elections.

More library staff promised – The frequent, short notice closures affecting Bishopston Library and all the city's branches have been disruptive and damaging. This has been caused by a decision last summer to block spending on any staff when someone falls sick, retires or gets a secondment. The budget was there but it was being reserved for other service overspends. Martin called for the spending block to be lifted in a council debate and it's finally been announced by the Mayor that the budget will now be released to find casual staff again. The recruitment can now proceed so libraires can keep doors open.

Missed recycling services – The weekly recycling services are vital but we keep getting reports of missed collections. Whole streets in our ward are sometimes missed – several weeks running. The council is sometimes the cause as trucks get blocked by chaotic parking. It's two years since we asked the Mayor for action to protect corners from rogue parking but this hasn't been acted on. We've been told we need to find a budget from developer funds and, as with other highway projects, we know even if funded these have still not been put in place. We have asked to meet with the different services and are liaising with the police to try and put together a practical way to make services more reliable.

Parking problems – After nearly eight years with permit charges unchanged, there's been a second review of charges by the Mayor. Following changes in December 2023, a new, tripling of first parking permit costs and elimination of third permits was passed in January by his Cabinet. This was blamed on 'failure' of the permit scheme but no evidence was given for claims that lots of short local trips are

generated in the permit areas. Martin pressed the Cabinet for a coherent approach to ensure streets with no parking management get solutions to the chaos when vehicles are left for free, but no promises were given.



We're keen to see a better way to manage streets developed in future.

Bishop Road traffic issues – Fi is planning to bring concerned residents, officers, the police and school representatives together to solve problems around school pick-up and drop-off time, when hazards are at their worst. Progress on finding a solution to the longstanding traffic and air quality issues in the area has stalled as the school cannot find the staff resources needed to support a school street scheme. The local PCSOs are now patrolling the area regularly at school pick-up time when problems are at their worst. Fi aims to bring together residents, the school, highways officers and the police to look again at a way forward.

Empty homes could be repurposed – A successful Green motion debated at the council has raised the issue of action on the many empty homes around the city, and the unused shops and offices which could be repurposed for housing if no longer viable.

We'd like to see action taken to bring these back into use, especially the need for affordable housing for city residents. While planning permission gets given for many new developments these aren't always built and wasted homes and other buildings could be a practical way to create housing where it's needed.

Funding for services shrinks again – Government spending on local council services has been tightly controlled and has shrunk in real terms after years of austerity. The latest announcements confirm that most budgets will be under pressure again, with social care making up about four-fifths of the council spend. The controversial proposals for how to manage social care costs has now been left to the next administration to resolve after the May elections.

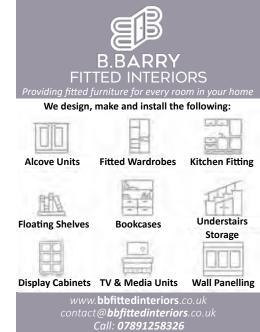
The council must set a balanced budget and only has some discretion over things like council tax and certain fees and charges. This means services are yet again at risk. The budget has been drawn up by the outgoing Mayor but, at the time of writing, it will come to the full council for approval in February.

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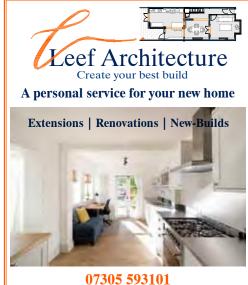

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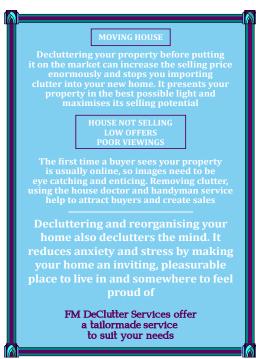
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
